#### JAIL BIRDS ESCAPED BUT WERE RECAPTURED.

#### OREN FILES A PROTEST.

Attorney General objects to Blanking Out of this State.

A Lansing dispatch dated Dec. 11th says: Attorney General Oren this afternoon filed in the supreme court a demurrer to the plea of Gen. A. P. Marsh—who was pardoned a week ago by Governor Pinger while his appeal from his conviction in the circuit court on the charge of complicity in the state military funds was pending—the said plea being for dismissal of the case against him and the discharge of himself and his bondsman. Mr. Oren claims that a plea based on pardon only is insufficient. The demurrer alleges that the par-

den is void because it was not applied for through the state pardon board and, further, because there is no machinery to take Marsh into custody again in case of refusal on his part to pay the \$5,000 fine imposed by Gov. Pinger as a condition to the pardon. The demurrer alleges, further, that if the pardon and conditions are valid, it is necessary for the circuit judge to present to sentence before it can be come operative, as at present there is no sentence for it to operate on.

#### Transplant of Forest Trees.

Mr. Geo. Nicholson has beautified his lawn by planting thereon a half dozen large pine trees which were brought from the forest with the ground about the roots intact. A great deal of interest is being manifested in Mr. Nicholson's experiment and if it is successful, no doubt a great number of trees will be transplanted next winter. 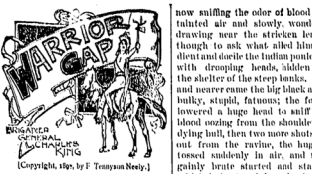

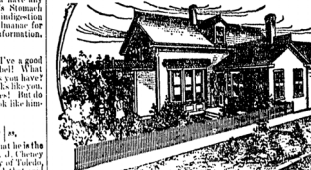
