LIGHT VOTE POLLED.

FEW CONTESTS WERE ON FOR THAT REASON THAT THERE WAS NOT AS LARGE A POLLED.

AN EXCELLENT BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ELECTED.

Owing to lack of interest as the result of lack of contesting tickets the election last Monday was a very quiet one in the city, and in many of the townships.

Aside from a contest in the First ward, and the slip run of Joseph Scott for clerk, the election in the city of Manistique was devoid of excitement, and Mr. W. F. Crane and the entire Republican city and ward tickets were elected without serious opposition.

There were opposing tickets in Inwood, Hiawatha, Depue and Germantask townships. While in the remaining townships there was but one ticket.

The following supervisors were elected: First ward—W. O. Bronson. Second ward—Geo. McClarrin. Third ward—O. C. Bowen. Fourth ward—J. H. McCullin.

Manistique twp.—Granville Snow. Hiawatha twp.—Frank Althoff. Harrison twp.—A. Crover. Thompson twp.—H. D. Norris. Inwood twp.—Milton Williams.

Germantask twp.—Jno. Brain. Doyle twp.—Jung Street. Seney twp.—James Harcourt.

The state and county tickets received majorities approximating 500. Owing to the fact that the returns are not all at hand the actual figures are not obtainable. The amendments were carried by a small majority.

The third ward will be represented by Dr. O. C. Howen who has been president of the village and supervisor of Manistique township whenever he felt like having the offices. He is popular and efficient.

J. H. McCallum the fourth ward supervisor has had much experience as a supervisor. He is a good business man and will no doubt be one of the most influential members of the board.

Frank Aldrich of Hiawatha township, and Granville Snow of Manistique township, are prominent farmers, and are the possessors of good sound judgment.

B. A. Craver who has served Harrison township for several years, is a young man of sterling worth.

H. D. Norris the manager of the F. & F. Co. of Thompson, will represent Thompson township on the board this year. We doubt if the voters of that township could have made a better selection.

The third ward will have the largest representation in the next city convention. On a basis of one delegate for every fifty votes or moiety thereof it will have five votes. The fourth ward will have four and the first and second wards will each have three votes.

STILL A SECRET

TENOR OF AGUINALDO'S MANIFESTO TO FILIPINOS NOT YET DIVULGED.

ITS PREPARATION CONTINUES

Insurgent Leader Has the Assistance of Chief Justice Arellano and General MacArthur's Secretary in Drawing Up the Document—Is Said to Realize the Futility of Further Resistance Against the Americans.

Manila, April 6.—Aguinaldo has the assistance of Chief Justice Arellano and of Mr. Fisher, General MacArthur's private secretary, in preparing his manifesto. The work is not completed and the tenor of its contents is not divulged.

ROOT DENIES THEM.

Says Stories About Aguinaldo Coming to America Are Baseless.—Washington, April 6.—The president and Secretary Hay were in conference for almost an hour during the morning. Secretary Root was present a portion of the time. The subject of the consultation was not disclosed, although it was rumored that it related to the Chinese situation. Secretary Hay stated that the government had no official advice confirming the news reports that China had definitely refused to sign the Manchurian agreement with Russia. Secretary Root pronounced the stories that Aguinaldo had been invited to come or that he was coming to the United States in the immediate future, to be baseless. After the secretary of state and the secretary of war had departed, Mr. Paucot, the British ambassador, called at the White House, was received by the president in the blue parlor. The official explanation of the British ambassador's visit, given by the White House, was that he called to present the acknowledgment of the British government for the expressions of condolence on the death of Queen Victoria.

REPAIRING THE IOWA.

Big Battleship Has Gone Into Dry Dock at Bremerton. Bremerton, Wash., April 6.—The battleship Iowa arrived at the navy yard with Admiral Cressy, commander-in-chief of the Pacific squadron, on board. All the preliminary work in connection with docking the big ship has been completed and the vessel docked.

COMBINE THEIR FORCES.

English Competitors to Fight American Competition. New York, April 6.—A dispatch to The Tribune from London says: It is officially announced that the Thames Iron Works, shipbuilding and engineering company and the British Electric Engineering company are to combine their forces in order to fight the competition of the American companies in the British market. The immediate consequence of the formation of this British trust is that designs have already been prepared for electrical equipment of two underground railway lines of London and the construction of another one.
