## REPUBLICAN LANDSLIDE

The Next Congress Will be Overwhelmingly Republican. Only One Democratic Member in Mich. Legislature.

### WARNER'S MAJORITY 90,000

Candidates on the County Ticket Receive Handsome Majorities Despite Light Vote Polls

The American people by the exercise of the elective franchise, endorsed Roosevelt and his issue in no uncertain tone Tuesday Congress continues overwhelmingly Republican. Hearstian received its death blow in New York and the nation will therefore not be factor in national politics in 1908. Hearstian majority exceeds 60,000.

Governor Warner's admirable administration was endorsed by a 90,000 majority, which is phenomenal, considering the fact that this was a "off year" and a very light vote was cast. Michigan will be represented in congress by a solid Republican delegation, and but one lone Democrat will have a seat in the state legislature.

The prosperous conditions that can be almost wholly attributed to the policies and role of Republicanism, had much to do with the results. The people are apt to let well enough alone.

Hon. H. C. Young, received the fall vote of the party as did Hon. O. B. Palmer.

### MANISTIQUE LINE COMPLETED

You Can Now Hello to Manistique at an Inch Per.

The Michigan State Telephone Co. has completed its line from this city as far as Manistique, and the new line carried the first message from that city to Manistigon, in this city about four o'clock Wednesday afternoon. About five minutes later, then, the courtesy of Mr. Thomas, the editor of the Journal and Editor Holstein, of the Manistique Pioneer-Tribune, exchanged mutual greetings. The line worked perfectly, so well, in fact, that the writer could see the smiles which Bro. Holstein could not keep from over-expressing his face at the thought that the long wished for long distance connection had been made so that Manistique can talk with the outside world.

Manager Thomas says that the line will be completed as far east as Hickey Junction this fall, and next spring it will be continued to Trout Lake. Escanaba Journal.

### TOOK HIM FOR A DEER

Will Hall of Ionia, Instantly Killed by Companion who Thought Him a Deer.

AFFAIR OCCURRED AT FIRE.

The man that did the killing is an attorney from Ionia.

William Hall, a young man hunting party camping near Ionia, near Trout Lake was instantly killed Wednesday by one of his companions who mistook him for a deer.

The first shot struck him in the breast and knocked him down. He attempted to rise and the excited hunter shot him again killing him instantly.

The man that did the killing was S. C. Miller, an attorney, who is pronounced the sheriff of Chippewa county and retained H. M. Cron as his attorney.

The remains were shipped to Ionia for burial.

This is the first fatality of the season, that does not commence until tonight at midnight.

**Beavers become Pests.**  
Unless action is taken to curb the insatiable hunger of beavers in the upper peninsula, writes a Sault Ste. Marie correspondent, old trappers claim that one of the greatest trout fishing fields in the United States will be ruined. The work of the animals in damming the streams has destroyed the spawning beds and it is almost impossible to catch a trout now where a few years ago one could catch hundreds in a few hours.  
Hart Dean of Dick, who is considered one of the best posted woodsmen and trappers in Michigan, says that unless something is done the streams will be ruined within three years. At the present time it is unlawful to kill beavers, the animals being protected by law which will not allow a hunter to shoot for four years yet. Meanwhile, the animals are increasing rapidly. Lumbermen are also complaining of the destruction of timber by the animals. In many localities where streams have been dammed the banks flooded, timber has been ruined. Some lumbermen have resorted to dynamite to blow up the dams but this does little good, as the animals rebuild the dams and soon the land is covered with water again. It is then necessary to cut the timber at once in order to save it.  
Origin of Oxygen.  
Lord Kelvin once showed that all the oxygen in the atmosphere probably came from the action of sunlight on plants. When the earth was first populated by plants, the oxygen in the atmosphere was so low that it contained not one molecule of oxygen for every ten molecules of nitrogen. ## GAIN SCORE OF SEATS

**DEMOCRATS INCREASE MEMBERSHIP IN LOWER BRANCH OF CONGRESS.**

**BABCOCK AND WADSWORTH BEATEN.**

**SEVERAL LEADERS OF NATIONAL REPUTE AMONG THOSE TO BE DEFEATED.**

**CANNON SECURES USUAL PLURALITY.**

**RETURNED FOR SEVENTEENTH TIME BY THE VOTERS OF HIS DISTRICT.**

Washington, Nov. 8.—President Roosevelt's appeal for a Republican

congress was not in vain. With the count still going on the result as far as the election of 219 Republican congressmen and 163 Democrats, with four districts to hear from. The most magnificent prediction put out by Chairman Sherman previous to the election was that the Republicans would retain control of the house by fifty.

