## W. H. NELSON DIES

At Hospital in Milwaukee Wednesday Night After Three Months Illness

WAS SUPT. OF FURNACE CO.

And Was Highly Respected in Business and Social Circles.

A telegram was received from Milwaukee yesterday morning announcing the death of Mr. W. H. Nelson, of this city, at one of the hospitals of that city the previous night.

Mr. Nelson has been ill since July 12th from a complication of illness and death was no doubt the result of Bright's disease and dropsy. His daughter, Mrs. Esther Nelson, who has been devotedly caring for him since his illness, took him to a Milwaukee hospital several weeks ago with the hope that the ravages of disease could be stayed by the change, but he grew worse rapidly and death ensued as stated above.

The deceased was born in Orange county, New York about sixty five years ago and became identified with the iron making industry at an early age.

He was in charge of a furnace at Bangor, Mich., for a number of years and from there went to Milwaukee in a similar capacity. Later he had charge of a furnace at Fond du Lac, Wis., for several years and fifteen years ago took charge of the old Excelsior furnace at Alpena, which he lived several years prior to coming to Manistique where he has resided for seven years.

Mr. Nelson was the father of five children, two dying in infancy. Mrs. Nelson died in California three years ago, and during the same year a son and daughter followed their mother to the spirit land. The triple bereavement was a severe shock and his health declined from that time.

He stood high in business and social circles and was highly esteemed for his many good traits of character.

He had the confidence and esteem of his employees to a remarkable degree. Thus, H. Bräde leaves for Milwaukee this evening to attend the funeral which will be held tomorrow morning. The remains were moved from the hospital to the residence of L.

N. Mitchell, and the funeral will be held from there.

It was Mr. Nelson's expressed wish that his remains should be cremated, but whether his wish will be complied with is not known.

## FIRE AT NORTHPORT

Destroys The Northern Hotel And Other Buildings Last Monday

LOSS ESTIMATED AT \$50,000.

Capt. Robertson's Loss \$10,000 With Loss of \$40,000 to Other Buildings.

Fire broke out in the Northern hotel at Northport, Monday afternoon at one o'clock and before the flames could be controlled, except a path through the heart of the thriving little city to the bay, a building loss of about \$50,000 with partial insurance.

The vital being in the southeast corner of the firefighters whose only means of combating the flames were buckets. Later an engine was secured from Traverse City which did good work.

The hotel owned by Sgt. Robertson was burned to the ground. Loss \$10,000; insurance \$4,000. Other stores, just across the street and in this was a grocery store, dry goods store, drug store, the postoffice and the Citizens' Telephone exchange, while above it was Dr. Flock's office. Not a thing was saved from this building. The loss on the stock was \$10,000 and on the building \$8,000, with insurance about two thirds of the loss.

The loss on the Carl Schroeder's residence and contents is about \$5,000, partially insured. The loss on J. H. Robertson's residence and contents is about \$1,500. While the Nelson house was blazing the sparks set fire to the warehouse on the Long ferry dock, which was destroyed with its merchandise. The loss is \$15,000 to \$20,000.

The fire so alarmed the citizens that almost the whole village moved into the street. The fire engines, the Kohler residence and Mrs. Bannerman's residence were badly damaged, but were saved by bucket brigades.

The smoke from the burning town was plainly visible in Traverse City, thirty miles away.

## IMPORTANT MEETING

County Board Will Fix Salaries Also Elect Four Commissioners And County Examiner.

The October session of the board of supervisors which convenes next Monday is an important one for this town. The salaries of the county officials for the next two years will be fixed, a poor commissioner elected to succeed John Tansarack and a member of the teachers examining board appointed. A board of election canvassers will also be appointed.

## DEATH OF AN OLD SETTLER

Walt Brown Died Monday Night After Short Illness.

Walt Brown, one of the old pioneers of this section, died at his home in the vicinity of the brewery last Monday night, after a short illness. He was born in the state of New York, about eight years ago and came to Manistique in 1857 from Duluth, Ind.

He was a stone mason by trade and constructed the foundations of the two new brick and stone buildings at present owned and occupied by John A. Falk, during the first years of his residence here.

He homesteaded the land on which "Brown town" and the brewery is established and has made his home in it steadily for many years.

He went through the war of the Rebellion as a member of Co. C, 107 Regt. N. Y. volunteer infantry of which the late C. C. Fox was captain for some time and marched with Sherman to the sea.

He was highly respected by all knowing him. Funeral services will be held next Sunday.

### MUCH RED TAPE

Will Be Necessary to Secure Citizenship Papers Hereafter.

#### LAW A GOOD ONE

And Will Wound Our Unfortunate Timber, Education Will be Out of Tests.  
 The fifty or more persons that look out their final citizenship papers during the last term of court, evidently had information concerning the course of procedure under the new law that appealed them. As seems to be now in force a remnant of some may interest our readers. The facts have been secured from records that have been received by the local officials from the U. S. Immigration Bureau.  
 In addition to giving the date of birth, native country and the name of the ruler of which he is a subject, the applicant must give his exact height, weight, color of his hair, color of his eyes, distinguishing marks about the face and body, the date of his arrival in this country, port of arrival, and such other information which it has been deemed necessary for the immigration authorities to have. When second papers are taken out by the applicant in addition to the above information he must give the name and address of each of his children and as but two lines are reserved in the record for that information it is probable that the clerk on many occasions when new citizens have been taken under the new act the witnesses must be American citizens.  
 One of the striking provisions of the

new law is the requirement that all petitions for naturalization shall be filed at least ninety days, before the applicant could be heard the same day he filed his petition. The delay will give administrative officers an opportunity to investigate those cases when there may be some doubt as to the moral qualifications of the applicant. The new law provides also that naturalizations shall not be granted within thirty days of any general election. The new law deprives clerks of courts of the power to grant certificates. Certificates must be given up by a judge after a hearing in open court, and the government has a right to appear at the hearing. It is before the court that it is opposed to the granting of a certificate the court is forbidden to issue that certificate until after thirty days, thus giving the government thirty days time in which to institute proceedings against naturalization. The law also provides that the applicant must be of good moral character and the proper authorities are required to make investigation on this point, before the certificate is issued.  
 Applicants for citizenship will find that in addition to the so-called "assault class" to which they are required to subscribe, they must swear that they are not polygamists or believe in polygamy. Another interesting provision is that if any applicant does not take out his second papers within seven years after he has taken out his first papers he must begin again.
