TWO ACCIDENTS.

Frank Fitzpatrick of Thompson, and Benj. Cook of South Manistique, injured by trains.

FITZPATRICK BADLY INJURED

In both between the cars, and received injuries to limbs, also fractures of his forearm.

Frank Fitzpatrick of Thompson, an employee of the F. & P. Lumber Co., was badly injured on Monday, when Peterson's camp in Harrison township, Fitzpatrick had recently been employed as brakeman on one of the logging trains of the company, and while the train was backing up from the Y to the slide ways, Fitzpatrick was riding on the rear car. When near Peterson's camp he noticed a large log lying between the rails, and fearing that if the cars should run over the animal the train would be derailed, he stood up and by waving his hand he sought to clear the log from the track, at the same time, giving Bangs near Lewis House a signal to stop. The engine at once reversed the engine, and Fitzpatrick was thrown down between the cars, resulting in serious injury to both legs, back, and sustained internal injuries of a serious nature. He was brought to the Manistique Hospital on Tuesday, where he was attended by Drs. Reinhold and Cole. The young man's is a very critical condition, and the chances of recovery are considered by the physicians to be very slight.

Benjamin Cook of South Manistique, a workman on the M. M. & N., was with a quite serious accident yesterday, while coupling cars, near Camp 00. Cook was compiling the chassis to the train and was thrown to the track, the wheels of the car passing over his head, which was quite badly crushed, and the ankle injured. He was brought home at once, and Dr. Cole called to attend him.
