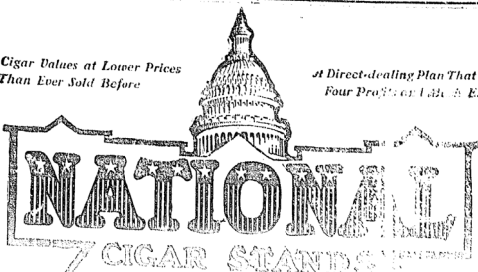

THAW MOST OBDRUATE

The alienists who examined Thaw during the day announced that the prisoner had declined to answer any of the questions which they asked him. Thaw's reason for refusing to reply to the questions was that his counsel was not present.