As the returns stand now the Democrats have gained twenty-four districts held in the present congress by the republicans, as follows:

Illinois 2, Indiana 1, Iowa 1, Missouri 4, Nebraska 1, New Jersey 3, New York 1, North Carolina 1, Ohio 3, Pennsylvania 5, Wisconsin 1 and Minnesota 1.

In Illinois the defeated Republicans are Rolves and Dickson of the Twenty-first and Twenty-third districts; in Indiana Cromer of the Eighth; in Iowa Leacy of the Sixth; in Missouri Peterson of the Fourth, Ellis of the Fifth, Welborn of the Seventh and Caulkins of the Fifteenth; in Nebraska Kennedy of the Second; in New York Wadsworth of the Thirty-fourth; in New Jersey Pickett of the Ninth; in North Carolina Blackburn gives his seat to a Democrat in Pennsylvania Dale of the Tenth, Fisher of the Eleventh and Samuel of the Six-

teenth Kentucky district, where A. D. James defeated Representative Richardson. This is the only Republican gain so far reported.

Speaker Cannon received his usual 15,000 majority and comes back to Congress for the seventeenth time. The fight against Representative Daboll of Pittsburg was futile, as Mr. Daboll is re-elected with a reduced majority. Mr. Wadsworth, who is chairman of the house committee on agriculture, was defeated by Peter A. Porter, who announced himself first as an independent Republican and at present Independent. He was endorsed by both the Democrats and Independence League.

**BY REDUCED PLURALITY.**

Republicans Achieve Victory in Delaware.

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 8.—While the Republicans suffered a loss in majority at the election, they nevertheless returns they have achieved a greater victory than ever. The majority for Dr. Hiram M. Burton, candidate for congress, Thomas N. Rawlins for state treasurer and Thomas C. Roe for state auditor is not likely to be more than made up this falling off was more than made up in successes along other lines.

Despite some fractional opposition the Republicans have elected their county ticket in each of the three counties, while the legislators who their gains are decisive. On joint ballot the legislature stands; Republicans, 36; Democrats, 16.

**OHIO AGAIN REPUBLICAN.**

State Ticket Elected by Plurality of 75,000.

Columbus, O., Nov. 8.—In a telegram to President Roosevelt Senator Charles Dick, chairman of the Republican state committee, claimed the election of all the Republican candidates on the state ticket by 75,000 and the election of seventeen Republican congressmen.

Republican Ticket Elected, Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 8.—The anti-Republican ticket headed by Governor Brooks has been elected by a majority not less than 2000. The Republicans also elect the congressmen and the legislature, which will elect a United States senator.

Republicans Win in Michigan.

Detroit, Nov. 8.—Governor Warner, Rep., has carried the state by a majority of about 20,000. The vote is about two-thirds that of 1904. All the Republican candidates for congress were elected.

The following resolution was offered by Ald. Durno who moved its adoption, and motion was seconded by Ald. Burrell.

WHEREAS there is not sufficient money in the Fire Police, Waterworks and Street funds of the City to meet the immediate necessary expenses of the City to be paid from said funds until the City taxes assessed and levied and collected;

WHEREAS there is at present in the contingent fund of said city more than is necessary for the payment of the immediate contingent expenses of said City to be paid during the time until taxes assessed and levied are available for City use but which will be needed in said contingent fund later for contingent expenses of the city;

THEREFORE be it resolved by the common council of the City of Manistique that there be temporarily transferred from the contingent fund, the following sums to be temporarily credited to the above funds as follows: Fire fund \$600.00; Police Fund \$900.00; Water Works and Sewer Fund \$1200.00; Street Fund \$2000.00 which amounts are temporarily advanced to the respective funds aforesaid for the purpose of meeting immediate expenses until the taxes assessed and levied are available for City use and as soon as the various funds have sufficient funds therein, the above amounts temporarily transferred shall be repaid from said funds to the Contingent Fund. Be it further

RESOLVED that the treasurer of the city is instructed to temporarily credit the funds here mentioned with the amounts mentioned as to be transferred from the Contingent Fund and said treasurer is further instructed to repay to and credit the contingent fund with said amounts from the various funds named as soon as sufficient amount of taxes assessed and levied are paid into said city.

**FROM HON. A. MCEACHERN.**

Gives an interesting description of Edinonton and Northwest Territory.

Mr. C. W. Damon received the following interesting letter describing the Canadian Northwest, and the city of Edinonton, from Hon. A. McEachern, which will be read with interest by his friends in this section of Michigan.

I have at length arrived at Edinonton, the Queen City of the Northwest. I find that the people are a strange mixture, comprising Americans, Canadians, and foreigners of every known hue. There are a great many progressive Americans arriving here with plenty of capital to invest, and they seem to be investing it with a liberal hand.

