PLANS FOR YEAR

Sept. Hanson Gives Outline of Work To Be Done This Year.

EXPLAINS COMMERCIAL COURSE

And Gives Assignment of Teachers for the Various Departments.

The long vacation is about ended and the teachers have returned and are ready to begin work on Tuesday.

Again the course of study has been re-considered and a new high school department added. The addition of a Commercial Department makes it possible for our young people to acquire a business education at home. In the course that follows it will be seen that the high school commercial idea is far different than the one advocated by the majority of business colleges. A technical education is good when built upon a good school education but falls when used as a substitute for the subjects given in our high schools.

The aim of this course is carefully fit the student for business as well as educate him along literary lines. In order for a student to get this complete course it will be necessary for him to graduate from the high school.

We would have it distinctly understood that no student will be able to make a decided success in commercial work unless he is educated in the English and Mathematical branches.

By carefully perusing the course it will be found that the ninth grade student will not be allowed to take more than the one unit outline in that year. The other three units must be made up of ninth grade subjects. In any of the other three grades no student will be allowed to take commercial work until he has completed four subjects in the preceding grade. Should graduates of the school desire to take the course they will be allowed to elect as much of the work as they can profitably pursue. Other students who have not been connected with the school for some time will be permitted to take such subjects as their scholarship will allow. Under no conditions, unless the student be a graduate, will be allowed to take only commercial work.

This department will be in charge of Mr. W. E. Baker both a college graduate and a man with office experience. Officers will be fitted up in the school building and the work will be carried on in a thorough business like manner. Parents are cordially urged to visit this department of the public schools.

Mr. L. L. Forsythe A. B. of the University of Mich. will have charge of the high school. He will give instruction in Latin and German.

Miss Clara Stuart Ph. B. of Oberlin College, Ohio will have charge of the English and History work. This will

be Miss Stewart's third year in Music Dept.

Miss Clara Fitzpatrick, a graduate from the U. of M. and for the past two years teacher at Ishpeming, will succeed Miss Young in the Science Department.

Miss Mabel Miller, for the third year will have charge of the music and drawing.

MISTAKE KEEPS LIGHT DARK

No Appropriation for Operating St. Martin's Island Aids.

Although the new lighthouse and fog signal station at St. Martin's Island are now completed and have a full crew, it is not probable that the station will be put into service this season. By some strange oversight, when the appropriation was made by congress, no arrangements were made for the operation of either of the improvements. The light is ready to be lit and the fog whistle is ready to blow and marine men are waiting when they will be able to guide their boats through the channel between the island by St. Martin's light and whistle.

The new lighthouse is a steel tower with a winding stairway to the light on the northeast side of the island. Just out of the old settlement or fishing station and directly across the channel from Gill Island, it marks the best channel that exists through the chain of islands.
