## WAS KILLED BY TREE

Nicholas Shumiller Killed at Camp 86 Wednesday Evening by Falling Tree.

## HEAD AND SHOULDER CRUSHED

Remains Brought to the City By Doctor Before Last Night.

Nicholas Shumiller, an employe at Scott's camp, was mortally killed by a falling tree Wednesday evening. He was engaged in roustabouting and the tree in question had been partially grubbed out earlier in the day, and when passing it while enroute to camp, fell on him without warning and inflicted fatal injuries. A fellow workman was also struck but not fatally.

The deceased had been an employe at the camp for four years. He is said to have relatives at Marquette and Negaunee, but when Undertaker Nefarwan was at Shingleton yesterday he made a diligent effort to find his relatives at the former place by long distance phone but was unsuccessful. The body was brought to Manistique last evening.

## WENT INSANE

R. P. Melis of Chicago Has Been Placed in Jail for Safe Keeping.

R. P. Melis, a young man who recently arrived in this vicinity from Chicago, has gone insane and is being detained at the county jail. He is said to have come to Manistique a short time ago having shipped through an employment agency. He was employed in one of the camps of the Mother Co. for three weeks, and then came to Manistique where he had been in the employ of the Manistique Light Co. for four days, when his condition became such that he was taken to the county jail. Sheriff Moody found two rifles full of clothing at Manistique which belonged to him, also letters from his mother, living at 414 Lafayette Ave., Chicago, and from New York relatives.

## THOUSANDS OF DEER SLAIN

But State Game Warden Believes Slaughter Was Less Than in 1903.

Complete returns of the sale of deer licenses in Michigan have not been received, but State Game Warden Charles H. Chapman is of the opinion that more hunters tramped the woods than last year, says the Soo News. He believes that not more than 7,000 deer were killed this year, 5,000 of which were shot in the upper peninsula.

Last year 10,000 men went into the woods with licenses to kill deer. Out of this number but forty-five were reported as having killed deer. As near as could be estimated 28,000 deer were killed, 10,000 being shot in the upper peninsula. This year nearly all the counties in the state called for more licenses as the demand was much greater. In the lower peninsula many abandoned their guns and marched to the tall and menaced snows, as having discouraging in many instances.

"I presume the lack of snow had something to do with the result," said Mr. Chapman recently, "but I don't believe that will account for the great difference in the two years." He believes the killing of 28,000 deer last year thinned them out to a considerable extent. "I would naturally expect the extinction of the many animals would affect the supply, and I am not surprised that a number of killed this year has fallen off."

Mr. Chauncey Hinkson of Thompson died last Sunday evening and was buried Tuesday. He was forty-five years of age and leaves a widow and five children, the youngest only a few weeks old. ## AFFAIR OCCURRED MONDAY EVENING

Cooling devices were used to help the aged man, who by the way is nearly eighty years old, recover his injuries. Owing to his age it is feared that fatal results will follow.

The daughter of the injured man states that the town drunk by her father had run away and became entangled in the yard between several obstacles and that her father, in his injuries while assisting in extricating the horses. Others claim that the son attacked his father. The officers are inclined to believe the daughter's version of the affair.

## FOUND NOT GUILTY

Matt Wilson's Slayer So Adjudged in Mackinac County Court.

Circuit court convened last Monday and adjourned Wednesday night. The time was taken up principally with the trial of Thomas Dauman, charged with killing Matt Wilson at Carmichael Junction. Dauman is a work old man nearly 83 years of age and Wilson had made threats against him and had so worked upon the old man's feelings that he stood in great fear of Wilson. On the 19th day of June last after Wilson had thrown a heavy iron ball against the building occupied by the old man as a collar shop and sleeping room, Dauman came out of the door with a gun in his hands and warned Wilson that he would shoot him if he threw the ball again. Wilson threw it once more and the old man fired, hitting him in the back and side, the wound man dying that same night at the Manistique hospital. The jury after careful consideration came to the conclusion that the old man was justified in shooting Wilson and rendered a verdict of not guilty.—St. Ignace Enterprise.

TO PROTECT PATRONS

CANFIELD AND BUCKLIN PLEAD GUILTY TO MAINTAINING A GAMBLING HOUSE.

PROMPTLY FIRED JUD ASY \$2,000

PATRONAGE OF THE PLACE BELONGED TO NEW YORK'S EXCLUSIVE SET.

New York, Dec. 11.—Richard A. Canfield and David Bucklin, proprietors and managers of what is said to be the most exclusive gambling house in the country, were indicted today for maintaining a gambling house at 17 West 125th street.

Canfield and Bucklin were fined \$1,000 each by Judge Cowing. The recommendation for the district attorney, both indicted and fined.

Dock Laborers at Escanaba Having a Busy Time. Over Fifty Thousand Tons Must Go.

Boats representing a larger tonnage than have been at the docks of the North-Western road at one time this season, are now taking on grain at Escanaba. Twelve boats representing a tonnage of 35,000 make up the fleet filling the docks and all of which it is expected will be loaded and ready to leave port this week for the lower lake furnaces, despite the fact that all marine insurance expired on Monday.

Two full crews of dock laborers are loading the boats and the operation is now especially tedious owing to the freezing of the ore in the dock pockets. Hot water furnished from the boats and steam propulsion locomotive are turned together to melt the ice, but even with that aid the work is slow.

On Tuesday evening it was announced by the dock officials that 60,000 tons remainder to be loaded and more boats are expected to take on cargoes.
