### To Retail Dealers in Tobacco, etc.

Complain has been made to the Board of Education of the City of Manistowish that the practice of using cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, etc., is becoming somewhat prevalent among the youth of our schools.

As the use of tobacco in any form is particularly injurious to the student and interferes in a large degree with good work in the schools, it is the desire of the officers and teachers to end such practice.

It is difficult to accomplish this result without the assistance of the parents and the co-operation of the local dealers in tobacco, etc.

In the interest of the Public Schools of our city we sincerely trust that you will assist the Superintendent and teachers in this matter by strictly complying with the provisions of the law forbidding the sale of tobacco, etc., to minors.

The following is a copy of the law in question:

SECTION 1. The people of the State of Michigan enact: That it shall not be lawful for any person by himself, his clerk or agent, to sell, give or furnish any cigar, cigarette, cheroot, chewing or smoking tobacco, or tobacco in any form whatsoever, to any minor under seventeen years of age, unless upon the written order of the parent or guardian of said minor. Successors in. Any person who shall willfully violate any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail for a term of not less than ten days nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

All violations of the law as above quoted will hereafter be reported to the Prosecuting Attorney for proper action.

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 16. Dr. C. L. Wilbur, chief of the division of vital statistics in the state department, has returned from Detroit, and says where he made a preliminary investigation into the failure to register the deaths that occurred at the collision on the Wabash railroad near Seara.

Disposition of the Bodies. Of all the bodies sent to Adrian only five certificates were filed with the state department. The remaining certificates issued by the city clerk of Adrian for the removal of interred bodies.

That the Will of the Deceased. Dr. Wilbur does not now give his own estimate of the number killed, but says: "With the testimony of the survivors as to the death of acquaintances or friends in the wreck, and the reports from relatives in Detroit asking for information in regard to missing individuals, an approximate statement of the number of deaths may be given in time."

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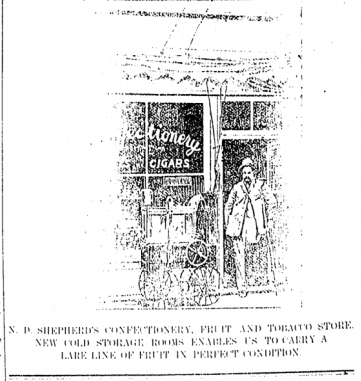
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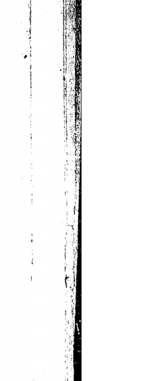
