Council Proceedings.

Madison, Mich., July 24th, 1906. At a special meeting of the city council, held on above date, the matter of sewer contracts with Green & Sons Company, contractors, the following members were present: Mayor J. W. Orr, Clerk J. Christensen, Aldermen McNamara, Benson, and McKeown.

The Board of Public Works, Madison, Michigan.

In the matter of the construction of systems of Water Works and Sewerage for the City of Madison, Michigan, under contracts with Messrs. Green & Sons Co. of Appleton, Wisconsin, dated July 12th, 1905, I have the honor to submit the following report:

Construction work was commenced immediately after contracts were signed and the work was prosecuted with satisfactory and commendable rate of progress against all difficulties.

It is gratifying to report that the work was prosecuted with satisfactory and commendable rate of progress against all difficulties.

Aside from the leakage above mentioned and some repairs to cross walks and side walks, and a little unfiled filling or grading of the water pipe across the bridge over the Monticue River, the water works plant is completed.

Financial Statement.

Final estimate of work done and material furnished account construction of the Monticue, Michigan, Water Works and Sewerage.

Table with columns for contract type, description, and amount. Includes Sewer Contract and Water Works Contract sections.

Moved by Mr. Sattler and seconded by Mr. Putnam, that the report and statement be accepted as read, and after general discussion by the Board, and by the entire satisfaction of Green & Sons Company, which was carried by unanimous yeas.

WHEREAS—Mr. George W. Sturtevant, consulting engineer, has submitted to the Board of Public Works his final report and statement of the construction of the water works and sewer systems installed under contracts with Green & Sons Company, which report and statement are hereto attached and made a part of his resolution, and

WHEREAS—The Board of Public Works and said engineer have made inspection and tests of all said systems as provided in said contracts, and find that said systems are substantially completed in all respects according to the terms of said contracts, with the exception of the items enumerated in said report and statement as yet to be completed, and

WHEREAS—It appears by said report and statement that there is a balance of \$14,885.90 to said contractors on the part of the city for the installation of said systems, and

balance due Green & Sons Company upon the sewer contract to be paid in full and order drawn for the amount of \$90,000 dollars as recommended by the Board of Public Works.

Mr. Geo. W. Sturtevant being present, explained several questions before the council in regard to the sewer work, and the contractor's estimate.

It is recommended that upon satisfactory completion of the water main and distribution system, by the Contractor, the water works and sewerage systems be accepted by the City, and that final settlement be made thereon.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

St. Ignace will hold a big civic celebration the latter part of August.

With the governorship eliminated, state conventions are about as interesting as a Sunday school picnic.

Who the Republican candidates for the various county offices shall be decided at the primaries to be held Sept. 4th.

One thing has been settled to the satisfaction of all viz: that Billy Mills is not a factor in senatorial circles this year. He's as dead as the proverbial snail.

Remember that you will have an opportunity of voting on the bond proposition to raise \$12,000 for a new post house, at the special election to be held Sept. 4th.

After a few years experience as the tail of the Twenty-ninth Senatorial district, Mackinac county really feels pleased to get home again as a portion of the Thirtieth district.

The dear people, as usual, will be called upon to foot the bills. Owing to heavy losses in the export department as the result of recent disclosures, the packing houses have raised the price of meat materially in the larger cities. No doubt the increase will be felt in Manistique shortly.

The total net costs of the sewer and waterworks systems was \$132,935.77. The sewer system cost \$53,405.92 and the water works system \$79,529.85. When the vast amount of work done is taken into consideration, Manistique certainly did not pay an excessive price to the contractors. If you have any doubts about this, ask Green Bros.

An exceptionally strong ticket has been placed in the field by the Republican state convention at Detroit this week. Although the upper peninsula and the lieutenant governorship have been denied, yet the north-land did succeed in securing the nomination for superintendent of public instruction for Luther L. Wright of Ironwood.

Although the city council gave Chief McCullough full authority to conduct the affairs of his department yet it remains to be proven if an ex-alderman's voracious tentacles can be permanently divorced from the public crib, or whether the chief's authority will be curtailed sufficiently to allow the ex-official to run the department.

In the death of Prof. Daniel Putnam of Ypsilanti, Michigan has lost one of its foremost educators and citizens. His influence was always elevating, and his life was the true exemplification of how an educator should live. By the influence of his practice and precept he has enabled the many thousands of young men and women that attended the state normal at Ypsilanti during the decades that he was identified with that institution. He was a christian in the fullest sense of the word.

Hon. John W. Wells of Menominee, who is an aspirant for the nomination of Senator in this district was a Manistique visitor this week. He is very much encouraged with the outlook in various portions of the district and it looks as though he would have a majority of the votes at the convention. He is one of the most prominent business men of the district, is not a politician and has a spotless record as a man and citizen. It will take a man of Mr. Wells' qualifications to purify the atmosphere after a term of Billy Mills.

Robert H. Shields of Houghton, and Robert H. Douglas of Ironwood are the new members of the state central committee from this district.

President Roosevelt sent the dollar in response to the call of Chairman Sherman for contributions of that amount from Republicans for the congressional campaign, every good Republican should do likewise.

The St. Ignace Enterprise admits that a democrat wouldn't have a ghost of a show in the Thirtieth district, but the fact that Mackinac will be represented in the upper peninsula company is a great consolation.

Gov. Warner's address before the state convention was one of the best made before that body. The Republican party certainly made no mistakes in electing him governor and re-nominating him for a second term.

It is rather expensive for a wealthy man to become ill. The late Marshall Field employed two physicians during his fatal illness of seven days and the physicians have netted the estate \$25,000 each for their services.

