HIS LIFE ATTEMPTED

Prosecuting Attorney H. B. Freeman of Alger County, Shot Down By an Insane FELLOW IS DOUBTLESS INSANE

Was Shot in the Back Without Warning As He Entered a Room

The following concerning the attempt on the life of Attorney Freeman, of Alger County, which occurred in the Manistique Hotel, on Tuesday night, is given in a special issue of our today's issue, many of whom thought the victim of the deed was a man.

H. B. Freeman, prosecuting attorney of Alger County, is lying in a hospital, suffering from a wound, but not a severely fatal bullet wound, inflicted by James Tyler at Manistique last evening.

The attack on Mr. Freeman was most cowardly and despicable in its nature. He was first shot from behind on the avenue, while walking toward his home in company with his little daughter and son. The first bullet fired from the would-be assassin's revolver took effect in the right shoulder. On hearing the report Mr. Freeman thought that some Fourth of July explosion had been marked against his back. He wheeled about, Tyler fired again, the second bullet entering Freeman's chest just above the hip and beside the nose. It shattered the bone and lacerated his liver, but did not inflict fatal injury. Late last evening the physician here, while not definitely saying that Mr. Freeman was out of danger, said that the probabilities favored his recovery. The wound in his head is unlikely to cause any serious danger, and as far as had been ascertained the bullet which entered behind his left shoulder had not penetrated the lung cavity.

The bloodthirsty attack seems to have been the work of an insane man. Tyler has spent a few years in an asylum, and from all accounts does not appear to be mentally competent. He has been a resident of Manistique, and is known to many people here, but he has not lately lived in this city. It is said that he was recently spent some time at Ishpeming.

Whatever his immediate motive in attacking Mr. Freeman in such a dastardly manner may have been, it appears that he desires revenge for a former injustice explained in a small degree by his cruel deed. His path has crossed with that of Mr. Freeman numerous times of recent years, it appears. He has possessed a homestead near Chatham, and from all accounts has been a bad neighbor to all near whom he has lived. He has been in numerous disputes, and only within the past year or so was involved

ITS PARKS, STREETS AND MILLS

Also Explains Working of Primary Election Law in Manistique.

Mr. Wm. C. Thomson lives a good description of this New Home.

It is now five weeks since I had Manistique friends, and Manistique fare well and the friendships formed in a season of twenty-one years have a strong grasp and will always cling closer than did the sand that I shot from me as I bearded train on May 20th last. Today that I am better pleased with the city of Winona and its surroundings than with Manistique puts it about right.

The "Father of Waters" takes an orderly course here, and the city of Winona, which is over a mile wide and three miles in length, extends along the south side of the river, between two ranges of hills, perhaps 50 feet in height.

The city is named after an Indian maiden, Wee-Na-Nah, that tradition says leapt from a high bluff to her death, rather than to wed a suitor for whom she had no affection. A granite monument erected to her memory, forms the center-piece of a fountain in one of the four parks in the city.

The principal streets are paved with brick which makes a very clean and durable pavement. The streets are shaded with trees just in their prime, principally maple and elm.

There are very many fine residences with vine covered porches and well kept lawns filled with all kinds of ornamental trees, flowers, palms etc., even the boulevard along the streets have flower mounds.

The Love Park is nearly half a mile long and is the most popular resort of any of the parks in the city. All along the south side of this park is an arched walkway with benches and a fountain, and warm afternoons and evenings hundreds of people visit this cool resort and enjoy the sights and get the river breeze. It is at this park where the river steamers land.

Between the city and the hills on the south is Winona Lake which is spanned by highway and street car bridges.

Five railroad lines and the river afford ample transportation for all purposes.

There are flour mills, wagon factories, saw mills and many other industries that help keep up the town. Some of the finest church edifices in the north-west are in Winona. The postoffice is a large stone structure and there is a

in a lawsuit in which Mr. Freeman was counsel for the other side. Mr. Freeman was successful in his conduct of the case. Tyler has been known to be a hard-bitten lawyer toward the prosecutor, and it is reported that he has made threats to "get even" with him.

The revenge theory is borne out by Tyler's remarks on shooting at Freeman. He said in substance, and interspersed with oaths, "You have ruined my life. I'll get even with you."

Freeman, he said, his two children, was accompanied by C. E. Stedden, his brother-in-law. He turned, as noted above, on hearing the first shot and realizing the bullet in his body, only to be hit a second time before he could make a proper retreat. Mr. Stedden, on the second shot and a man as he took in the situation, grappled with Tyler. Mr. Freeman ran away as fast as possible, and with admirable presence of mind sought a carriage. 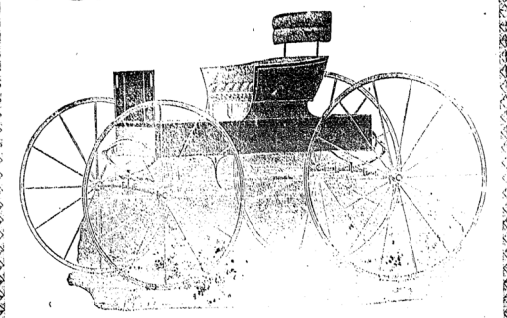
