YOUNG RENOMINATED

Was the Unanimous Choice of the Congressional Convention.

GEORGE M. MC CALLUM MADE NOMINATION.

The Twelfth district congressional election was held at Marquette last Saturday and unlike many of its predecessors was as harmonious as a church.

The renomination of our present able congressman, Hon. H. Olin Young was conceded by all months ago and the convention merely ratified and ratified the sentiment that had been circulating during the past two years.

Mr. O. C. Davidson, chairman of the district committee called the convention to order, and Ira C. Jennings of Escanaba was unanimously chosen temporary chairman, and Robert H. Shields of Houghton was named for secretary.

A committee on credentials consisting of G. C. Bentley, Gus Smith, Wm. Webster, M. J. Kern and R. A. Douglas was appointed by the chair, as was also a committee on resolutions consisting of N. W. Haire, D. W. Powell and W. J. Galbraith.

Resolved, That we commend the Republican policy of judicious and liberal appropriations for the improvement of our great waterways and harbors, and call the attention of congress to the necessity for the early building of a new lock at the St. Mary's Ship Canal, which will soon be demanded by the rapidly growing commerce.

Resolved, That the protective tariff policy of the Republican party has largely contributed to make the United States the greatest industrial nation of the world and advanced labor to the best scale of living ever attained.

Resolved, That we heartily commend the wise, prudent, far-sighted and judicious administration of Theodore Roosevelt under whose direction the laws of the land, made for all alike, have proved strong enough to restrain the mightiest as well as the humblest citizen of the republic.

Resolved, That we recognize the ability and endurance of the course of Hon. H. O. Young, our representative in congress, during his term of service. We find in him an earnest, hard working official, whose efforts at all times are to promote the best interests of his district of the country at large, one always found at his post of duty, who commands and holds the confidence and respect, not alone of his colleagues in congress assembled—but of international reputation—of the humblest voter of his district, irrespective of party affiliation.

Whether Manistique will cease to be the terminus of the car ferry route, as rumors have it that Lindington will be the trans-lake terminus in the future.

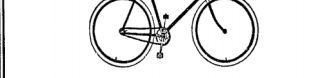

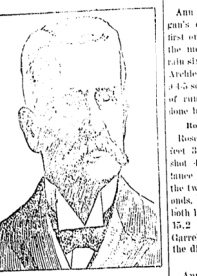
