TRAVERSE CITY DAY

About 200 People from Grand Traverse County Visited Manistique Wednesday.

THE LUNCHEON AND TOASTS

were the most pleasing features of the visit.

Nearly 100 people congregated at the dock Wednesday afternoon to welcome the members of the Traverse City Board of Trade and others from the Grand Traverse county who were in the city in part at the Manistique. While the number, about 200, was rather disappointing to the local committees, all were given a cordial welcome, and were seated at the breakfast table, where the ladies were handsomely entertained by a reception committee headed by Mrs. Hensley. Delicious punch was served, and those desiring to see the city were piloted through the business and residential sections by the various ladies comprising the committee. The gentlemen were taken on a hurried tour in the afternoon of the various manufacturing plants in the city. The time was so fully spent that the visitors had a scanty glance at them.

At 4:30 o'clock the visitors and the local business men and their ladies to the number of 500 congregated at the opera house where the ladies of St. Alban's church served a substantial luncheon under the direction of the banquet committee. The entire floor space of the opera house was filled with tables, eight of which extended across the hall from north to south, while the speakers' table was placed along the south wall of the building.

After cigars were passed by the local committee, and after President Hastings, in behalf of the board of trade, had presented every lady present with a box of tea, an excellent program was followed. Wm. J. Thomas, who acted as toastmaster, made an ideal one, for his smiles and remarks were of a high order. Mayor Fox, who was introduced as a handsome young man, was the first speaker and in the following next welcome speech he bid the guests a cordial welcome.

KILLED BY DYNAMITE

Mike O'Donnell, Killed at the Saw While Engaged in Blasting.

AFFAIR OCCURRED MONDAY

Funeral was Held in This City Yesterday Morning.

Michael O'Donnell, of this city, son of Mrs. Thomas Martin, of Tablado addition, was killed by a premature explosion of dynamite at the Saw Monday evening, while engaged in blasting rock for MacArthur Bros. The deceased was very well known here and was employed in the construction of the new plant for the Manistique Light & Power Co. He was very popular with his associates and a man of good habits. He leaves a mother, three brothers and two sisters. The brothers are Dan, Ed and Will Martin and the sisters are Mesdames Edith Smith and Anna Flynn.

He was a member of the following local unions of the Workmen of the World and the Macintosh in which he carried policies. He was also a Spanish-American war veteran having been a member of Co. I Thirty-fifth Regt.

The remains were brought to this city Tuesday evening and the funeral services were held from St. Francis de Sales church yesterday morning.

A number of the Workmen, Marvin Lee, and Spanish-American war veteran, were present in procession and the pall-bearers were selected from those organizations.

Speaking of the accident, the Evening News of Tuesday evening has the following to say:

Thrown into the air by the premature explosion of a heavy charge of dynamite, Michael O'Donnell, foreman for MacArthur Bros, was almost instantly killed about 7 o'clock last evening. The accident occurred in the tall race of the new Chandler-Dunbar water power plant about 100 yards east and north of the state fish hatchery buildings.

The blast of dynamite which caused Mr. O'Donnell's death went off almost directly under his feet while he was leaning over with a torch in his hand in the act of lighting the fuse to another charge nearby. Fragments of rock from the blast severed one of his legs from his body, which was almost completely disemboweled. Portions of his clothing were torn off and the injured man, still clinging for his breath, fell in a ghastly heap upon a pile of broken rock. He continued to live for nearly twenty minutes and while some of his fellow

IS OUT OF THE RACE

Representative J. B. Clark Decides Not to Be a Candidate for Re-election.

HAS AN ENVIABLE RECORD

And His Friends Throughout the District Respect His Decision.

Mr. J. B. Clark, who so efficiently served the Schoolcraft legislative district during the past two years, has decided not to be a candidate for reelection in the contingency meeting to the 2000 where he will engage in business. His many friends throughout the district will regret to learn that he will be out of the race this year for he certainly made an enviable record as a legislator. He was the only member of the lower house that attended every daily session of the legislature during his term of office. He also presented and successfully passed twenty bills for the benefit of his constituents, a record not equaled by any of his predecessors.

