men who loved and feared God and who loved their fellowmen to practice their religion every day of life. We have never regarded Odd Fellowship as a rival to the church, but on the other hand as one of the best fruits of christian civilization, which ultimately would hasten the charcoles of christianism to earnest effort to make christianity more practical. What I mean by "practical" is a christianity that is practiced every day and in every relation of life. The church has devoted itself too exclusively to starting men on a christian life while neglecting to inspire them with the noble and constant purpose to apply their christian principles to every day life in service.

Odd Fellowship in no sense purports to supplant the church but becomes a strong arm of the church and the Kingdom of God in the measure that it comprehends in these two great purposes for every man: a life of service for every man, and a goodly character for every man.

As the most practical step in realizing such a life, Christ, our great teacher, disclosed the spirit and mind of the man as of first importance. He said, "Love your neighbor as yourself" and "Do unto others as ye would that they should do unto you," and Paul in our text speaks for Christ when he exhorts us, "In love serve one another." It is only when we love from the heart that we can truly serve our fellow-men. We may do some things for their comfort in a perfunctory way—that is as of necessity not cheerfully; but that service will poorly bless the one served and grudgingly bless the one who thus serves. God who made man, with spirit and mind has power to create a new spirit of love in the life of man. What Paul means by love is the text is love to God and love to man. By a personal seeking of God according to the Gospel man receives from God the spirit of love which makes the life of love living service to our fellowmen a natural expression of a real-life love. The outer practical christian life will come from the spirit as freely as the water that gushes in sparkling refreshing streams from the living spring. It is this inner life of the spirit which the church, through the Gospel has been especially concerned in attaining the past and always must have for its chief work. If you are teaching her not and neglecting the training the man and the putting in practice of the best and most cheerful of love to the spirit, christian virtues which happily follow will be but a shadow upon the wall.

If you would attain that nobility of life which your order demands of you and if we all would live that practical godly life which our text urges upon us, we are under the necessity of cultivating the fundamental virtues of christian character. We must cultivate the habit

of loyalty in our friendships. Strive to know how to be a true friend; to help when help is desired; to encourage when the battle of life goes hard, but never give a traitor's aid.

The darkest picture in all history is Judas betraying His Lord with a kiss. Your true friend will never sacrifice for his own personal greed, or ambition. The highest friendship is found when men serve one another in love.

Another virtue which we must possess and which we must cultivate is profound regard for the truth. We should go farther than to simply make it a rule, never to speak falsehood. It is a splendid honor to be truthful at all times; but the complete character is formed only by loving all truth for truth's sake. Error disappears and corrupts, truth satisfies and makes noble and strong.

Equippled with love in the heart with the ability and virtue of true friendship and with profound reverence for all the truth which God has made known to our lives will please God and bless humanity.

I pray that God's rich blessings may rest upon His church and upon your noble order and that the christian ideal of serving one another in love may dispel all selfishness and hasten the consummation of the Eternal Kingdom of God.

A GOOD RECORD

For Punctuality Made by the Pupils of the Public Schools.

During the past two years an effort has been made upon the part of the teachers and students to decrease the number of cases of tardiness in the public schools.

This spirit of effort on the part of the students has done much toward interesting the parents in the same work. A few months ago a common excuse offered by the students was: "I had to work at home." Now very few cases can be traced to the parents and most of the tardiness is caused by mere carelessness on the part of the boys and girls. Two years ago there was an average of 80 cases for each month during the entire year. Last year the number was reduced to 68, while this year it has dropped down until this month we had only 23 cases. As there are over 1000 students enrolled and as each student enters the school twice a day, it can be readily seen that for every person who is tardy there are about 2000 others who are punctual. The record for the month of April is as follows: Lakeside, enrollment 28, tardy 12; Central, enrollment 183, tardy 8; Westside, enrollment 83, tardy 1. The number in each department is: Primary, 14; Grammar, 6; and High School, 1.

The students attending the rooms taught by the following teachers were not tardy during the month of April: Misses Crysler, 8th grade; Shilton, 7th grade; Howling, 4th grade; S. Friley, 2nd grade; Russell, 6th grade; McCullough, 5th grade; Smith, 4th grade; Palmer, 2nd grade; Aiken, 3rd grade; McCine, 1st grade and Elliott, kindergarten.

HOUSE PASSES BILL

For \$5000 Appropriation for Chatham Experiment Farm Without Dissenting Vote.

THE L. S. PRESS ASSOCIATION

Manistique Advocate of the Appropriation, Representative Clark, Father of the Bill. The house of representatives passed without a dissenting vote Wednesday, Representative Clark's bill providing a \$5000 appropriation for the Chatham experiment station located in Alger county.

Speaking of the success of the measure and the benefit it would bring about the Manistique Leader says: "This marks the first step towards the accomplishment of a week of agricultural development for northern Michigan which had its inception at the Lake Superior Press association meeting at Manistique in February, and which has been vigorously and consistently worked for by the newspaper men of the upper peninsula."

The \$5000 appropriation bill will now go to the senate for approval, and the senators have been receiving for the last two weeks hundreds of postal cards from various parts of their districts urging favorable action on Mr. Clark's bill. It might go through the state senate without an objection. Governor Warren will sign the bill with considerable pleasure, having a great interest in the agricultural development of northern Michigan.

The farm at Chatham has been wretchedly poor for some time, and it came to a point where it had to be taken care of by the state or abandoned altogether. The passage of the bill is a feather in Mr. Clark's cap, it is credit to the activity of Representative Harris of Manistique on the Agricultural College committee, and an evidence of the public spirit of the members of the Lake Superior Press association.

We glean the following from concerning the recent sale of the Ann Arbor road from the Daily Herald-Leader of Manistique: "It is said, upon reliable authority, that the Ann Arbor railway and car ferry system has been sold to the same parties that control the Pere Marquette system. The law prohibits a formal merger of the two roads but nevertheless they are now said to be controlled by the same capital."
