## U. P. EXHIBIT FAIR

Will Be Held at Pontiac Sept. 12 to 16, Inclusive. Preparations Well Along.

### ASSOCIATION IS ACTIVE

Superintendent of Extension, Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station, at Pontiac, Mich.

The fifty-fifth annual fair of the Michigan State Agricultural Society is to be held at Pontiac Sept. 12 to 16, inclusive.

The location of the fair has been formally changed to Detroit, but it was impossible to get the grounds at the state metropolis ready for this fall exhibition as it will be held at Pontiac, where it has been given the past few years. Secretary L. H. Butt writes The Mining Journal that the prospect for an unusually excellent fair are of the best. In addition to the usual exhibits of agricultural and manufactured products of the state there will be a number of new features, among them public sale of live stock, live stock demonstrations in the evening and a state grange headquarters on the grounds.

It is expected to have a representative upper peninsula exhibit at the fair. The officers of the U. P. Agricultural Association are now working to that end. Concerning the farming possibilities of the upper peninsula of Michigan, the following from the state fair bulletin will be of great interest:

It is within a comparatively short period that the upper peninsula of Michigan has been considered of any value for agricultural purposes. It is known, however, that there is much of the country that has rich soil adapted to many varieties of crops. It is particularly a grass and vegetable growing section, while many kinds of fruit flourish. The State Agricultural society has for three years offered prizes for fruits, vegetables and grains in the upper peninsula, and exhibits have each year been sent from there. The most notable exhibits have been from the state experiment station at Chatham, of which L. M. Geismar is superintendent. These exhibits have shown such wonderful growth of various products as astonish the farmers of the southern part of the state.

An association has been formed of those interested in upper peninsula agriculture for the purpose of exhibiting the products of that section at the state fair. Of the proposed action see elsewhere.

The activities of the several land companies during the past year in disposing

of some of their holdings to new settlers have materially assisted in creating a horticultural renaissance of the upper peninsula. The movement organized last spring among a great number of the business men and progressive farmers of the northern part of the state will result in a typical exhibit, calculated to show the great variety of crops which can be successfully grown in the upper peninsula.

The display of grains and forage crops will include samples of timothy, red top, orchard, meadow, oats home and Kern turkey blue grass, as well as alfalfa, several varieties of millet, sorghum, sorgho and flax and clover peas. There will be a good display of grains, including oats, spring and fall wheat, barley, rye, buckwheat, flax, corn, peas, lentils and speltz. The root crops will include a fine collection of potatoes, rutabagas, turnips, carrot onions, beets and radish.

There will be a display of crops not generally seen in cultivation, such as globe artichokes, salsolmas, salsolmas, kohlrabi, collards and sugar beet seed, both ripe and in progress of ripening.

The fruit crop, which is generally good in the upper peninsula this year, will be represented by a good display of apples, pears, grapes and small fruit. The distance and lack of suitable transportation facilities prevent the possibility of an extensive exhibit of stock. L. Van Winkle of Delta county is arranging to exhibit some heads of Aberdeen wethers, which he has bred and raised from seed to some in the United States. Mining Journal.

### TERMINATED FATALLY

Joseph Faucher injured by Soo Line Train Could Not Survive the Shock.

Joseph Faucher, whose home was in Quebec, Canada, and who was run over while attempting to board a moving train near the Soo Line depot last Friday, survived the accident but about three hours later died in the Manistique Hospital about 2 o'clock p. m. A letter from the mother of the young man was found in one of his pockets, in which he was urged to return home, and in which mention was made of two uncles engaged in some manufacturing business, and well to do. The remains were taken in charge by Undertaker Johnson, who wrote the mother asking instructions as to the disposition of the body. A letter received on Wednesday gave instructions to bury the remains, and if any money or valuables were found to send them to his mother. Eight hours longer was found in a "pail" and the remains were laid to rest in Lakeland cemetery Thursday.

## ANOTHER RAILROAD ACCIDENT

This Time on the M. P. & N. Bert Farley Run Over While Switching Cars.

Bert Farley of South Manistique, fireman in the employ of the M. P. & N. Railway, received very serious injuries last Saturday while switching cars at Camp 25.

The train crew were about to make a flying switch of some empty box cars, and Farley was temporarily engaged in changing work with one of the brakemen, attempted to uncouple the cars from the engine, and lost his hold and fell across the rail, two wheels of an empty car passing over both legs.

He was at once placed aboard the locomotive and a recent breaking run was made of nearly a mile a minute from Camp 25 to this city, where he was at once taken to the Manistique hospital, where he rallied from the terrible shock, and it is hoped by the physician in charge, Dr. Cole, that amputation may not be necessary. Farley was married but a month ago, and about a year ago suffered the loss of two fingers. He is a son of Henry Farley of Thompson and is 21 years of age.

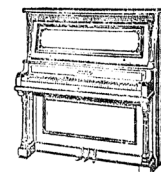

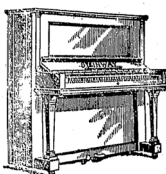

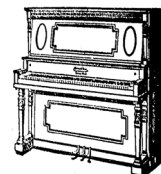