While it is not definitely known who Mr. Clark's successor will be, it goes without saying that with Mr. Clark out of the race the honor will go either to Alger or Schoolcraft counties. The latter county has a tentative candidate in one of its most prominent and highly respected citizens.

Whether Alger has a candidate or not is not at present known, but it is safe to say that the cordial relation existing between Alger, Levee and Schoolcraft will not be impaired by the final selection of the personnel of the candidate. It is concluded by nearly every one in the district that Mr. Clark was entitled to a re-nomination but on account of his announcement to withdraw he is no longer a factor in the present campaign, and MacArthur county's claims for re-nomination have gone unheeded. Mr. Clark's predecessor also hailed from Mackinac county, and as there is little else but honor in the office in question, the aspirants in other counties should be taken into consideration and the nomination passed around.

Agnes-Tripp, an Italian working in the same crew, was also injured to some extent by flying rock. Pieces of the rock hit him on the back, tearing through his clothes and cutting his back, but at the hospital it was said that his condition is not at all serious.

TWO WERE FOUR MEN IN THE GANG ENGAGED IN THE WORK OF TOUCHING OFF THE BLASTS LAST EVENING, BUT TWO OF THEM WERE STANDING AT A DISTANCE WHEN THE EXPLOSION OCCURRED AND ESCAPED INJURY.

Mr. O'Donnell was an expert driller and blaster, having been engaged in that kind of work for a dozen years. He found employment with MacArthur Bros, at Manistique more than two years ago and came to this city with that company when work was commenced on the Chandler-Dunbar contract. He was regarded as a particularly careful man and one of the company's most trustworthy employees.

Mr. O'Donnell was a single man and about 25 years of age. He home was at Manistique, where his widowed mother now lives. The man with whom he worked said that he was an honest and temperate man and that his death must have been the result of a pure accident.

The blast that caused the death of O'Donnell were fired by hand. All the blasting that has been done in the pit has hitherto been done by electricity, but last evening's work was in the fallow-

land and was of such a nature that the charges had to be exploded individually and this necessitated the lighting of the fuses by hand. The rock blasted was in the form of boulders and the charges were placed on top of the rock with a mud cap over the charge of this work is about half the usual charge is used. The main force of the explosion is upward, the down force being merely enough to break the rock. Had the usual amount of explosive been used and set this way, and the charges set off simultaneously by electricity, the shock would have been great enough to break all windows within a large radius. It is supposed that the mud cap from the boulder over which O'Donnell was standing hit him and caused his death.

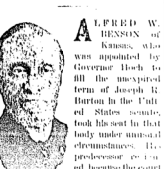

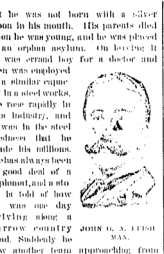

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

The congressional convention will be held at Iron Mountain Aug. 15th at which time Congressman H. O. Young will be unanimously renominated. Mr. Young deserves the honor as he has given his district painstaking and efficient service.

Work is the agent that has lightened the load that the poor commissioners have to carry, says the Crystal Falls Daily. The manager of the county poor farm compelled all able-bodied inmates to work and that accounts for five of the fellows "jumping" the institution.

A tool is a political harlot, and the record of the political flip flops the Record man has made during the past two or three years proves him to be a patriarch in that accomplishment. The "gang," after starting an opposition paper, made it so salubrious for him that he was ready to be swallowed by the outfit opposing him and to do their bidding. He'll do anything for money.

The Pioneer-Tribune circulation appears to worry the Record editor. The manager of this paper is willing that a committee of business men shall investigate the circulation of the two papers in question by actual count of subscribers and from weight slips furnished by the postoffice authorities during the past year, and that the reports of the committee be published for the benefit of advertisers and the public generally. Will the Record man consent to do this?

A WORTHY AMBITION.

