THE ANNUAL SESSION

of Marquette Baptist Association
Convenes Here Next Week.

AN INTERESTING PROGRAM

Following addresses from prominent ministers of this and other states, to be presented:

The second-annual session of the Marquette Baptist association will be held in this city next week commencing Tuesday and adjourning Thursday evening. A synopsis of the program follows: At the opening services, Thursday evening, Rev. F. W. Manistique will lead a prayer and praise service, and the service of the evening will be given by Rev. C. H. Mason of Marquette, whose theme will be "Man Made Deities." Wednesday and Thursday will be devoted to the business of the convention, and will be busy days. The annual sermon will be preached Wednesday morning by Rev. W. K. Schomburg, D. D., of Monaca, in the afternoon there will be a model woman's meeting led by Mrs. W. W. Walker of Marquette and Mrs. G. J. Northrup will discuss the Home Missions. There will also be a woman's business session at this meeting. The evening session Wednesday will offer a feature as an address on state missions by Rev. C. H. Irving of Detroit and an address on foreign missions by Rev. R. W. Lombardy, D. D., of Chicago. The Thursday session will be largely taken up by the consideration of association business and by addresses by the clergymen in attendance. In the evening model young people and model junior meetings will be held, and there will be a "Kalamazoo College Home." All of the Baptist ministers of the upper peninsula will probably be in attendance and the program will be interesting to the general public as well as the membership of that denomination.

THE LEGION PICNIC

Was the Biggest Affair of the Kind Ever Held in City

653 PERSONS PARTICIPATED

All Report Big Time at The Big Spring Day an Ideal One.

The second annual picnic of Manistique Legion No. 168 N. P. L. was held at the Big Spring Wednesday and that it was a success it is only necessary to state that 653 persons participated in the affair.

The crowd was conveyed to the spring by a special train of eight cars drawn by the Manistique Iron Co's mammoth new engine with John Fordar at the throttle. The train reached the spring shortly after eleven o'clock and left the depot shortly after seven o'clock, reaching here at ten o'clock.

That the trip was made without accident may be attributed to the extreme caution of Engineer Fordar and to the efforts of Mr. Finch of the North Shore railroad who showed every courtesy and did all in his power to make the trip a safe and pleasant one for the big party. Of the 652 persons aboard, about 250 purchased tickets, the remainder being Legions and exempt from charges.

Harry McMillen chairman of the committee on arrangements is directly responsible for the unqualified success of the event. It was through his influence that extraordinary concessions were received from the Manistique Iron Co., the M. M. & N. Ann Arbor and North Shore Shore Co's railroad lines, and he also was diligent with his time in perfecting the details of the trip. A first class railroad official was quoted when Harry McMillen entered another profession.

Ten members of the Fraternity band accompanied the excursion and furnished music galore. The Legion societies, consisting of Messrs. Thurman, McLeod, Nesbitt, Jennings, Snow and Lindgren, assisted by Joseph Fisher gave an impromptu concert while the crowd was awaiting the arrival of the train at the depot in the evening. The music was of a high order and was continued enroute.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

Illinois Republicans have endorsed Cannon for the presidency.

Do not forget the fact Republican candidates for the various county offices will be selected Tuesday, September 4th.

The newspapers have persisted in calling the senatorial district of which Schoolcraft county is an integral part, the "thirty-first."

Notwithstanding the fact that the gang's mouth-piece is opposing McCallum for representative he will secure the nomination and will be elected.

Now that the physician that enjoyed the graft of the office of city physician, has resigned, it is hoped that the office will now be abolished by the city council.

Hon. J. W. Wells, who was an aspirant for the state senatorship is one of the busiest business men in the state, and after considering the matter thoroughly decided that he would not have time to serve in the senate. During his campaign he made many friends.

Some of the rumpists are disappointed that in their strenuous efforts to get a rooting place at the Senatorial convention, they permitted the nomination for lieutenant governor to get away from them. Dr. Rogers of the Soo finally took pity on the orphan and will be Kimmeler's running mate.

The Detroit press has it that Tip Arwood has jumped W. C. McMillan and is now looking around for some other deserving Michigan statesman whom to bestow the toga. In the connection the name of Truman H. Newberry, now assistant secretary of the navy, is receiving honorable mention. Mining Journal.

The Grand Rapids Press quotes Congressman William Alden Smith as follows: "The Detroit and Saginaw people make light of that great fight up in Escanaba last Saturday when ex-Senator Fuller was nominated for the senate. They would have the impression conveyed that my friends were beaten and had to give in to Fuller. As a matter of fact Fuller is solidly pledged to me and was my candidate. It was understood all along that Mr. Wells should throw his support to Fuller and he did. The machinists do not like to admit that I have made a hole in their boasted support of the upper peninsula, but they know it just the same."

