INTERESTING LECTURE.

CAPT. ALBERT HIGHLIGHTS HIS EXPERIENCES IN SIBERIA, AND GIVES FREE MASONRY DEGREE TO THE HIS ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

APPEARED HERE UNDER MASONRY AUSPICES.

Capt. Albert, an ex-officer in the Russian army, who escaped from captivity through Masonic influence while enroute to Siberia, delivered a very interesting lecture, recounting his experiences in Siberia, under the auspices of Lakeside Lodge No. 371, P. & A. M., at the opera house Tuesday evening.

Eight hundred or more complimentary tickets were issued to Masons, their families and friends, and judging from the enormous crowd in attendance, the tickets were not needed.

The captain opened his remarks by lamorously referring to the wretched train service between the Soo and Manistique—having arrived here on the mixed train which was three hours late. Yet judging from the recital of his experiences in Siberia he would undoubtedly rather travel via the Soo Line's accommodation train than an exile train.

As the time was necessarily limited the speaker could not discuss the political and social conditions existing in Russia to the extent that his hearers would have desired. He explained how that travelers would "fly" Russia and return with contradictory statements as to the conditions of the people. Foreigners of note were feted in the palaces of the nobility and were personally conducted throughout the realm by attaches of the government whose duties were to show the guests only the bright side. He explained that the Russian people were having its own language and racial characteristics. The lot of the poor or peasantry which by the way comprise the greater portion of the population, is almost beyond description. They are kept in dense ignorance and utter submission.

He said that the Nihilists, are not to be found entirely among the lower class but among the nobility. One Alexander II, who he succeeded to the throne inaugurated a number of radical changes in his country. He

GUILTY OF FORGERY.

J. S. WILSON, CONVICTED FORGERY WHILE IN JAIL BY THE CARABE OF HIS BROTHER, AND CONFINED HIS BROTHER.

IMPERSONATES ANOTHER, AND RAISES THE AMOUNT OF A MONEY ORDER FROM \$10 TO \$70.00.

Mr. J. S. Wilson, who is awaiting trial for robbing Annie Anderson of \$250.00, has added forger to his list of crimes, and the U. S. postal authorities will take him in tow as soon as he serves time for burglary.

When Wilson came to Manistique last summer he was accompanied by Edward Lawrence. Both the boys were playing in hard luck while here, and Lawrence confessed his intention of writing to his mother at Sturgis, Pa., Oct., for money. Before doing so, he left town.

Wilson hit upon the idea of impersonating Lawrence and wrote Mrs. Lawrence for money, which amount in a check of a money order. The letter was addressed to Lawrence in care of J. S. Wilson and was received by Wilson recently. A few days later he gave the turnkey, Mr. Kingstad, a money order for \$70.00 and asked him to cash it. He explained that he had a step-father named Lawrence and that at times he used this name instead of his original name Wilson. A discrepancy in the amount called for by the money order and advice was noticed by Postmaster Orr, the order having been clumsily raised from \$10 to \$70.

The postal authorities were notified and an inspector investigated the case. Wilson finally confessed that he had forged the order as well as Lawrence's name and as soon as the charge of burglary is disposed of he will be arrested by the U. S. authorities.

The officers and Postmaster Orr had through correspondence with Mrs. Lawrence learned all the facts in the case and he was "in for it" before his confession.

Wilson is a bright young fellow but his deeds during the past two months have entitled him to a term of years at Marquette, which he will quite likely be presented with.

POLITICAL.

The one amazing, if not inexplicable, thing which appears on the face of the returns is the vote of the Southern States. No part of the country has profited more, few sections have profited so much, from the wonderful prosperity under McKinley and Protection as has the South. Yet every one of the Southern States, with the exception of West Virginia, which can hardly be called Southern, has rolled up a big majority for Bryan and for the policies which he represents, policies which would shut up every Southern factory and bring to a sudden end the rapidly growing prosperity of the Southern States. The South doesn't want Free-Trade. Yet the South votes for a man who declares that Protection is vicious in principle. The South languished with the rest of the country under the Wilson law, yet it gives its electoral votes to a man who voted to enact that law and who has no regrets for his vote. The day must come some time when the South will vote from reason, not from prejudice, and when it will depend on the rest of the country to save it from itself; but when it, too, will be found loyal to the policy to which it owes its prosperity and for the continuance of which it devoutly hopes. Common gratitude, as well as common sense, demands that the South give its support to the party whose policy of giving Protection to American industries brings business activity and wealth to the people of the South.