Young men here is something for you to read. We don't know who wrote it: "The great issues which stir the world and which fill the newspapers are after all matters of secondary importance to the great mass of older men and women. The thoughts which occupy the minds of men and women in mature life and displace all other considerations are those that revolve about the ways and means of making a living, of establishing and preserving the home, and transmitting it to our children when we are gone. With the great majority of persons, this is the only ambition, and who shall say that it is not a most worthy and satisfying aspiration? The man who realizes it has not lived in vain, although many failures and the wrecks of other hopes show his path. The law of our worship is there; there at least you are beloved; there you are understood; there your errors will meet with gentlest forgiveness, and there your troubles will be smiled away."

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Pioneer-Tribune editor must have laid claim to the honor of being the leader of any faction or clan as announced by the Record, but on the other hand he really embodied as he stands, the Record in one issue gives the worst result for him the leader, and on the next issues that he is a tool doing the bidding of others. It is as if it may be said he is more than pleased with the editorial success achieved by the factors with the Tribune during the past year, and it is clear that the Record man would not be resting his content and highly colored language in coming his own upon him with matters otherwise.

DEMOCRATIC PROSPERITY.

During the past decade we have heard a good deal about the coming of prosperity and our party has even been accused of appropriating its used credit that was properly due to Democratic. Among the tax returns from N. Graskin, however, is found an interesting bit of prosperity that is unquestionably Democratic. In 1905 Wm. L. Bryan paid taxes upon \$5,150 worth of property; in 1906 he pays upon \$74,250 and is credited with also owning \$75,000 of government bonds, upon which the tax collector cannot make assessment. Surely these ten years have been fat ones for Mr. Bryan. Few indeed are those who have increased their holdings from \$5,000 to \$120,000 within a single decade, and Mr. Bryan has without a doubt made this money honestly. He has succeeded in making a practical demonstration that the gold standard has not ruined the country and that the door of opportunity has not been closed to willing and ambitious.

This is still the poor man's country, in fact the best country for the poor man that is on the face of the earth. Mr. Bryan has thirty dollars today for every one he had ten years ago. The rich may be growing richer, but it is a hard job to prove that the poor are growing poorer and it is not likely that we will hear any such arguments in the next campaign even if Mr. Bryan is one of the candidates.

FAVORS INCOME TAX.

Isaac Stephenson, of Marinette, who is reputed to be the richest man in Wisconsin and who is well known in Michigan, says that there should be a reform in taxation; that the poor man carries more than his share of the burden while the wealthy man escapes, and that there should be a graded income tax.

In view of Mr. Stephenson's wealth, enterprises and business connections, his radical views cause surprise. In an interview he is quoted as saying: "There are glaring defects in our present system of taxation. The man of wealth does not pay so great a proportion of taxes as a poor man, whose all is a bit of land and a home. This is so new theory with me. For many years I have felt that the burden of taxation was unequal."

"The workman does not pay a large amount of tax upon his homestead, but he pays a higher percentage of tax on its real value than the rich man does on his many forms of property. The little homestead is where the assessor can see it. It is assessed as a matter of course and the taxes upon it have to be paid. It is assessed as a matter of course and the taxes upon it have to be paid. Most of the rich man's possessions are not open to the assessor's view. In fact, the form of some of them is not even suspected."

"The point I make is illustrated by the case of Marshall Field of Chicago. In Chicago he paid taxes on less than \$7,000,000, but now that his estate is in court it appears that his property in that city is worth five or six times more than the amount on which he paid taxes. If he had paid taxes on his actual possessions, Chicago's income from his property alone would by this time exceed by \$3,000,000 the real amount he actually paid in taxes. A system of taxation that permits anything like this is far from sound."

"There is no doubt in my mind that an income tax is the right thing. Any income that exceeds \$1,000 a year should be taxed. A man earning only \$1,000 a year needs it all to support his family and educate his children, but any man earning more than that can well afford to contribute a little to the public good. It should be a graduated tax. The percentage of tax on an annual income of \$1,500 a year, for instance, should be small; on an annual income of \$5,000 it should be larger, and the rate should increase steadily in proportion to the size of the income. The income tax has long been tried in other countries, where it is a success. Under such a system, every man who can afford to do so contributes something in the way of tax, and the expense of supporting the government is generally distributed."

