A POPULAR CANDIDATE.

In speaking of his own candidacy he expressed himself confidently concerning his chances of walking off with the nomination. He does not expect to have delegates enough to secure the nomination at the start, but he will have almost the entire upper peninsula delegation and many lower peninsula delegates and believes, with this showing that he is the strongest compromise candidate in the field.

Osborn is a great worker, a good politician, and with the fight that will take place in the convention the indications are that he will receive the nomination. In the evening the Munising Cornet Band serenaded him at the Russell House, after which he was introduced to our citizens by Claude W. Case and he responded with a brief talk from the hotel veranda and received frequent applause. H. A. Lord was then called upon by Mr. Case. He assumed the audience with a story, and closed himself from making a speech. Mr. Osborn's visit to Munising was a pleasant one and the warm welcome he received here shows that he is Alger County's favorite candidate for the governor.

AMALGAMATIONS AND GRANTS
 Put your hand on an Englishman and a chance to one he will not describe a business consolidation as we do. We Americans speak of amalgamations and grants, but the Englishman talks of syndicates and majority of amalgamation. Now "amalgamation" is a word used and I do not think English will be so much on hand, who gets there are no trusts in the land would do well to keep out of it. Two lines of road for one people to do over each head and the English amalgamation is the same as our trusts as they are.

Only last week we found that the owner of England had some iron amalgamated to make pipes with a study that was surprising in a country that has only amalgamations, and since then we learn that back in 1858 there was a strangely harmonious action upon the part of the politicians. It is recorded that in June of that year eighteen coffin furniture makers of England, Scotland and Ireland formed what at that time was reported to be the largest "amalgamation" of business firms that had ever taken place. The capital of this enterprise was given as two million dollars. We have heard a good deal about a coffin trust in America, but we presume if the truth was known it is really nothing at all but an "amalgamation."

The greatest difference between a trust and an amalgamation seems to be that the terrible and dangerous trust exists behind an American protective tariff while the gentle and generous amalgamation thrives only in free-trade England. For Democratic campaign purposes this distinction will, of course, be made perfectly plain to all.

MEMORIAL DAY.
 (S. V. Tribune.)
 The meaning of Memorial Day has not changed, though many Americans have largely changed their own mental attitude toward that patriotic observance. It is perhaps too common an impression that the old meaning of the day itself has vanished; that the country no longer holds in most reverent and loving memory those whose deeds suppressed a great rebellion and prevented disunion, but has come to regard as the one lofty quality worthy of heroic honor that devotion which offers even life itself for a cause honestly believed to be right. That is not quite the spirit with which the President himself uncovered his head in respect toward those who were defeated thirty-six years ago. A grander thought remains, that the people have reached through strife and crime and suffering a deeper unity and a more genuine devotion than would have been possible without attempted disunion and defeat. Thus those who were beaten can in truth enjoy the result as heartily as those who were victors. When the whole Nation, North and South alike, advances to a higher and better conception of the meaning and the virtue of that government, then indeed Memorial Day may become in no sense a sectional but a National thanksgiving.

With sincerity and devotion both Federal and Confederate may be glad that the Union prevailed, that government of the people, for the people and by the people did not prove incapable of sustaining its authority; that submission to the duly declared will of the majority was established as a higher and more inspiring loyalty than submission to any crowned or consecrated authority. But the true conception is that which places higher than any obligation to self or family or nation the sacred trust of the American sovereign, whose duty it is any cost and always to seek the best good of all who may be dependent upon the exercise of his power.

It is with the same spirit in these latter days that Americans regard their responsibility toward the populations of the islands which have been brought under the authority of the Union. Instantly there comes the duty to do the best thing possible, not for the States only, but for the islands also. To the world it becomes a duty to show how capable and unselfish and pure government by the people can be, even in dealing with populations not yet fitted to share in the exercise of power. If it be true that no other form of government known among men calls out such wise statesmanship in the framing of laws, or such zealous watchfulness in their faithful enforcement for the benefit of all, and not for the welfare of the rulers.
