REPUBLICAN MISTAKES IN THE SOUTH

Secretary Taylor with Carolina, such authority, appeal for the balance of the Solid South has received much favorable comment. Under such leadership the colored voters of the south have been deceived and degraded. Republican leaders have called these voters about them in canvases and conventions and manipulated by questionable methods the selection of state delegations. They waste no time in stalling the idea of loyalty to party, they do not require that in order to participate in a caucus the colored man must have voted the Republican ticket at the preceding election, in fact leaders can be found who are Republicans in national convention years and who work in the off years with the Democrats and encourage the colored man to do the same thing. They have stood by and not rebuked the purchase of ignorant and contempt colored voters by Democrats hating among themselves.

With such methods in vogue—and they are southern state—how can the Republican party expect the strong men of the south to come over to its support? The protective tariff and the gold standard issues caused in 1890, hundreds to proclaim themselves as "McKinley Democrats," but nothing in the Republican party as conducted in the south could induce them to come out as Republicans.

When both white and black Republicans in the south stand apart or fall by the same tests of party fealty that we demand in the north and when federal patronage in the south is bestowed upon capable men as a recognition of efficient work done in building up the Republican vote, then and not until then shall we have made a right start toward breaking in upon the Solid South.

POLITICS AND PROSPERITY.

The Bryan loan for agricultural presidential nomination is the one political feature that seems to have caught on this summer. Mr. Bryan himself says it is too early and that there are others who should be considered, but this has not checked the loaners. In fact it certainly does Mr. Bryan credit. In the Republican camp there is no activity unless it is upon the part of suspected candidates themselves. The report that President Roosevelt has said that Taft is the only Republican who can defeat Bryan has not brought out any great rallying to the Taft standard nor any protest from friends of other possible aspirants, but this does not mean that Michigan, and other states as well, may not be interested in Mr. Taft when the right time comes.

In both parties the matter of candidates seems to be more considered than that of the issues upon which the next campaign may be fought. Tariff, tariff revision and reciprocity were eclipsed by Bryan and the currency question is eliminated with no prospect of its again being an issue during this generation. In 1896, when times were hard, when work was scarce and wages low, conditions were exactly right for the existing of popular support for some plausible theory that offered a possible solution of the unhappy conditions that surrounded us. Nothing but the sober second thought that was possible during the two months immediately preceding that election saved the country from being swept over to a free silver lassis. William McKinley's appeal to open the mills instead of the mints caused thousands to hesitate, then to consider and finally to accept the doctrine of honest money and a protective tariff.

Under those policies the nation has prospered wonderfully and where a national election to be held this fall the lack of interest would perhaps be even greater than it appeared to be in the campaigning of 1900 and 1904. Under conditions similar to those of a decade ago the nation could be recused to frenzy over such issues as railroad discriminations, the Standard Oil's grasping monopoly or trust issues in general, but with more work than workers, and with the workers receiving the highest wages ever paid, enabling them to live in greater comfort than wage earners in any country on the globe ever enjoyed, conditions are far from ripe for a social revolution. The savings banks never had such deposits as they have now, never before have so many Americans owned their homes, never have the farms, the factories and the mercantile establishments enjoyed so great a measure of success.

When a man is enjoying the greatest prosperity he has ever known it will be hard to convince him that he is being ground down and impoverished by the railroads or any other combinations of capital. The prosperous man will take time to consider the reasonable remedies for such wrongs as may need correction, but he will not be swept off his feet by any whirl wind campaign that calls for the radical and extreme treatment of matters that affect his individual finances in only a very slight degree.

CARE OF CANARIES.

LAPLANDER STYLES.

They haven't Changed Any in the Last Thousand Years.

There is one corner in the world where the fashions of the people have remained the same for the last thousand years. The Lapp lady is not contented about the latest fashions of Paris nor is she subject to that soul boring experience, the turgid original blusher girl, for the mother garment worn by her today is of the same design as that worn by her ancestors of a thousand years ago.

The summer garment of the Laplander is usually of coarse woolen goods and has something the cut of a shirt with a high collar. Among the men Lapps it is for the most part made of the same other Lapps usually heavy, sometimes green or brown and even black mock frocks have been seen.

Bound the waistbands, along the seams in the back and on the edges this smock is ornamented with strips of red or yellow cloth. Under this garment is a similar one, either plain or figured, worn next to the body, for the Lapp never wears anything underneath. The trousers are of white woolen goods, rather narrow and reaching to the ankles, where they are tied inside the shoes with long slender shoelaces. Over these drawers are worn heavy leggings of thin, tanned skins, reaching from the ankles to the knees.

Stockings the Lapp never wears. He fills the upper curving tip of his shoes with a sort of grass, which is gathered in summer and beaten to make it soft and pliable. The winter costume only differs from the summer in summer in that every piece is made of reindeer skin with the hair on.

The dress of the women differs very slightly from that worn by the men. The smock is somewhat longer and is made without the big standing collar, but of which a keelie or cap is worn about the neck. To the women and often silver ornamented girdle being worn across the chest.

The head covering is not only different in the two sexes, but also differs according to the locality.

FINGER FELONS.

These Are Three Varieties of These Very Painful Sores.

A felon, or whitlow, is an inflammation of the hand or finger, usually of the last joint of the finger. Its importance varies with the sort of it—that is to say, with the portion of the finger involved. It may affect the skin only, or the sinews or sinews or the fibrous covering of the bone—the periosteum.

A superficial whitlow, where the inflammation is confined to the skin only, is not a very serious matter. But this cannot be said of the other two forms. In the conditions whitlow pus forms in the fibrous sheath surrounding the tendon, and unless the inflammation quickly subsides or the matter is let out by the surgeon's knife the pus may burrow down through the sheath into the palm of the hand and result in a permanent crippling of the member.

The third variety—called by physicians the suppurative felon—is that in which matter forms beneath the epidermis which covers the bone. As this membrane is tough and inelastic the matter due to the increasing volume of matter becomes very great and gives rise to a throbbing, insupportable pain. The relief afforded by a deep cut into the inflamed finger, right down to the bone, is magical, although the cut hurts. This is the only treatment for the form of felon, and the incision should be made early, for if it is too long delayed the bone will be killed and a discharging sore will remain which will later necessitate a surgical operation even if it does not result in the loss of the last joint of the finger.