AGAIN AFTER CHOUKININ

TERRORISTS REPEAT ATTEMPT ON LIFE OF RUSSIAN BLACK SEA ADMIRAL.

WOUNDED AND TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

HAS BEEN BLAMED FOR SEVERE TREATMENT OF MEN UNDER HIS COMMAND.

Sébastopol, July 12.—An attempt was made at 1 1/2 p. m. to assassinate Vice Admiral Choukinin, commander of the Black Sea fleet. The admiral was wounded and taken to a hospital.

Vice Admiral Choukinin had been blamed for his severity and that it was his treatment of the crews of the ships under his command that led to the mutiny on the battleship Kinia Potemkin in June and July of last year, was attributed. The admiral displayed considerable activity in attempting to capture the mutineers at that time and in suppressing the sailors' mutiny at Sebastopol in November.

An attempt was made on the life of the admiral at his official residence during the afternoon of that day and sent in her carriage to the hospital. The daughter of a rear admiral at St. Petersburg who was an old acquaintance of Choukinin, on entering the admiral's office at 1 1/2 p. m. saw a rapid fire pistol and fired three shots at him, each bullet reaching the mark.

Admiral Choukinin passed a good deal of active service and for a time was believed to be under orders to take to the Far East, during the war with Japan, but was recalled to St. Petersburg, relieving Vice Admiral Rojestvensky. Choukinin was port admiral at Vladivostok from 1904 to 1905. Later he was appointed director of the naval college, which post he held until he took command of the Black sea squadron.

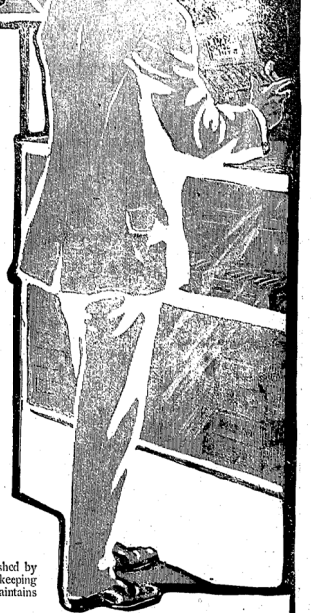

FINED USUAL AMOUNT

SENTENCE PASSED ON CHICAGO AND ALTON ROAD FOR MER OFFICIALS.

HAD BEEN CONVICTED OF HEARING

COMPANY TAKED \$20,000 ON EACH OF TWO COUNTS AND INDIVIDUALS \$5,000.

Chicago, July 12.—Judge Landis, in the United States district court, has sentenced the Chicago and Alton road, which was recently convicted of granting illegal rebates, to pay a fine of \$20,000 on each of two counts, or a total of \$40,000.

Fred A. Walsh, former officials of the road, who were also convicted, were sentenced to pay a fine of \$5,000 each on two counts, or a total of \$10,000 each.

The defendants were fined on two counts of an indictment containing ten counts. The specific charge on which they were convicted was that they had given to the Schwabacher & Sulzberger company a rebate of 1 per cent on all shipments from the Kansas City plant of the packing company.

The defendants claimed that the charge was made against them by the packing company which had the right to levy. It became it owed the track near the plant and therefore had the right to charge the railroad for truckage. Judge Landis, in his instructions, practically directed the jury to bring in a verdict of guilty and after it had been rendered, the attorneys for the railroad and for the individual defendants asked "how to show that the rebate was public and not a secret affair."

Robbery Suspected Motive.
Young Women Murdered in Minneapolis, Minn.
Minneapolis, July 12.—Miss Millie Ellison of Ellsworth, Wis., who resided at the National hotel in this city, was brutally murdered in her room by a man who had registered at the hotel on July 11. William M. Wickes, a robbery in the supposed motive of the crime, said the woman had received a check for \$1,700 a few hours previous

to the tragedy and this money has not been found among her effects.

