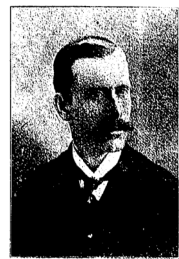

## CITY CONVENTION.

Mayor Crane, Clerk Dufrstrom and Treasurer Bowen re-nominated.

## VOTE PRACTICALLY UNANIMOUS

The ticket will have no opposition as it has been so long established. The Republican city convention was held in the city building last Monday evening. The convention was called to order by Committee man MacNanghton who read the call for the convention. He was elected permanent chairman of the convention and has R. Or, secretary.

The committee reported that the following persons were entitled to seats in the convention: First ward—John Peterson, John Blomquist and Axel Olsen. Second ward—Lewie Schuster and Geo. Miller. Third ward—E. E. Burrell, G. H. Orr, I. S. Phippey, J. H. MacNanghton and W. H. McMillen. Fourth ward—Martin Johnson, I. C. McKesson and Jno. Loos. Upon motion the chair appointed John Loos and John Peterson as tellers. The officers were then sworn by R. W. Thompson. Motion prevailed that an informal

bullet be taken for mayor. Crane receiving twelve of the thirteen votes cast, the informal ballot was made formal and Mr. Crane was declared the winner.

For clerk Alfred Dufrstrom received twelve of the thirteen votes. As a result of the election, Mr. Dufrstrom was re-nominated by a unanimous vote.

Geo. E. Holden, J. H. MacNanghton and I. S. Phippey were unanimously chosen as the city committee for the ensuing year. The nominations made by this convention are entirely satisfactory to the majority of the Republicans of the city and that they will be elected it is unnecessary to add.

Mr. Crane served the village as president, the year previous to its incorporation as a city. He did his work so well that he was elected as first mayor of the city, and his well-liked nomination for a second term is a high tribute to his efficiency and ability as an official. When he took charge of the city's affairs a debt of \$8,000, the legacy of previous administrations, confronted him. He determined to wipe that out and he did so, without materially increasing the taxes of the city. During his tenure many improvements have been made, and the efficiency and equipment of the fire department greatly increased. He has always had the best interests of the city at heart. Being human he is not infallible. He no doubt has made mistakes, but he has done his whole duty as he saw it.

Alfred Dufrstrom who was re-nominated city clerk is a quiet, unassuming, and industrious official. He has attended to his official duties during the past year in such a manner as to win the esteem of all with whom he has come in contact and his well-earned unanimous majority shows that he is a member of the ward committee.

Mr. O. A. Bowen who has served one year as city treasurer, deserved the unanimous re-nomination he received. He is the personification of honesty and efficiency. Such an official should be retained for the year if that were possible.

## WERE QUITE SULTRY

The Republican Ward Conferences Were Held Last Friday Evening.

## ALL PARTIES PARTICIPATED

The Societies Will Have No Opposition in the Falls.

The Republican caucuses were very largely attended last Friday evening, and participated in by all the voters regardless of party affiliations. A number of warm contests developed in the several wards, and upon the whole the nominations made are satisfactory to the people, and the tickets will be elected. Below we give a summary of the various caucuses.

W. C. Benson and John Peterson were placed in nomination for second delegate, Peterson won out receiving 87 of the 120 votes cast.

Jno. Blomquist and D. J. Ward were placed in nomination for third delegate and Blomquist was elected, receiving 98 or the 125 votes cast.

Dr. A. E. Burdick, Harry Adams and James Norton were chosen as members of the ward committee.

The thirty-six Manistiguans who were at Marquette last week visited the branch prison, last Saturday morning. Warden Frooman, Deputy Warden Mosher and the guards were very kind to the visitors and conducted them through the various buildings and gave much valuable information as to the conduct of the institution.

The visitor is impressed with the average size of the inmates. The majority of the men are less than thirty years of age. The floors and long term men work in the cigar factory while the short termers work in the overall factory. Laundry, kitchen and printing outfits.

Holzay who is serving a five-month term and who is librarian of the prison, attracted their attention. Since his escape in which he attempted to kill a guard at which time a guard disabled him by shooting off the fingers that grasped a knife, he has been a model prisoner.

Some of the cells look very neat. Noted one who whose walls were covered with pictures. A photograph labeled, baby occupied a prominent place on the table. 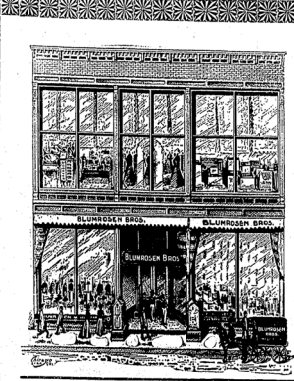
