MR. EDWARD L. CLAPP DEAD.

An Influential and Honored Business Man of Manistique.
The news of the death of Mr. Edward L. Clapp reached Manistique this week and occasioned much surprise among his many friends here as but two short years ago he visited this city and was apparently in the best health and spirits. We are indebted to Mr. H. H. Field, superintendent of the Chicago Lumbering Co., for the following excellent biography, and tribute to his memory:

A letter from A. J. Fox brings the sad news of the death of Edward L. Clapp of Evans Lake, Lenawee Co., this state. The particulars were not given. Mr. Clapp was formerly eleven years an honored citizen of Manistique. He came here in March 1878 and took charge of the mercantile department of the Chicago Lumbering Co. business, holding the position for nearly eleven years, making it a financial success, both for the company and himself. He resigned his position with the Co. in the fall of 1888, returning to Detroit, Mich., where he again engaged in the mercantile business, and about two years later here returned to Evans Lake, engaging in farming.
Mr. and Mrs. Clapp and in the organization of the First Baptist church of Manistique, and were charter members of same. Mr. Clapp holding the office of Assessor with honor to himself and usefulness to the church.
Mr. Clapp was born in Batston Spuy, N. Y. in 1837, served his country in the war of the Rebellion in a Minnesota regiment, spent six months as a prisoner of war in Andersonville, Ga. He leaves a wife and four children, Edward L. and James Gregory of Pico, Ohio, Mrs. Curry Jaffrey and Willie of Evans Lake, Mich. Mrs. Clapp and the children have the heart-felt sympathy of their many friends in Manistique.

A letter received since the above article was put in type, states that Mr. Clapp was taken ill Saturday with cholera morbus and died Monday. Violent vomiting caused heart failure. Funeral services were held Wednesday at the Baptist church, Ginton, Mich. The services were conducted by the Grange, of which deceased was a prominent member. The floral decorations were very elaborate.

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION
to the Republican Electors of the State of Michigan.

The state convention of the Republicans of Michigan is to be held at the Waldorf Hotel, in the city of Grand Rapids, on Wednesday, the 20th day of June, 1901, at 10 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of nominating candidates for state offices, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention.

The delegates from the several counties in each congressional district are requested to meet at their respective places of meeting on the day of the state convention to select committees as follows: to be presented to the state convention for consideration: (one vice president, one assistant secretary, one member each of the committees on "Policies," "Permanent Organization and Order of Business" and "Resolutions") and to transact such other business as they may deem necessary.

In accordance with the resolution of 1896, each county will be entitled to one delegate for each town of the total vote cast for governor at the last election (December 1900), and one additional delegate for every fraction amounting to one-tenth. Each congressional county will be entitled that last two delegates. No delegate will be entitled to a seat who does not reside in the county he proposes to represent. The secretary of each county convention is hereby requested and urged to forward to the state convention the names of the delegates to the state convention, which will be chosen a certified list of such delegates as are entitled to seats in the state convention from their respective counties.

Osborn's chances to secure the gubernatorial nomination are extremely bright. Hon. O. E. Fuller, of Port Huron, is in the city today. He is a candidate for the senatorial nomination and his aspirations are very favorably considered in this county.

The Press is glad to hear it, and hopes Mr. Fuller may be nominated. He is one of the ablest and most influential representatives the upper peninsula ever sent to the legislature. He would have great influence in shaping legislation.—Iron Mt. Press.

It is stated in the Detroit papers that Chase S. Osborn is the second choice of the big Wayne county delegation to the Republican state convention. Mr. Osborn is also the second choice of very many more lower peninsula delegates, and of upper peninsula Republicans will only stand by the gentleman if they should be will be nominated when the break comes. Don't let us waste such an opportunity.—Iron Mt. Press.

DEMOCRATS FAVOR THE TRUSTS.

The Democrats in Congress have voted against a constitutional amendment, which would have given Congress full power to define, regulate, control, prohibit or dissolve trusts, monopolies and combinations of all kinds. The Democratic members of the house and its judiciary committee have attempted to evade their course by dragging in the old state's rights argument by talking about the sovereignty of the Republican and by asserting that we have laws enough now if they were only enforced.

It is true that trusts exist because the administration has not enforced existing anti-trust laws, as the Democratic now claim, what becomes of all this talk that we must have free trade in order to kill these outlaws?

The Democrats refused to aid in further providing for the national regulation of trusts. If the Sherman anti-trust law is good enough it might be well to remember that that was a Republican measure.

MONEY WASTED IN ROAD MAKING.
Some one has truly said that Michigan yearly wastes \$20,000,000 a year in repairing its country roads. No doubt the estimate is practically correct. The stereotyped plan is to scrape the ground from the sides in to the center of the road every spring thereby spoiling the roads for traffic.

During the course of the summer and autumn the soil cracks back to the ditches and the work of "road making" is repeated the following spring. This is the program for an indefinite period. It costs money to do this, and the extra wear and tear on horses and equipment on account of the poor roads amounts to a pretty sum in every district yearly.

We have said so before and repeat it again that money expended in the manner above referred to is practically wasted.

In Schoolcraft county, owing to the nature of the soil, roads can never be properly made unless crushed stone is used. Every township in the county should expend all money available in the highway fund in placing crushed stone on the roads. If only one mile can be built in a year, build it, and the following year build another mile next to the mile made the previous year. In the course of time first-class roads that will not require the expenditure of much money for repairs, will be the result.

Manistique, Harrison, Hiawatha and Thompson townships are utilizing stone for road building and the vastly improved condition of the highways is so apparent to all that drive over them that their superiority over the ancient plan of scraping dirt from the sides into the center, is unquestioned.

NOT EVERY DEMOCRAT DISLOYAL.

There are two unfortunate conditions relating to the situation in the Philippines that will probably not disappear until after next fall's election. The first of these conditions is the idea that has evidently obtained a hold upon the insurgents that if they can but keep up their warfare until next November their final success may be assured. The Filipinos seem to think that if a Democratic administration should succeed the present one, the whole group of islands would be relinquished by this government. From many reports that come from what appear to be reliable sources, it is evident that the Filipino leaders are endeavoring to prolong the struggle for just these reasons.

Another and more unfortunate, even shameful, condition is that some Americans are so narrow and so bigoted in their partisanship that they are anxious to have the insurrection continue during the Presidential campaign. It is only plain to be seen that some Democrats feel that it would be a misfortune to their party to have peace restored and the assassination of American soldiers cease before the polls are closed next November.

The PIONEER-TRIBUNE is not one of those papers that believes in charging every democrat with being disloyal to his own country, but we regret that any man should be so anxious to have William McKinley elected that he hopes to see the Philippine trouble continue expecting that it will prove a misfortune to their party to have peace restored and the assassination of American soldiers cease before the polls are closed next November.

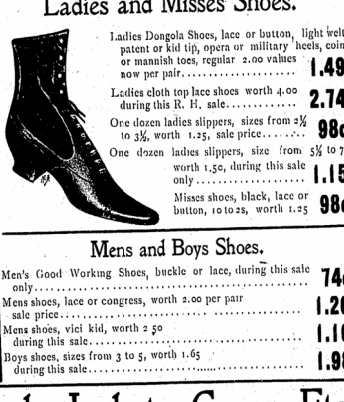