The murder was promulgated and horribly brutal. Wilson early in the day purchased a hammer and a bottle of alcohol. The hammer was used in knocking the woman senseless, her clothes were then saturated with alcohol and the match applied. When smoke attracted employees of the hotel to the room the victim was a mass of flames and almost dead. She was hurriedly started for the city hospital, but died on the way. Wilson, who escaped from the hotel with the woman's watch and his own, has not been captured.

Affects Ten Thousand Men.
Long Coal Strike in Dubois (Pa.) Region Settled.
Dubois, Pa., July 12.—The long coal strike in this region, was settled here in a conference between representatives of the operators and the miners' officials and all employees will return to work next Monday.

Misunderstanding Cleared Up.
Ten Thousand Ohio Miners Will Return to Work.
Columbus, O., July 12.—Because of a misunderstanding on a fraction of 1 cent on a ton of coal mined by the miners of the Hocking valley 10,000 miners went out Tuesday night on a strike. Negotiations between Secretary-Manager Savage of the miners' organization and the operators resulted in the misunderstanding being cleared up and the men were ordered to return to work.

Unknown Killed by Train.
Shewport, Mich., July 12.—An unknown man was instantly killed by a freight train, and his body terribly mangled. He was about 30 years old, weighed 160 pounds, stocky, and had a short black mustache and dark brown hair cut close.

Threats Changed to a Mission.
Grand Rapids, Mich., July 12.—Neil Trotter has told Mrs. Smith, owner of the Smith theater, \$10,000 as part payment of the theater, which he will use for mission purposes.

BLOWN TO ETERNITY

Four Men Die in a Blast of 200 Gallons of the Tricky Gasoline.

DYE WORKS IN A DISASTER

Young Man Relieved To Be Drowned—Condit's Hotel Mrs. Bellows—Gripping Was a Fraud.

Saginaw, Mich., July 7. — R. A. Foehl, George Sigelto and Carl and Louis Cosendak were killed and six persons were injured, two of them seriously, by the explosion of a large gasoline tank on the second floor of the boiler house of the Cosendak Dye works of North Jefferson avenue. John P. Cosendak, proprietor of the dye works, was severely fatally burned. The tank of gasoline exploded without an instant's warning, and the boiler house was torn to pieces. Planes burst from a workshop in the wreckage instantly. Foehl's body was found near the edge of the huge pile of wreckage. Literally cooked.

Husband Partly Responsible.
Kalamazoo, Mich., July 7. — The death from meningitis of Mrs. Albert Carpenter was said by physicians after the autopsy to have been caused by a blood clot on the brain, which may have been the result of the shock she received when her husband came home intoxicated and broke out of the furniture in the house. Carpenter is believed to have been held in jail.

Chicago Man Probably Drowned.
Saginaw, Mich., July 7. — Fred Grant, of Chicago, aged 21, an art student, who was sleeping with a party young man near Saginaw, and presumably drowned while rowing on one of the shore resorts to his camp. He has not been seen since starting for camp in his rowboat. The body of another Chicago man, drowned August 11th Monday night, Charles L. Wines, an electrical engineer, has been recovered from the river. It was thought to be the surface by a passing steamer.

Saginaw, Mich., July 7.—A driver had been captured by the Yag-

huff police. He was a subnormal, farm-looking fellow, and wore his hair in a sling, and his hand was also skillfully bandaged. He was begging near the Normal, having a printed sign bearing the stock option to help a poor cripple, and his pockets were full of dimes and quarters that the charitable summer school girls had given him.

Man's Belongs Confiscated.
Cassadaga, Mich., July 7.—The case against Mrs. Belle Bellows, who was charged with the murder of her husband by arsenical poisoning, has been nolle prossed by Judge Childman on motion of Prosecutor Veltmire, who said that the case was not strong enough to warrant a trial. Bellows died in a St. Louis hospital last September, and the case was found in the stomach and kidneys. Charles Thier and Mrs. Bellows were arrested on suspicion, but Thier was discharged after his lower court acquittal.

