## MICHIGAN ROLLS UP 100,000 MAJORITY

Governor Bliss' Majority is about 20,000 Less. The State Senate Unanimously Republican and Only Eleven Democratic Representatives Pull Through.

## Schoolcraft Republicans Elect All But Carr

The Republican victory last Tuesday exceeded the most sanguine expectations of the national committee, and the most careful estimates were made to appear insignificant when compared to the actual results. Only once before in the history of the United States did a president receive a larger majority in the electoral college. The Republicans claim 308, and as 224 is necessary to elect the magnitude of the victory is apparent. The Republicans are also sure of a large majority in congress—no less than twelve in the senate and fifty in the House. Michigan gave a tremendous majority for McKinley—nearly 100,000, while Bliss and the entire state ticket were elected by majorities nearly as great. The legislature also solidly Republican. Congressman Sheldon was re-elected by about 22,000 majority as were all of the Republican candidates for congress in the remaining districts. Senator O. B. Fuller's majority will exceed 6,000, while Representative McCallum's majority will exceed 2,000. In the county the Republican candidates, except Carr for sheriff, were elected, and when all things are taken into consideration, a great victory was achieved in the county even if the majorities in several cases were low.

### AN UNKNOWN MAN KILLED.

Last Tuesday evening a train on the P. & P. Co.'s railroad, bound from Thompson to the pull up, ran over a man who was lying on the track about two miles beyond the Sun Lane crossing. The engine in charge of Edward Young was making two cars and a caboose. Conductor Frank Clark who was riding in the caboose, noticed a man lying lengthwise on the track at the spot above mentioned and as soon as he noticed his position, signalled the engine to stop. As the train was only two or three rods from the man when the conductor first discovered him, the engine was unable to stop. The train was running at a speed of about six miles an hour and the whole train ran over the man who was horribly mangled. Judging from appearances the victim was about 40 years of age and weighed about 160 pounds. He was evidently a lumberman. In his pockets were found 33 cents, a pair of gloves and a few trinkets but nothing that would lead to his identity. The remains were viewed by many Thompsonites but no one appeared to know who the unfortunate was.

Coroner Sattler held an inquest Wednesday morning and after examining the conductor, engineer and fireman of the train as well as Floyd Dool of the P. & P. Co.'s store, the jury consisting of S. J. Houshor, Pat. Quinn, Andrew Aylwin, Louis Houshor, A. E. Ansell and John H. Gould, returned the following verdict: "That this an unknown man and stranger according to evidence not dead accidentally by being run over by an P. & P. Co.'s logging train and that the accident was due to himself; every effort being used by train employes to avoid the accident."

The man was evidently intoxicated, and selected a very dangerous resting place. The remains were brought to Ke-favor & Johnson's morgue, and are awaiting identification. Coroner Sattler furnishes the following description: Slightly over four weeks' growth, wore a machine-made dark blue woolen shirt, No. 9 or 10 shoe, black plush cap. A piece of Baltic metal was found in one of the pockets. A. M. LeRoy of the C. L. Hardware store remembers selling a person the metal on election day, and that he was similarly dressed.

He evidently belonged to the C. C. I. Co's camp. The remains were identified Tuesday by a son of the deceased, as John Pakka, an employe at the Cleveland Mills camp.

## EDITORIAL

FRANCE MUST HAVE OUR COAL.

(Detroit Free Press.)

Another practical argument for the continuous working of our coal mines and against the folly of industrial idleness in this department country is so near a coal famine that an acute crisis has been reached, and the people as well as the government are casting about for the best means of relief. In the unsettled state of European affairs it might become necessary to mobilize the French army, and there is not fuel available to run the necessary trains within the time limit that such a movement would require in the face of an emergency. One railway company cabled a heavy order to America and asked that it be filled with a rush, for the supply on hand would be exhausted within three weeks.

