DIED SUDDENLY

Mrs. Richard Edwards Dies of Heart Disease Yesterday Morning.

BEEN AILING FOR TWO YEARS

Phonograph Services Will be Held at Woods Chapel Sunday Afternoon.

Mrs. Lillian (Wittor) Edwards died suddenly at the Wittor home about an early hour yesterday morning of organ and heart disease with which she had been afflicted during the past two years. She returned from her second visit to the hospital at Ann Arbor about six weeks ago and was steadily in her usual health up to the moment of her death.

The deceased was born at Presno, N. Y., about thirty-five years ago and was a daughter of the late Andrew H. Wittor of Manistique township, who died in 1891.

She leaves three sons—the eldest five years, and the youngest nine years, who with the husband mourn a true and noble wife and mother. She also leaves six sisters and four brothers. They are Mrs. James Norton of this city; Mrs. Clara Mervin of Doyle township; John L. Wittor of Manistique township; Mrs. W. M. Swinney of Phillips Sta., Pa.; Leo Wittor of Westfield, Pa.; A. J. Wittor of Manistique township; Mrs. James Knaf of Cicada, Mich.; Mrs. Robert Arrowood of Manistique township and Mrs. A. W. Vincent of Blaney, and Charles Wittor of this city.

The funeral was very highly respected by her neighbors as well as by her numerous acquaintances in this city, and her untimely death is one of the most regrettable affairs that has ever occurred in this vicinity.

The funeral services will be held from the Woods Chapel in Doyle township next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. Albert Turbot of the Presbyterian church officiating.

Certainly a sad and long to be remembered Christmas will this be to the many relatives and friends of the deceased.

BOUND OVER TO COURT

John Gallagher Will be Tried on Charge of Murdering His Father, in Circuit Court.

STRONG TESTIMONY PRESENTED

At Preliminary Examination Held Before Judge Knox, Wednesday.

The preliminary hearing of John Gallagher charged with causing the death of his father, Barrett Gallagher, was held in Judge Knox's court Wednesday and the testimony presented was sufficient to warrant the Judge in remanding him to jail to await trial at the January term of the circuit court, and owing to the seriousness of the charge no opportunity for giving bonds was given.

John Gallagher, the slayer of the prisoner, was the principal witness, Sebastian and Geo. Weber and Dr. O. C. Bowen were the other witnesses. The testimony of the three last witnesses was substantially the same as given before the coroner's jury, while Miss Gallagher repudiated the story that her father had been injured by the horse, and stated that John came home drunk and the father was seated in the kitchen smoking a pipe when he heard the horses.

When John came in the father scolded him and they had a quarrel. The old gentleman struck at John and John hit him in the chest and knocked him down. Prior to this the aged man had threatened to go and get the law. The whole story has not been heard as yet but no doubt the adequate points will be articulated in the circuit court.

After an illness of About Three Weeks.

Barthema, wife of Alexander McDonald, died at her home in this city on Thursday last week, at the age of thirty-five years, after a very short illness.