Fourth of July Joker.
Muskegon, Mich., July 7.—Two giant dynamite craters were thrown on the feet of a crowd of Hungarians, tearing of the small finger on the left hand of Fred Jankos so that amputation was necessary. The crater was believed to have been exploded by John Chalko.

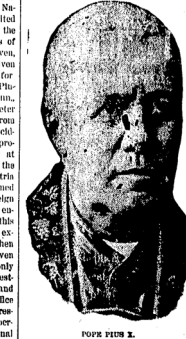

Pinchot, Chief Forester
THE talk of Clifford Pinchot as the possible successor of James Wilson as secretary of agriculture in case of the retirement of that member of the president's cabinet has aroused interest both in Mr. Pinchot's personality and in what he has accomplished as chief of the government's forestry service. Forestry is one of the newest of the professions. Mr. Pinchot was one of the first to adopt it as a life work, and he left college less than twenty years ago. The forestry service is a branch of the department of agriculture. It was established potentially, but not actually, in 1870 by the appointment of Dr. Franklin H. Hough of New York to prepare a report on various forest matters under the direction of the agriculture department. The position of chief forester was created by act of Congress ten years later. When Grover Cleveland entered upon his second term he saw the force of encouraging forest preservation and at the request of his secretary of the interior the National Academy of Sciences appointed a committee to investigate the question of a national forest policy for the United States and to report thereon. Mr. Pinchot was appointed a member of this committee and held the position of chief of the forest reserves proclaimed by Mr. Cleveland in 1897. The forestry branch of the agriculture department was first a division, was then elevated to a bureau and now is known as the forestry service. Mr. Pinchot has been at the head since 1908. Dr. Franklin H. Hough of New York, Mr. Pinchot and President Roosevelt are intimate friends, and they often play tennis together and occasionally go on excursions to enjoy the more strenuous sport of chopping down trees. Mr. Pinchot is a man of wide general culture, and his work for the government is performed more for love of the duties which form his occupation and out of a desire to do of service to the public than for financial reward, as his \$2,500 salary is of itself an insult in view of the fact that he has been in the public service for more than twenty years. He was born in Pennsylvania and engaged in the lumber business. The interest of the National Academy of Sciences was awakened by his son, James W. Pinchot, for the latter became one of the founders of the Yale forestry school at New Haven, Conn., to which his family has given \$100,000. The present head of the forestry service is son of James W. Pinchot and was born at Silesburg, Pa., in 1885. He studied at Phillips Exeter academy and at Yale, graduating from that university in 1908. Having decided on the adoption of forestry as a profession, he went abroad to study at the French forestry school and in the provinces of France, Germany, Austria and Switzerland, and while he learned much abroad, he found that foreign methods of forest preservation and management were not adapted to this country. The forestry service is at present in the hands of a man who is chiefly his creation. When he went into the service only eleven persons were employed in it, and only two of these were professional foresters. There was no field equipment and practically all the work was office work. At the beginning of the present fiscal year the employees numbered 82, of whom 153 were professional foresters. Field work was then going on in twenty-seven states and territories. The importance of this work to the future generations, as Mr. Pinchot has never, can scarcely be overestimated. A fact that he can say, could be much better withstood than a famine in truth. He is an enthusiast in his work and the value of it is constantly recognized by commercial organizations as well as by those who are interested in it as the broad ground of the welfare of the American people and of the race.

POPE PIUS X
Reports of His Illness and Arduous Nature of His Labors.
The reports of the illness of Pope Pius X. has caused concern in all parts of the world and awakened fear that his health might be near the end of his career. It is said that while his recent illness, an attack of gout, is not in itself a cause for alarm, the confinement to the Vatican and its grounds, which is considered imperative upon the one having his illness, has been

most detrimental to his health and induced a state of general debility. The pope was told to walk a great deal and be often in the open air when he was patriarch of Venice, and the change of life necessitated by his assuming his present high position had meant a loss to him of the means to formerly possessed of countering mental strain. Pope Pius X. is a man of very sympathetic nature, and he takes the troubles of the world and of the church of which he is the earthly head as his own. His duties are arduous and he gives himself little respite from them.
