### Salisbury Tells Court How Ho and His Pals Expected to Get a Big Wad.

## THEN TELL ALL TO THE COUNCIL

### Hay City Prosecutor's View of Ammonite Mayor of Negatives Given Up as Lost.

Grand Rapids, Mich., May 28.—In the trial of Mayor Eugene D. Cooper, of the Grand Rapids Herald, the cross-examination of City Attorney Salisbury was continued. The defense went particularly into the details of Salisbury's expenditures of \$50,000 out of the money in Salisbury's hands, in an attempt to show that all the money in Salisbury's hands was used for other purposes than to bribe Cooper.

Outdoors Were in Sable. In going over the wad of \$50,000 Salisbury said the purpose was to get the money out of outsiders, but that no one was to get a cent. He said the scheme was to get \$250,000 out of the citizens of Grand Rapids, and the same amount of the Hydraulic company, of Grand Rapids. Of a Milwaukee firm \$50,000 was expected; \$50,000 was gotten from the Harlow in Chicago; \$250,000 more in bonds was expected.

Novel Feature of the Scheme. "Then you had deals agreeing about a million dollars, and did not expect to give a cent to Salisbury?" Salisbury was asked. "Yes, that is what we planned. We expected, after we got all the money, to give it to the council and let the whole story, and then if the people wanted us to resign we would, and if they didn't we would keep on." The court, at this point, adjourned for the day.

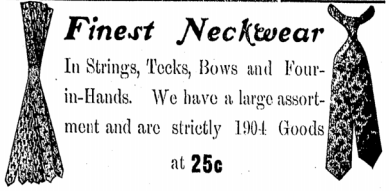

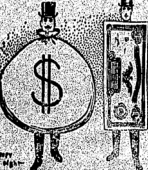
