## EXTRA! PRES. MCKINLEY ASSASSINATED

### Was Fatally Shot While on the Pan-American Grounds This Afternoon.

### ASSASSIN TORN TO PIECES BY THE PEOPLE

Shortly after the regular edition of this paper was issued this afternoon, telegrams were received announcing that President McKinley had been assassinated on the Pan American grounds.

The dispatches give no details. It seems incredible that there existed a man so base as to be guilty of committing so terrible a crime, and the spectators who literally tore him to pieces showed the true spirit.

The dispatch also stated that the enraged spectators tore the assassin to pieces.

While holding a reception, another dispatch states, the assassin shook hands with President McKinley and then shot him twice.

A later dispatch from Marquette confirms the report and states that the President died at 3:30 o'clock.

#### CHICAGOAN FOUND IN CANAL.

Albert Patterson, a Traveling Agent, is believed to have drowned himself at Indianapolis.

The Chicago Tribune of Friday last week, publishes the following dispatch which may interest Manistiquians. Mr. Patterson lived in Manistique about a year ago. The theatrical company of which he was at the head stranded at Newberry, and he and several of the members reached Manistique where they remained for some time. The dispatch follows:

The body of a man found in the canal this evening has been identified as Albert Patterson, a traveling agent for a Chicago firm manufacturing advertising novelties. In a note found with his name with the three address 3700 Ellis avenue.

The body was found by boys, and was weighted down by a heavy stone tied to the neck with a cord and lay in the canal. He had been in the canal for some time, as the boys immediately after receiving and reading a letter, and was not seen again.

Today a telegram was received from a Mrs. Patterson at Manistique, Mich., asking for Patterson's whereabouts.

He had run short of funds, and told the hotel clerk he had written to his mother for money. The letter was received on Tuesday evening, is believed to have been the reply. After reading it he is supposed to have weighted himself with rocks and jumped into the canal.

Albert Patterson boarded at 3700 Ellis avenue for a long time, but left two months ago to take the agency for a patent floor sign. With this he traveled about through the Middle West.

Patterson, according to his former fellow roomers, who think he was the man whose body is mentioned in the foregoing dispatch, always was despondent. He was for many years the advance agent of concert companies and his wife now lives at Manistique, Ill., and carries a sign name of Ella Carr.

Patterson was about 42 years of age, but wore an artificial and high deep lines in his face and gave him the appearance of an older man. He was without money for many months and this worried him. The boarding-house keeper received a letter from him a few days ago which had such a sad tone she knew he was in trouble. He is not known to have any relatives in Chicago.