The Northern railway company is importing coal as rapidly as the means of transportation will permit and acknowledges a loss of a million dollars through the rise in that commodity. Many of the smaller institutions that employ an enormous amount of labor in the aggregate are threatened with the necessity of shutting down, the result being the enforced idleness of thousands who are now living comfortably. This prospect on the threshold of winter is an alarming one, and America is turned to as the source of relief.

In Paris the municipal council is seriously considering the octrois dues, a special tax imposed for the privilege of bringing coal into the city. That it is burdensome appears in the fact that coal sells for nearly \$8 more than it is worth at the mine when ready for shipment. This is almost prohibitory to the poorer consumers, and their condition grows worse as the price advances.

While such a situation is deplorable there is sorrow compensation in the fact that this country is in a position to enjoy another remunerative expansion of its foreign market. There is a harvest for mine owners and an equitable share should go to the seaboard should be made reasonable and no time should be lost in providing vessels as coal carriers, for lack of them is the greatest handicap encountered in connection with the sale and delivery of our coal abroad. It is no time for idleness; for grasping the opportunity means the increase of prosperity, not alone in capital, but in the field of labor where increased remuneration is most clearly demanded.

## McCALLUM VICTORIOUS.

Gen. John C. McCallum by nearly 1000. His majority in the House, June 23rd.

Hon. Geo. P. McCallum was elected to the legislature two years ago by 1475 majority. Despite demoralized opposition he was re-elected by a majority approximating 2200.



In Schoolcraft county his majority was 570. Two years ago it was 359, an increase of 211.


He received majorities in every township in Schoolcraft with the exception of Seney. The majorities are as follows: 60, Genesee 21, Harrison, 68, Hiawatha 107, Manistique 39, Inwood 23, Thompson 15. His opponent received 13 majority in Seney.

In Delta county he received majorities in every precinct but two. His majority in Escanaba—the home of his opponent was 118.

Alder county gives him about 400.

Edmond Ashford Still the Best Sprinter.

Popular Ed. Ashford was re-elected county clerk and register of deeds by the biggest majority given any candidate on the county ticket last Tuesday. This is the fifth time that he has been elected and every time his majority was the largest. There was determined opposition to him this time yet his majority exceeds 300.

## WONDERFULLY RICH STRIKE.

Immense Ledge of Gold-Containing Quartz Discovered on the Shores of Port Clarence.

"While all eyes are turned to the placers of Blustone and Kongroo, the probability of rich quartz properties having been considered by a number of wise ones. This branch of mining has not been neglected, although little is said about it.

One location has been made which the owners believe promises to fulfill their most extravagant desires. Early in the season, June 28, a party comprised of V. C. Severance, Dr. C. J. Soren, J. M. Fritch, Capt. Chase, Dr. B. G. Snow, Frank Rogers and the Rev. G. E. Berry, made a trip to Port Clarence and located quartz property, the assays of which have far exceeded their expectations. This property is located on the bay about ten miles from the mangrove, and the outcropping can be distinctly seen from the water side.

Mr. Severance got the "tip" upon his way out last fall, and upon his return this spring immediately located the property. Three distinct ledges were uncovered, one being eight feet wide, another twelve feet and a third over 300 feet wide. The ore is free milling and rough assays showed many colors.

Within the last two weeks Severance and French returned to Port Clarence and did some developing, the result of which has been so gratifying that they will devote all their time next year to opening up the property.

"Talk about the placers of Gold Run and other rich creeks," said Mr. Severance. "is all right, but I am convinced we have the spot where it all came from. Why, on the 3000-foot ledge we found small pieces of quartz fairly studded with free gold. I got next to this proposition last fall on the boat going out. When a miner showed some quartz which he had picked up at Port Clarence. This gave me made a quick trip up there and fortunately found it still open. We intend to bring in some machinery next year to develop the mine, but shall not rush to open hard as the gold can't get away. I consider myself a millionaire now only have to get it out of the rock. I am surprised it has not been found sooner, as massive walls of quartz are exposed hanging over the water."

Other parties have made locations in that neighborhood and speak highly of the country as being the coming quartz mining field of the world.
