### MRS. WILL E. THOMAS DEAR

Her Death Deceased This Morning After An Illness of Two Weeks.

The community was shocked this morning to learn of the death of Mrs. Will E. Thomas.

While she had been critically ill for several days, yet all hoped that in some way her life would be spared. Her demise is peculiarly sad on account of the fact that she leaves four small children, the youngest a daughter only five weeks of age.

She was suffering from a complication of diseases, and although every possible effort was made to stay the ravages of disease they were of no avail, and death relieved the sufferer about nine o'clock this morning.

Nathaniel Tucker, the eldest daughter of Capt. and Mrs. Geo. Tucker, was born in Bay City on December 29, 1807. She came to Manistique with her parents about twenty years ago. She was one of the first graduates of the Manistique high school and the first graduate employed to teach in the public schools.

On August 21, 1880 she became the wife of Will E. Thomas, who with four children mourn her death. The children are: Harry, aged 19 years; Glenn, aged seven years; Marion, aged three years, and Ethel five weeks old. The parents of the deceased, Capt. and Mrs. Tucker, two brothers Harry and Penobscot, and one sister, Rhina, reside here and with the husband and children, have the sincere sympathy of the entire community.

The deceased had for years been a prominent factor in local social circles and was universally respected. Her remembrance of kindness will ever be brightened in the hearts of the children by sending beautiful flowers, and dainties—and in every other way you can help to ease the grief of the bereaved.

She was an ideal wife and mother, as well as neighbor.

She was an active member of the Christian Endeavor Society of the Presbyterian church, and exemplified the teachings of the society in her daily life.

That one in the prime of life, surrounded by loving children who need a mother's care and training, should be called hence is one of the inscrutable mysteries of Providence.
