IS GOOD ALL ROUND.

The transfer of the Munsing Mining and Iron Property to the Cleveland-Cliffs Company will benefit Munising. A prominent resident of Munising was a visitor in Negaunee yesterday. In a talk with a Mining Journal representative he said that the people of that town are well satisfied with the transfer of the Munsing railway to the Cleveland-Cliffs company. The change he said, has noticeably stiffened the price of real estate at Munising. The business men and others are feeling that the improvement to be made, with the additional new company will work in and about Munising, will mean a great deal for the town.

The gentlemen stated that a deal had recently been closed whereby the Cleveland-Cliffs company because owners of Grand Island, the beautiful spot on a short distance from the town. He said it was removed after the Munsing that the company would likely make a pleasure resort out of it. It is his opinion, he remarked the place will be most attractive and will be the means of bringing quite a number of tourists to the town in years to come.

The purchase of the timber in and about Munising has caused the price of hardwood to advance considerably. The Cleveland-Cliffs people are investing a vast amount of money in the available timber, practically buying up everything for miles around, even away down in the vicinity of Grand Marais.

Many of the people of Munising have had few firewood for some time. All they have had to do is go out and cut it and no one interfered with them. It is expected that this will end as it is too likely that the new owners of the timber will care to have it taken away in that manner, especially since they will want to use it themselves before long—Mining Journal.

WHITE GETS TEN YEARS IN PRISON.

Lawrence, Dec. 3.—Gen. William L. White, of Grand Rapids, today pleaded guilty to a charge of complicity in the state military clothing frauds and was sentenced to 10 years in prison. Gen. White was quartermaster general of the Michigan National Guard and the legislature placed a half million dollar war fund at his disposal to equip Michigan troops for battle. He was implicated in a military clothing deal with Gen. March, Col. Sutton and the Henderson Asset Company of Kalamazoo, by which the state was robbed of \$38,000. When the grand jury at Lansing last December found an indictment against him he disappeared, while Sutton and March, it is indicated, remained to face the music.

CHICAGO HUNTERS WILL BUY CHAMBERS' ISLAND.

A Menominee dispatch says: Col. James Jacobs and a party of Chicago capitalists have about closed a deal for the purchase of Chambers Island from the Wisconsin Chair Co. The island is in Green bay, about 18 miles east of this city. The wealthy Chicagoans intend to convert the island into a game reserve, and expect to expend \$35,000 or more in the construction of a club house and otherwise improving the property. The island comprises several thousand acres of land, mostly timbered, and deer are very numerous. The present owners have man employed the year-round to keep hunters away. A strict surveillance has been maintained for several years and as a result it is regarded as a game reserve.

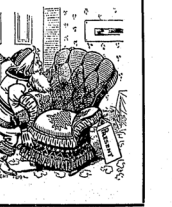