The continued dunces of cold water that conventions everywhere so persistently and systematically apply to the rumpists from this county should, it would seem, discourage the gang in its efforts to over-ride the will of the majority. However, not content with the set backs received at the congressional and senatorial conventions, they have already served notice that in case McEachern does not receive the nomination for representative he will be placed on the ticket anyway.

Parisille's supporters died in the last ditch and proved themselves loyal supporters. Chippewa county does not come out of the fracas with any appreciable honors however. In the first place Parisille's advisors took aboard a rump delegation that did not have a possible show of being seated, and after the action of the committee on credentials and the acceptance of the report by the convention, refused to dump the load. It looks as though Parisille has no use for the majority of the Republicans of this county, and that he is a very poor knacker for the future. Had his supporters kept their hands off the local scrap and had they voted for Fuller, Parisille's nomination two years hence might have been secured by acclamation, instead of being in a haze.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Missing Republican strongly endorses J. H. McCallum for the legislature.

The rumpists are already asserting that they will see to it that McEachern is placed on the ticket whether the convention nominate him or not.

While Editor Andrews is a first-class newspaper man, those hearing him address the convention at Escanaba Saturday say that he would shine as an attorney.

The magnanimous spirit manifested by Hon. J. Wells in withdrawing from the senatorial contest in favor of Hon. O. B. Fuller certainly will not be forgotten. Two years ago Menominee combined with Chippewa county and made Mills' nomination possible. There was a new deal this year and Chippewa secured but little glory out of it.

There apparently were not a sufficient number of Republicans in the county that were willing to serve as delegates to the "rump" convention, for E. E. Farnell who enrolled as a Democrat under the primary law in April, represented the third ward. With such delegates there is little wonder that the ex-chairman of the Democratic county central committee was selected as one of the delegates to the senatorial convention.

It is a far cry that will attribute the defeat of Parisille to any Chippewa county man or set of men. Yet the Soo Times gives Editor Knox of the Soo News full credit for the defeat of the Chippewa county candidate. Parisille had the loyal support of his delegation. They worked and fought for him with consummate ability, and his defeat was unexpected, not as the Times intimates, but by the fact that Wells and Fuller made a compact prior to the convention which made Fuller's nomination a certainty, and Knox had no more to do with that than did Hecox of the Times. Then too Parisille was a little unfortunate in being given the wrong steer when he came to Schoolcraft for support. Experience is a dear teacher.

SENATOR O. B. FULLER.

In the nomination of Hon. O. B. Fuller of Delta, to succeed Senator Mills, the convention held at Escanaba last Saturday certainly effected a very satisfactory settlement of the question. Mr. Fuller has had much experience in legislative circles having been a member of the legislative in the capacity of senator and representative for a number of years.

His nomination was easily effected by the withdrawal of candidate J. W. Wells of Menominee, who delivered the delegation from his county to Mr. Fuller.

That Mr. Fuller will be elected is unquestioned. He will carefully look after the interests of his constituents in the same careful and satisfactory manner as characterized his previous record as an official. His health, which has been precarious, is very much improved.

Schoolcraft county was responsible for his nomination last Saturday as he required one vote aside from Menominee and Delta counties to win out. That the delegation did the proper thing in this case is unquestioned, and it is safe to say that the district will not have cause for regretting its action at Escanaba.

SCHOOLCRAFT'S BRAND OF POLITICS

Schoolcraft's brand of politics is justly becoming the jibe and jest of politicians not only in the upper peninsula but throughout the state.

Strenuous and crookedness are its salient features and some of the schemes hatched and consummated by its devotees would mantle the brow of a brass image with the blush of shame. The real cause of this disgraceful state of affairs is the overwhelming majority of the Republican party as the result of the assimilation of the Democratic party. Not that the members of that party were so numerous prior to being paralyzed, but that the lack of an opposition party has been the breeder of rank competition, graft, crookedness and a total disregard of the ethics of decent politics, within the dominant party, so that the washing of dirty linen at conventions is such regular occurrence that hereafter a washing machine should be added to the paraphernalia of every convention in which Schoolcraft county participates.