All public utilities are owned and operated by the city, such as electric lights, water works, and street railways. They have adopted the single tax system.

You pay taxes on your land only, and not on your stock and trade, and only property owners can vote at the elections.

Edinonton is built on a magnificent plateau, 200 feet above the river bed. There are six real mines in operation within a radius of nine miles each, and being delivered at any residence here for \$4.00 a ton. Schools and churches are first class, and hotels are keeping pace with the requirements of the city. Two colleges are also located here. Real estate is advanced 200 per cent and in 1 year here two years ago. There are three transcontinental railroads building, two of them already here—13 banks and a number more coming.

The crops have been fairly good in the entire northwest this season, and all appear to be prosperous and having a very good year. The homesteaders are committed to the railroads are mostly all

taken up for long distances back. Farm lands have been changing hands readily from \$1000 to \$1500 per acre, for an excellent price.

Edinonton has a population of from 1500 to 2000 people. The Parliament buildings for the Province of Alberta will be built next summer. The streets have already been let, a new post office cost somewhere about \$50,000.

Two new one million dollar bridges were built here, and Hamilton Hall, Municipal and Telephone buildings, penitentiary, hospital and other buildings too numerous to mention.

The weather since I parted with you at Manistique has been beautiful. The flowers are still in blossom, and potatoes are being dug daily. You will please give my kind regards to my many friends in your city, and for the future address me at Calgary, Alta.

**Communication From Dr. Ross.**

DEAR SIR: Last week's issue of the Courier Record contained an article in regard to my presence at Edinonton, which was a case that I was treating was singled out and a question was raised as to the correctness of my diagnosis. I do not know from which source the author draws his medical information, nor whether or not he intended any discount on me, but I will endeavor to reply to it as completely as possible.

Diphtheria is defined as an acute infectious disease, characterized by an exudate in the throat and dependent upon a specific germ known as the Klebs-Löffler bacillus. There are cases of diphtheria closely simulating it, but in which we have all the typical symptoms, the exudate in the throat, and nothing but a bacteriological examination with differentiation between them. Our state infirmary laboratory at Ann Arbor where cultures can be sent and the drug tests thus obtained to an absolute certainty. At a convention of health officers held at Ann Arbor three years ago and which it was my privilege to attend, Professor Vaughan strongly urged local health boards to avail themselves of the privilege of this laboratory. In the absence of such an examination, medical authorities claim we are justified in pronouncing such cases diphtheritic if this membrane adheres to the throat more than twenty-four hours. In the case referred to both tonsils were completely covered with the membrane when I was first called on Wednesday and there was no exfoliation of the same until the following Saturday, and it then came away into it in its usual alphabetic manner. Will our editorial friend kindly explain this feature? However he is not the only doctor in regard to the genuineness of this outbreak of diphtheria, and so I make this statement: There are times when the public must rely somewhat upon the judgment and integrity of the physician. We can not take every damning one to the bedside of our patient and hold an

**GUES TO ALGER COUNTY**

Cleveland Hills Iron County Transfer Farming Operations in Alger County.

The Cleveland Hills Iron Company, has decided to transfer its farming operations from the Bellevue and Iron Hills farms, both located only a few miles from Edinonton, to Alger county, where it has much arable land of extraordinary productivity. Most of the live stock on the farms near here will be sold, but the horses and farm implements will be removed to Alger county. A 200 acre tract of land, about five miles from Chatham, Alger county, will be cleared. Special attention will be given to the raising of grain for which the soil is best adapted. There will be no further attempt at stock raising. One reason for the removal is that the company has in the vicinity of its new Alger county farm an immense area of land that will be sold in desired parcels to settlers, while none of its lands in this country can be had for purchase because of their possible mineral wealth. In time Alger county promises to be the principal agricultural district of the upper peninsula.

**RECORDS ARE ALL SURPASSED**

Traffic Through Soo Canal Will Exceed 50,000,000 Tons.

The monthly traffic report issued from the canal office at the Soo this week shows that at the close of navigation at midnight October 31 the record year's tonnage had been reached and passed, with nearly two months of the season yet to run. The prediction made early in the season that the 50,000,000 mark would be passed at the close of navigation in December is now to come true.

Total tonnage for 1915 was 44,570,680, while the tonnage to November 1 this year was 44,494,880, leaving an increase for this year to date of 18,000 tons.

Allowing for the remainder of the season only the same amount of traffic as last year, the total at the close of navigation will be 50,681,480 net tons. At the present rate of increase it will come somewhere near the fifty-two million mark.