Gov. Cammins of Iowa has been renominated for a third term after a strenuous pre-convention campaign. He also dictated a platform declaring for tariff revision and reciprocity, the direct nomination system and a tighter rein on the trusts.

President Roosevelt has caused the withdrawal of 6,000,000 acres of western coal lands, which will be capable of supplying the nation with fuel for centuries. The frags of the coal trust will be drawn by this move as it will make the country independent of that trust.

Marquette county is evidently more interested in the Thirtieth senatorial district than the people that live therein. The personnel of the next senator is as yet in the shadowy future but the faint outlines of said individual, clearly demonstrates that he is a bigger man than Billy Mills.

The state convention acted wisely in passing a resolution pledging the party to the direct nomination of United States senators for it instructed the delegates to the Iowa convention which meets in September "to direct their efforts to the end that the people of the United States as to permit the election of U. S. Senators by direct vote of the people."

CAN IT BE DONE?

Can a rich man ever succeed in satisfying the public? Russell Sage died the other day worth his hundred million or so and in nearly every paper you may read criticisms, and mostly harsh ones, upon his career. His sin seems to have consisted in having been a money maker and likewise a money saver. He is credited with having adhered to frugal ways all his life and the popular thing seems to be to refer to him as having been a stingy old skink and to proclaim that the world has been no better because of his having lived. If it were true that, despite his millions, he would not pay over \$25 for a suit of clothes there is a lesson, and a good one, right there for many of us who want to wear \$50 or \$75 suits upon a \$25 income. Were there nothing else of good in Russell Sage's life, it could stand as a protest against the reckless and useless extravagance of the American people. Preferring to live in plain every day comfort rather than in the show of luxury affected by so many is not after all so serious a fault. Certainly such a course should be as strongly commended as the tendency so often found among those of modest or moderate means who try to live in the same style as some others who have their millions. Better a Russell Sage living far within his means than some of the free spending high flyers whose careers, gorgeous while they lasted, wound up by the stealing of thousands of dollars, the wrecking of banks and the bringing of trouble and even poverty itself to hundreds of innocent sufferers.

In life Sage was able to get along without public commendations and the caustic things now being said will not disturb him in death, but these things illustrate the fickleness of public sentiment and the great American tendency for "knocking." Within a short space of time we find where everybody was knocking James H. Hyde, the "New York dandy with lots of money who spent it like water and in various startling ways; then our friend John D. Rockefeller wanted to get rid of some of his wealth in more sensible and less sensational fashion than Hyde, but in churches and colleges the "tainted money" howls are raised and the vials of public wrath that had ridged Hyde poured out roars after roars for the Oil King and now Russell Sage goes for his grave leaving his millions behind him and he is followed to the tomb by a wide spread knocking and kicking because he did not spend more money while he lived.

Scripture tells us that it is as hard for a rich man to enter heaven as for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle and it looks as though he were almost as strenuous a task for him to so live on earth as to win the approbation of his less fortunate brethren.

Quick Building of a Creamery.

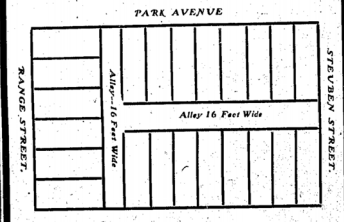

Prof. Putnam is Dead

Nestor of Michigan Educators Passes Away After a Long Life of Usefulness.

LIVED TO BE 82 YEARS OLD

Active Until a Week Before Death Called Him—Had Long Losses at Kalamazoo College.

Ypsilanti, Mich., July 31.—Dr. Daniel Putnam, aged 82, died Sunday after a week's illness of liver failure. The funeral will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at his residence. No one has been more influential in building up the system of the public schools and in raising the standard of education in Michigan than Daniel Putnam, since 1868 professor in the Michigan State Normal college. To many thousands of students his self-sacrificing life, entire and unswerving devotion to his work, his deep learning and his devotion to the cause of teaching, have been a constant inspiration.

Came to Michigan in 1864. Daniel Putnam was born of the historic Putnam family in Lyndeboro, N. H., Jan. 8, 1824. He worked on the farm and in the mills, getting some winter schooling in the district schools till he was 20, when he entered the academy at New Hampton, N. H., later going to Dartmouth, whence he graduated in 1851. Dr. Putnam came to Michigan in 1854 and was professor of Latin in Kalamazoo college for five years. Then he organized the public school system of Kalamazoo, and remained there until 1868, when he resigned in 1868 to become superintendent in the state normal school at Ypsilanti where he has remained for nearly forty years. He taught science, penmanship, was principal of the training school, and was three years acting principal. For the past twenty-five years he has been professor of psychology and pedagogy.

Author of Several Books. Eight years ago Dr. Putnam's health became precarious and he was made professor emeritus, but on regaining health he resumed his duties. His professor and has attended his regular class work and besides found much time for literary work. He is the author of an elementary psychology, a manual of pedagogy, a history of the normal school, two works on the care of the insane, a primer of pedagogy, a geography of Michigan, and recently an admirable history of primary and secondary education in Michigan, which his own work is so great a factor. He has been prominent in the State Teachers' association for many years.

shivers out of elephants' feet, dilling their latherly sides and looking for trouble in the cavernous mouths of hippopotamuses are just what he likes to do. A hippopotamus with a toothache is not the most amiable thing in the world, but soothed by Snyder's sympathetic touch Mr. Hippo will open wide his ponderous jaws and stand like a Roman on a monument while the veteran keeper locates the offending impasse in captivity. Snyder and his predecessors in the New York zoo have been remarkably successful in raising hippopotamuses. Seven baby hippos have been born here, five living to maturity.