MURDER AND ROBBERY CONTINUES UNABATED.
POLICE SEEM UTTERLY POWERLESS
PERPETRATORS OF THE CRIMES GO UNCAPTURED IN MAJORITY OF CASES.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 23.—In spite of the wholesale arrests and deportation of revolutionists the big colored daily chronicle of murder and robbery is not appreciably diminishing. The police seem utterly powerless to capture the perpetrators of the crimes. They do not make an arrest in one case out of twenty-five. While the revolutionary opposition to the government has thus degenerated into a campaign of crime, the Constitutional Democrats, Octoberists and Regenerationists, are drifting. The efforts to effect an amalgamation have failed and all the land was soon greatly at sea as to what leads to pursue.

It is announced that some stallions of the condition of the Jews will be made without awaiting the action of parliament. A consultation is at the ministry of the interior elaborating a general project of law, whose provisions, however, will only include an extension of the limits of the pale of residence and an extension of the rights of higher education.

TROOPS SENT TO SCENE.
Agrarian Situation Grave in Samara Province.
Samara, Russia, Aug. 23.—The agrarian situation in this province is most grave. Disorders are prevalent in numerous districts and troops have been requisitioned to restore order in three localities where firing is going on. Many men have been killed. The peasants of the Kador estate, which recently seized and occupied the land, have returned the property to its owners. A strike of factory hands has begun in Samara. A number of agitators have been arrested.

POISON FOR TROOP.
Attempt to Assassinate Commander of Imperial Guards.
St. Petersburg, Aug. 23.—A story is in circulation here that an attempt has been made to poison General Troop, commander of the imperial police guards, whose illness has just been announced. The general, who has been arrested, has three other arrests to his credit.

Boldly Reply With Volley.
Warsaw, Aug. 23.—An unknown man shot and slightly wounded Count Ferner, a colonel of gendarmes. The patrol of soldiers replied with a volley, killing two passersby.

SITUATION IS SERIOUS
AMERICAN MINISTER TO CHILE TELLS OF CONDITIONS DUE TO BARTHQUAKE.

WORLD SHOCKS CONTINUE TO OCCUR
SAVES THE DESTRUCTION OF VALPARAISO PRECURES FEAR OF A PANIC.

Washington, Aug. 23.—The state department has received the following dispatch from Mr. Hicks, the American minister to Santiago: "Anxiety over earthquake decreases, although mild shocks still continue. Financial and business conditions improve. Destruction of Valparaiso provokes fear of panic. Subscriptions being raised for relief of sufferers."

Sanburg, Aug. 23.—An able dispatch has been received here from Captain Elias of the Hamburg-American liner Thuringia, at Valparaiso, containing the reports that a great part of the city had been destroyed by earth quake and fire. He added: "The shocks continue. The distress is extreme. An angry mob has been seen here. Have 800 homeless people on board."

HALF THE CITY DESTROYED
Private Message Concerning Damage at Valparaiso.
New York, Aug. 23.—Wesell, Daniel O. has received from their branch in Valparaiso the following concerning the damage that has been done in transport:

"About one-half of the city of Valparaiso is destroyed and the balance damaged. Our offices apparently quite safe. More than 2,000 killed or injured."

NOT FELT IN PANAMA.
Chilian Earthquake Did No Damage on Isthmus.
Washington, Aug. 23.—Panama was not in the least affected by the Chilean earthquake, according to the following dispatch received by the Washington office of the International consul from Chief Engineer Stevens, at Calcutta: "Chilian earthquake not recorded nor perceptible at Panama."

HOT FIGHT IN NEBRASKA.
Republican Senatorial Contest in the State Convention.
Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 23.—With every indication of the most exciting Republican convention ever held in the state of Nebraska the supporters of North Brown, the state's attorney general, who is a candidate for the congressional nomination for United States senator, declared that he would have made a high vote on the first ballot of more than enough to nominate. This prediction was denied with emphasis by the supporters of Edward Dowd, who declared that Brown would fall far short of the required number on the first ballot and that from that time forward Dowd would gain until he had been made the nominee.

George L. Sheldon, of Nebraska, the young farmer candidate for governor, has led in the number of planks won from the first and his friends predict an easy victory for him. A list of the other candidates for governor attempted to form a combination against Sheldon, but failed to agree upon a candidate.

In severe the odor is putrid in chronic peritonitis, in scrofula like stale beer, in intermittent fever like fresh baked brown bread, in fever anemic, in hysteria like violets or phosphoric. Measles, diphtheria, typhoid fever, epilepsy, phthisis, etc., have characteristic odors.—Philadelphia Record.

WELLS-FULLER COMBINE EFFICACIOUS

Much Interest manifested in the outcome of the last Manistique election...

