He believes in troubling as little as possible the weary grades with disciplinary remarks; he believes in giving recess as he believes the old fashioned teacher has done all over passed a rigid examination and received a certificate, the same should be good for life. SALSBUARY QUITE SURE

Has No Doubt That He Will Acquit of the Alleged Goodly.

MAKES A SOLEMN AFFIRMATION

That He Had Nothing to Do With That \$100,000-Fund Play Suspect—State Miscellany.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 25.—After an arraignment of Mayor George H. Perry by Prosecutor Ward during cross-examination in the waterworks hoax case the mayor was turned over to Senator George E. Nichols for further examination. He was asked if he had used any of the \$100,000 fund for his own personal benefit. He replied: "Not one penny."

Another interesting witness was "Deacon" Ellis, who was asked if he had paid Lant K. Salisbury any money during the last holiday. He said that he owed Salisbury \$1,000 on a wheat deal; that he had paid him two \$1,000 bills. He was asked how he came to pay \$2,000 when he owed only \$1,000. He said that Salisbury had \$1,000 in cash with him to see whether he would give him \$1,000 even if he owed \$2,000, and that Salisbury was a man who lost and found.

A witness who was kept on the stand a long while was Henry A.
