LOSES LEFT HAND.

MARTIN PHARA'S LEFT HAND SHATTERED BY ACCIDENTAL DISCHARGE OF GUN.

WAS AMPUTATED AT THE WRIST

Accident Occurred Near Garnett, Last Friday, While He was Riding in a Buggy Over Rough Road.

Martin Phara, while hunting in the vicinity of Garnett, Mich. Friday, met with an accident which resulted in the amputation of his left hand.

He, accompanied by Deputy Agent McCullough and John Quinan, was hunting for partridge about eight miles from Garnett, when the accident occurred.

The gentlemen were riding in a buggy at the time, McCullough and Quinan were sitting on the seat while Phara was standing up behind them. The buggy passed over a log which caused the gun to fall out, and at the instant he caught the muzzle the trigger evidently struck the axle-tree or buggy spring. The charge of shot instantly mangled the inside of the hand and splintered the bone of the forearm.

Just prior to the accident, Martin had leaped from the wagon and shot two birds and when the third shot was heard his companions thought he had bagged another bird. This idea was quickly dissipated when Martin exclaimed that he was shot. The fracture and at first he thought that he was wounded in the head also.

He was taken to Garnett, where Dr. Tucker dressed the wound temporarily, and he reached home on the 3 o'clock train. The accident occurred shortly after 12 o'clock and his sufferings must have been acute during the six or more hours which elapsed before the amputation was made.

He was taken to the Manistique Hospital where Dr. Raines assisted by Drs. Cole and Settler, amputated the hand a little above the wrist joint. As Martin is left-handed, he virtually lost his right arm, and when he is able to resume his business he will be more seriously handicapped than he otherwise would be.

Mr. McCullough says that this is the first time in eighteen years that he has gone to the woods, and after the experience of last Friday he thinks that it will be at least that length of time before he goes again.

ARBITRATION REPORT.

Organization Helps in the Plans of Employers and Employees Lead to Agreement.

Washington, Oct. 19.-The industrial commission has made public its report on labor disputes and arbitration. It is a comprehensive document, reviewing the testimony of the witnesses who have appeared before the commission...

Long terms of collective bargaining and agreements between employers, and the building trade, the brewery, book and shoe, making, wool-working and metal-working, and other branches of the clothing trade and the transportation business in other words, where both employers and employees are most strongly organized...

A growing movement is noted toward establishing state and local machinery for arbitration and conciliation in labor disputes, where there is no, or at least in most mining districts, no effective method of disposing of the minor disputes, which arise from time to time.

The report states that the board of arbitration for doing much toward furthering industrial peace.

Legislation establishing compulsory arbitration has been enacted in New Zealand and West Australia, where the labor is far reaching. The representatives of employers and workmen who testified before the commission almost uniformly opposed compulsory arbitration.
