Republican congressmen in more or less close districts in the lower peninsula, who used to have royal fights for a majority in the nominating conventions, and then still more royal fights for a majority at the polls, used to look with envious eyes in the old days at the congressman from the upper peninsula. The representative to Washington from that section had what was considered a snap. A nomination invariably meant an election at the expenditure of little time or money. Nominations didn't come hard either, and when once secured for the first term meant that they would come still more easily for a second and third, and even a fourth term.

Things have changed, however, since the old days, and Carl Sheldon is entitled to look with envy down across the straits at lower peninsula congressmen without any especially, or at least any dazzling, brilliant records, who have secured third and fourth nominations without as much as turning a hand.

The story of Sheldon's career as a congressman is a political hard luck story. The first time he was a candidate was in opposition to Sam Stephenson's overwhelming ambition for a fifth term. One of the most costly and laborious fights ever experienced, at least in recent years, in any Michigan district succeeded, Mr. Sheldon's nomination was only brought about through efforts that were really tremendous. It might have been thought that a district where party traditions are as strong as they are in the twelfth, he would be given the customary honor of a nomination for a second term without an opposing voice, but Sam Stephenson was not that kind of a man. The struggle that was almost as fierce and, as is said, even more expensive than the first, even professed Sheldon's second nomination. So close was the result that the convention split. Both Sheldon and Stephenson were nominated and a supreme court proceeding was instituted to determine which nomination was regular. When the court declined to pass on the point and ruled that both nominations might go on ticket, Stephenson developed more of a disposition to play the game according to the rules than he had been credited with, and pulled out. Sheldon was again elected, but when he came up for the third time this year he had to face the cumulative effects of opposition. Stephenson did not go against him, and his principal opponent was Gus Smith, who had been with Stephenson two years before.

Sheldon is a man of force and a congressman of good repute, and no regret need be felt at his renomination. A good deal of tortimony is talked on the duty of a district to keep the same representative in congress continuously, that he may acquire influence through seniority of service. No amount of service will ever give a shiftless, forceless, non-competitive variety of congressman any great amount of influence, and the sooner such are retired to private life the better. In fact, their shiftiness and forcelessness and non-competitive seem to increase with the length of their service, through their getting out of touch with conditions at home. Sheldon, however, isn't that kind of a congressman. He is not a brilliant fellow, but is just the kind of a man who, improving on acquaintance, acquires greater prestige among his fellows at Washington as his term of public service lengthens.

The people will learn that imperialism, as employed by the Democrats, means that they would have the country sink its dirt, turn its back on destiny, count all burdens as lost, furl the flag and withdraw its protection from people who need it today more than ever before in all their history.

Imperialism, if it means anything the Democracy would have the people believe, implies an emperor, a dynasty, a throne, a crown and a scepter. This feature of imperialism, by no stretch of partisan misrepresentation, can ever be charged against our honored President and candidate for the Presidency.

A number of Mr. Samuel Mix's friends would be pleased to have an opportunity of voting for him as a candidate for member of the board of education, at the next annual meeting to be held in September. He has the benefit of many years' experience as a member of the board and his record as an official has been very satisfactory.

Schoolcraft county Republicans are more than pleased that Congressman Sheldon was renominated at Calumet. He made a good clean record during his previous terms as representative from this district and on account of his familiarity with the duties of the office, in position to do better work than ever. That he will be re-elected is unquestioned.

Mr. C. A. Johnson who has been employed as cook in the camps of Geo. Hovey and Frank Cookson during the past few years, wishes to announce his candidacy for the nomination of treasurer subject to the Republican county convention, through the columns of this paper. Mr. Johnson is a good book-keeper, a man of pleasing appearance and well liked by all knowing him.

Smith each losing a vote to Mend. The last ballot before the adjournment stood: Sheldon, 29; Smith, 25; Haire, 7; Mead 6. Before the convention reassembled it came to the knowledge of Mr. Smith that the Delta delegation notified a group that would nominate by deserting Mead and throwing their four votes to Sheldon, giving the latter two more than the required thirty-two. Mr. Smith, however, declined the offer of delegation to his allegiance to him and advised that it was better to throw to Sheldon, which would nominate him. After a moment to the roll call, and when the roll call began for the first ballot taken after the convention had got together in the afternoon, the two votes of that county were given to Mr. Sheldon. This gave him the requisite majority, and caused for him the deadlock and made the nomination, having the fields Delta delegation to claim on the wagon over the fact that he had a majority.

While this result will be something of a disappointment to the Republican-Marquette county, and of other counties which joined with Mr. Smith's home county in supporting that gentleman for nomination, it was not so only because of their great desire to have the honor go to a man so well deserving of it as the candidate whom they backed so loyally in the convention.

As for "The Mining Journal," it earnestly desired to have the nomination to Mr. Smith, that it can support Mr. Sheldon this time with the same heartiness that it threw into his support when he was the nominee of the county in the two former congressional campaigns. He stands for the same principles now that he did then; he is possessed of the same ability; with the addition of valuable experience acquired during his service in the house; he is as good a Republican as ever, and there is no reason why every Republican ballot cast in the district in the election of this year should not bear his name. He put up a strong campaign for the nomination and won it fairly, and his party in the district now owe it to him to give him the honor which he has so completely and rightfully earned.

The convention was in many respects one of the most notable ever held in the district. Composing it were the leading Republicans of the district. It was organized without any serious friction and did its work decorously. The balloting attests to the loyalty with which each of the defeated candidates was supported while it supported the one who had the chance of winning out. There was no small trickery resorted to by any of the candidates or their friends. It was a dignified contest for a great honor, and it should be to the satisfaction of the nominees which his success brings him to know that he was favored by the convention over such competitors as the men who contested with him for the nomination. That he will be elected is not open to doubt, and among the workers who will labor to make his majority the largest possible will be found, we feel sure, the three aspirants for the nomination who sought it unsuccessfully and those who stood by them in the effort they made to secure it.

**THE CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION.** The Republican congressional convention for this district was held at Toledo last week.

Motions were made and carried for the chair to appoint a committee of five on the order of business and permanent organization and five on resolutions.

The committee were appointed as follows: Credentials - Messrs. Webster, of Chippewa; P. C. Clark, Marquette; Douglas, of Gogebie; Kern, of Macomb; and Townsend, of Delta.

Order of Business and Organization - McLean, of Gogebie; MacNaughton, of Dickinson; Nelson, of Schoerhafer; Colburn, of Delta, and Prines, of Gogebie.

Resolutions - Sherwood of Marquette; Dunstan of Houghton; Crozier, of Menominee; Nevin, of Gogebie; and Brinken of Delta.

A recess of twenty minutes was then taken.

The various committees reported when the convention reconvened at 6 o'clock.

Messrs. W. F. Waite of Menominee, and W. J. Prine of Gogebie, were appointed tellers.

The report of the committee on resolutions follows:

Resolved, That we the Republicans of the Twelfth congressional district of Michigan, in convention assembled, do hereby most heartily and enthusiastically approve the several planks of the platform of the party adopted at the National Republican convention recently held at the city of Philadelphia and the ticket there nominated.

We unite with pride to the high character and the magnificent achievement of those who have distinguished themselves as candidates for president and vice president, William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt, and affirm our belief that their administration of public affairs both domestic and foreign will be characterized by the soundest judgment and the broadest patriotism.