DON'T WANT THE PRESIDENCY.

The American Republican League adopted resolutions endorsing Hon. Marcus A. Hanna for the presidency four years hence. He put a quietus on the idea by thus addressing the committee that presented him with the resolutions:

"I am glad to see you, gentlemen. I appreciate the honor you do me very highly, and I thank you and the league for the good work you did during the campaign, but there are three things I desire to say to you: First, I am not a candidate

for the presidency of the United States; second, I will not be a candidate; third, I will not accept the nomination if it should be tendered me."

THE INCREASE IN POPULATION.

When Supt. M. H. Quick of the C. L. Co. arrived in Manistique 28 years ago, Manistique had a population of less than 125. There were only a few houses on the town site and the majority of the inhabitants were employed in the mill and boardwalk at the company's boarding house. There has been a decided improvement and growth in Manistique since that time. The population has increased to 1122 and the city is enjoying an unusual degree of prosperity.

New industries have been established and when lumbering, to which Manistique owes its birth, is exhausted, the town will be so strongly fortified and established in other industries that the passing of pine will not give the town its death blow, or in any way impede its growth.

Every year shows a substantial increase in the material status of the town, and each successive year is a record breaker in the number of new business blocks and residences erected. Manistique's all the year harbor is such a fact that it will only be a question of time when it will become the outlet for the iron range north of us. WHALEBACK BARGES

TRAINS OF NEW BOATS FOR THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER.

Planting Giants That Draw Only 200 Inches of Water When Carrying 2000 Tons of Goods—Maximum of Speed and Strength.

A train going down the Mississippi at the rate of ten miles an hour is the novel sight which will be presented to the admiring gaze of the dwellers along the banks. If the tugs could have seen the strange craft they would have thought the spirit of evil himself was on board, but we of the nineteenth century are no longer so superstitious. When Alexander McCallum announced that he would run a river train on the Mississippi he was met with a powerful opposition in front and two great ears behind, people were as much as to say they did not doubt for a moment his ability to do so, but McCallum is the man who gave the whistle to the great inland waterway and he has proved the truth in that part of the country. He has therefore all the experience necessary to carry out his plans.

Though it looks so much like a great train, the wonder of the great river is a fleet of boats that will not only cross the river, but will also cross the Gulf of Mexico. It cannot strike a rock and sink. It can carry 2000 tons of freight, and when loaded to the fullness of its capacity it will draw but 20 inches of water, less than the draft of a steam boat flying through the Gulf.

This new invention is expected to make St. Louis one of the greatest grain ports of the world. It will increase the growth of the cities along the banks of the river, and its effects will be widespread as far as the development of the country is concerned.

The new whalebacks of the river are great steel hulls. Their length is 200 feet, their beam 40 feet, and their draft is 14 feet only. Flying light they draw 14 inches of water, and with every 200 tons added to their cargo they displace an additional inch, making the draft 20 inches when the barge is carrying 2000 tons of grain. At the same time of steamboats could not carry so much in the same time.

Their distinctive feature is their excessive flatness. They are, in fact, hogbacks which run on the surface of the water. The great area of the hulls, 10,000 square feet each, gives the barge buoyancy. The top of the hulls is also perfectly flat, the only curve being the memory being the six bulges and the little frame houses at the bow and at the stern. The forward curve of the stern steering apparatus and the other the rudder for the crew.

The boat which will be the engine of this river train has been built at Carondelet. There is not another such boat on any river. It is a whaleback just like the barge save that it is equipped with powerful propelling machinery and a pair of twin screws each eight feet in diameter. The engines are of 1,500 horsepower, and running alone at the beam in the speediest craft on the Mississippi, being equivalent of going down stream at the rate of 20 miles an hour. The pilot of the engine will steer his own boat out of the current of the first large behind there is another pilothouse and a second pilot and so on the third boat, each equipped with his own credit and ability to steer.
