### THE POTENCY OF PROSPERITY.

(American Demos.)

In 1900, as in 1866, the people of the United States have said in unmistakable terms that of the two, they prefer "open mills" to "open mints." Experience has made them only more sure that they were before that they began at the right end of the industrial line when they declared that the basis of wealth was work and that the surest way, the only way, to bring prosperity to the country was to give employment to the American people and to make the people of this country producers as well as consumers. The Dingley law, by assuring American manufacturers of the American market, opened American factories and set American laborers at work producing American goods and thereby creating American wealth. The money which had lain idle during the industrial paralysis of Free-Trade days went out once more into circulation to pay for the labor, and, in time, passed through the pockets of capitalists, factory employees, farmers, storekeepers, clerks, teachers, everybody, bringing to everybody the necessities, the comforts, even the luxuries of life.

The American people have learned from experience during the last four years what protection can do in the way of changing idleness into bustling activity and of transmitting poverty and hardship into plenty and prosperity. It is an experience which they were not willing to have come to an end, for whatever reason assigned for it, the fact is that the great body of voters who cast their ballots for McKinley and Roosevelt on November 6 voted that way because they wanted a continuance of the prosperity which came in with the Dingley law. The American voter sees nothing sordid in a full dinner pail, however Mr. Bryan may regard it.

HIS APPOINTMENT WOULD PLEASE ALL.

Hon. Chase S. Osborn, the present state railroad commissioner has given such universal satisfaction and has performed the duties of his office in such a business-man-like manner that his thousands of friends throughout the state hope that Governor elect Bliss will decide to re-appoint him. That his friends are not all located in the upper peninsula, we reproduce the following from a recent issue of the Mair, Tribune:

"The story that Governor-elect Bliss is to re-appoint Railroad Commissioner Osborn circulates with a persistence that warrants one giving it a certain degree of credence. Certain it is, the State of Michigan never in its history had a more capable railroad commissioner, or one who brought to the office such executive ability as that possessed by Chase S. Osborn. Bliss a more faithful and enthusiastic friend and supporter in the campaign just closed than Mr. Osborn pointed would give to the state the continued services of one of the most conscientious gentlemen who ever held public office."

## EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Iron River Reporter is now issued as a six column quarto instead of five as heretofore. We are pleased to note this indication of prosperity upon the part of the Reporter and its genial editor, Hon. Patrick O'Brien.

A protective tariff does not make trusts. They are common in free trade countries. There is no tariff on oil and yet the oil trust is very big and very rich. But if the price of oil is made too high the trust will lose by its own greed. Greed never wins.

When a man in a country town is said to make as much as \$2 a day people begin to devise ways and means to pull him down a peg. And yet it is always plain that the more a man makes the more he spends. With that theory in view why not help each other to make more money instead of less?

Although Mackinac county has been redeemed—giving a substantial Republican majority for the first time in its history, there were no union Thanksgiving services held at St. Ignace yesterday. Too much to be thankful for this year to miss observing the day.

How mean it is for Bryan and his followers to intimate that McKinley won because "he had the most money." Thousands of honest men do not fail to resent such unpardonable slander. And the Bryan party gains nothing by that sort of thing. The American elections are for the most part fairly and honestly conducted. Mr. Bryan has twice been defeated and each time he has had the nerve to attribute his defeat to the "not having enough money on his side." Think of that sort of man standing for the presidency of America.

What has become of the Sultan of Sulu argument. It has evidently joined the imperialistic bugaboo.

If the basis of representation in congress under the new census is made, as is now proposed, 198,000 of population to the district formed out of the upper peninsula counties and the balance will go into a district composed jointly of upper and lower peninsula counties. Should that happen the counties of this peninsula which will be made part of the composite district will probably be Chippewa, Mackinac, Schoolcraft, Luce, Delta and Alger. Taking out these counties would leave those remaining with something more than the population which it is proposed to make the basic unit in arranging the new allotment of members. Such an arrangement would not be pleasing to the people of this peninsula, but if the basis suggested is adopted we don't see how that division of the upper peninsula counties, or something very similar to it can be avoided.—Mining Journal.

It is pretty well settled that the new apportionment of members of congress will be on the basis of a population of 198,000 to the district as an allotment of members between the states on that basis will not cut down the representation of any of them, while increasing that of some in which there has been a considerable gain of inhabitants since the last federal enumeration was made. If that is the basis adopted the upper peninsula may cease to be a congressional district all alone by itself, and the present allotment of the elements in the Republican party up here which are not in warm accord will have to be readjusted to meet new conditions. If Chippewa county goes into a district partly composed of lower peninsula counties the effect on the congression aspirations of Hon. Chase S. Osborn will furnish a subject for study and discussion during the next year. He would, in such an event, indisputably have the upper peninsula counties of the district of which Chippewa would then be a part solidly backing him, but as the other end of it would be the larger upper peninsula appenage to the new district might find some difficulty in wagging the greater section of it.—Mining Journal.

Seeing the futility of any member of the legislature securing the speakership Mr. McCallum has withdrawn from the race. As Lieut.-Governor Robinson of the upper peninsula, by virtue of his official position, appoints the committees in the senate it is hardly to be expected that the legislature would elect a speaker from the same section.

If the legislature will so amend the game laws as to prohibit the selling of venison, reduce the number of coupons on the license to two, and compel the hunters to purchase licenses in the counties where they do their hunting, said hunters will be compelled to prove their loyalty by affidavit in front of the clerk of the counties in which they reside before license is granted them, then the law will be well nigh perfect, says an old upper peninsula hunter, who believes in preserving the noble game for a few years at least.

Young Englishmen Who Keep Up the Paternal Pace.

**DEAD VANTAGES OF GREAT NAMES.**

**How Herbert Gladstone and Austin Chamberlain Are Getting Along in the World—Career of Winston Churchill—Lord Roberts' Loss.**

If a man intends to become great in his profession, he should not usually when selecting a father choose one who has attained eminence in the same line. The world is far too apt to regard the sons of great men as nobodies, notwithstanding the many exceptions in history. Besides, the work of the son, if done in the same field as that of his great father, is very often compared with that of his, and to his disadvantage. In spite of these handicaps, however, there is quite a large number of comparatively young men in England today who have achieved success in the same line as their eminent fathers.

The fields in which these young men are laboring are many and varied. They range from theology to soldiering. From the stage to statesmanship. In one case, that of Winston Churchill, the son of Lord Randolph Churchill and his American wife, military and civil glory are combined, for this young man of 25 is at once soldier, politician, war correspondent, novelist and now member of parliament. He comes by his political ability honestly, for his late father was accounted one of the shrewdest parliamentarians of Great Britain.

If the average American were asked to name an English politician, the chances are that Austin Chamberlain would be selected. This remarkably sturdied English colonial secretary has a son who is the youngest member of the cabinet in his apparatus, manner and, one might almost say, in ability. The Hon. J. Austen Chamberlain is the oldest son of the Chamberlains by his first wife, and is 30 years of age.
