AN IMPORTANT MINING DEAL.

Messrs. Hubbell and Merritt Dispose of Valuable Iron Ore Lands for \$125,000.

(Dubuht Exchange)

An important fee mining transaction has just been concluded in the east through the Belton Mountain Iron company, of Duluth, which is controlled by Albert C. Hubbell and Thomas A. Merritt. The company has an option to purchase the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter and the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter of 10-56-16, near Mountain Iron, for \$60,000, and is reported from a reliable source that Messrs Hubbell and Merritt have sold the property for \$125,000, so some rumour concern that up to this time had not been represented as a mine operator on the Minnesota range. Both Mr. Hubbell and Mr. Merritt were asked for further information on the subject last night, but they declined to announce the name of the purchaser, though they did not deny that a deal had been made.

The property is known as the Jeffrey mine, and adjoins the Wacouta, controlled by the LaBelle Iron company, of Stambouville, O. Messrs. Merritt and Hubbell obtained an option on the property several months ago, and began a thorough development of it. It is said that the deposit on this property is a part of the same general deposit that underlies the Wacouta, and its extent is believed to be not less than 5,000,000 tons, all merchantable ore. It is reported that the Jeffrey mine is one of the last few propositions on the market, as far as the Mesaba range is concerned, as Thomas A. Merritt is also exploring for iron ore on the lands of the Mesaba, Iron and Oliver Iron Mining company at one time held an option for a lease on it, but after a certain amount of exploration they abandoned it.

Among the few owners of the Jeffrey mine are T. C. Heinbaugh, C. W. Swanson, L. E. Markin, Nellie M. French, E. and M. Jeffrey, C. H. Martz, H. H. Phelps, of Duluth, and others.

They have held the property since about 1891, and all of them will realize substantial returns for the money invested, as well as the Belton Mountain Iron company, which buys the property from them and sells it to an eastern concern.

Better Get In.

John H. Hill, President of The Island Falls Mines Co. Ltd. writes from West Superior that he has just returned from Fort Arthur, Ontario,

after a very rough voyage on Lake Superior, on account of heavy storms; having been most successful in obtaining control of the outstanding interest in the two rich gold locations on the Day vein at Sturgeon Lake. He states that he also secured several other rich locations, the particulars of which will be announced later.

In Mr. Hill's estimation, the value of the stock has increased at least 25 cents per share as the result of this accomplishment and predicts that the stock of the Island Falls Company will be sought for in the market within two years at several dollars per share.

As soon as these matters have been fully cared for, it is Mr. Hill's intention to go north again in connection with additional gold claims in the richest gold district yet discovered in Ontario, in the interest of the company—Sagannaba Journal.