To the Editor: Andrew of the Manistique Herald Leader can be placed much of the credit for the brilliant, effective and successful outcome of the convention in question.

His account of the convention will be read with interest by our readers. It follows:

The friends of William Alden Smith was a distinct victory at Manistique on Saturday when Hon. O. B. Fuller of Delta county, was named for state senator to succeed W. N. Mills of Manistowish.

The nomination came as the result of an alliance between Mr. Fuller and John W. Parille, the endorsed candidate of Manistowish county.

It was apparent from the outset, to those who knew of this alliance that John E. Parille, the candidate from the Sea; could not be nominated, since Schoolcraft had pledged its allegiance to Mr. Wells or if Mr. Wells desired it, to Mr. Fuller if he stood where Mr. Wells stood on the question of United States senator.

The rump delegation from Schoolcraft fell by the wayside. It was a contesting delegation basing its hopes upon an interpretation of the new primary law which, if allowed to stand the contestants from Schoolcraft, by the same terms of the law, have unseated the entire Parille delegation from Chippewa.

The Republican senatorial convention at Manistowish on Saturday was an event long to be remembered by those who witnessed it, took part in it or cared anything about its results.

After a whole day spent by Messrs. Webster of the Sea, McManis of Manistowish and Spencer of Escanaba, in an endeavor to win delegates either to Parille or to the contesting delegation from Schoolcraft, the convention was finally called to order at Delta county courthouse and O'clock by A. O. Stephenson of Manistowish, ex-officio chairman of the senatorial committee.

The lines of combat were drawn immediately after Mr. Stephenson and the H. H. Harris of Delta, was nominated by the Parille men for temporary chairman and Judge T. B. White of Delta was named by the combined anti-Parille forces. The vote was 17 for White against 12 for Harris, and the Fuller men realized that the day was theirs.

Without opposition E. W. Dugman of the Sea was chosen secretary of the convention, and then a motion was made to appoint a credentials committee of three. An amendment was offered that the credentials committee consist of one man from each county, which would have meant victory for the rump delegation from Schoolcraft, since at the outset the only counties permitted to vote were Manistowish, Delta, Leno, Mackinac and Chippewa. This amendment failed, and the credentials committee was appointed as follows: Erickson of Delta, Andrews of Manistowish and Marks of Chippewa.

The committee on permanent organization and order of business was St. Jacques of Delta, Handy of Chippewa and La Chance of Mackinac.

The committee on resolutions was Barrie of Manistowish, White of Chippewa, and Cummings of Delta.

An adjournment was then taken for a half-hour, after which the credentials committee presented a majority report signed by Erickson and Andrews stating the original delegates from Schoolcraft, and a minority report signed by Marks endorsing the contesting delegation from Schoolcraft. There was a sharp argument on the adoption or rejection of the minority report, brought up first by motion to amend, and Attorney Handy, of the Sea eloquently set forth the side of the Manistique contestants. R. M. Andrews of Manistowish spoke for the original delegates, and the convention sealed the latter by a vote of 13 to 13.

The temporary organization was then made permanent, and nominations called for by roll call of counties. Attorney Wiley of the Sea placed in nomination John E. Parille. Delta passed to Manistowish, Leno had no candidate Mackinac had none. When Manistowish was called B. M. Andrews offered the name of O. B. Fuller of Delta, at the request of John W. Wells, who so instructed at the caucus held before the convention was called.

Handy of the Sea, seconded the nomination of Parille, Cummings of Delta and Crane of Schoolcraft seconded the nomination of Fuller and the following began:

Chippewa, eight for Parille, Leno two for Parille, Mackinac three for Parille. Total for Parille, 13. Manistowish, nine for Fuller, Delta eight for Fuller, Schoolcraft, four for Fuller. Total for Fuller, 21.

Before the result was announced Mr. Handy moved that the delegates be directed to cast the vote for

Mr. Fuller, and this motion was carried by a rising vote, amid great applause. A committee was appointed, with Mr. Handy as chairman, to escort Mr. Fuller, Mr. Parille and Mr. Wells before the convention. When the names appeared he was given a rapturous reception and made a neat and hearty speech of acceptance, promising to do his full duty to all the district. Mr. Wells said a few words appropriate to the occasion, and Mr. Parille did not appear, having been called from the hall early in the afternoon.

The usual resolutions were adopted, and a motion prevailed to continue the convention at 1 o'clock, therefore, the respective county chairmen as members of the district senatorial committee.

The convention then adjourned, with much handshaking and an evanescent of many good wishes arising from the previous passages of arms.
