**EDITORIAL COMMENT.**

Wonder how many thousands of dollars have been invested by Maniquians in worthless mining stock speculations?

Schoolcraft county's share of the primary school apportionment made last Friday is \$28,314 as there are 2,574 children of school age in the county.

The handsome new high school building at Crystal Falls was dedicated last week with appropriate exercises, and the Crystal Fall Diamond Drill instituted a creditable school issue in honor of the event.

Editor Baldwin of the Pickford Clarion printed a campaign sheet for men opposed to Prosecuting Attorney Holden of CHIPPEWA county, and was arrested on the charge of criminal libel.

Ford River is the banner Republican precinct in the state as only one Democratic vote was cast there out of a total of 124. There are about as many Democratic votes at Ford River as there are A. P.'s on Beaver Island.

Wonder whether the local fellows that have so much to say about Wisconsin revoking the N. P. L.'s license will be equally vociferous in announcing the fact that Kentucky has revoked the license of the Mutual Life Ins. Co. of New York.

The Escanaba Mirror claims that a Manistique man, a good bright fellow too, put up at a Chicago hotel recently and turned on his gas jets and succeeded in lighting one before the match burned his fingers, and was nearly dead when discovered.

It has been ascertained that more than a million dollars that was sent to San Francisco was stolen by some of the officials, and as President Roosevelt is said to be behind the determination to punish the guilty men, no doubt results in that direction may be expected.

Governor Rich had the honor of receiving a majority of 106,000 in 1894, and he is the only candidate for governor that received a majority in excess of the one accorded Fred Warner last week. The latter's 92,000, when the light vote is considered, is equal to Rich's 106,000.

Cases of true love are found outside of the sentimental novels sometimes. Two Ishpeming young people became engaged two months ago and shortly thereafter for the young man in the case lost his arms and eyes as the result of a powder explosion. He offered to release the young lady from the compact but she with commendable spirit refused and as a result they were married last week. His employer made him a present of \$10,000 in dividends paying stocks at the time the accident occurred. It is hardly necessary to add that big hearted Thomas Cole was the donor.

Georgia has passed a law making it a misdemeanor for a child to work in factories, and children are compelled to go to school a portion of every year. That state has been completely under the domination of wealthy cotton mill owners for many years, and vast fortunes have been made at the expense of the lives of children in their employ. Imagine if you can your little eight or nine year old daughter or son working twelve hours every night for six nights in a week for mere pittance and you will get a faint idea of what the conditions are in that and other southern states. A man guilty of laying such expensive tribute upon humanity, and being responsible for premature deaths and dwarfed intellects in order to acquire wealth certainly will have much to answer for when he appears before the judgment throne.

In view of the fact that M. J. Doyle of Menominee was elected the public prosecutor of the Democratic ticket with some 600 votes to the good it is easier to understand why W. N. Mills resigned the nomination on the Republican ticket after he had fairly secured it. Evidently Mr. Mills realized it was a gold brick, hence his willingness to hand it to someone else.—Mining Journal

If the gentlemen who are talking about the State of Superior will only show us how their plans of divorcing the upper peninsula from the rest of Michigan is even remotely practicable, we will be much obliged. What's going to do it? The votes of lower Michigan? It is surprising that this State of Superior talk has been taken as seriously as it has, and that it has received but an inconsequential amount of serious attention.—Mining Journal.

**THE CHIEF REASON FOR THE ATTACK.**

When the Record man made his initial attack on the N. P. L. it was suggested by the secretary of the local legion, that the fact that he was receiving a salary from the order was one of the chief reasons for the attack on the order. This suspicion was confirmed when said editor's "weather vane" floated airily over the townsite last week prior to the publication of that paper and announced to those who would listen that "Holbein is receiving a big salary out of it," and the recent issue of the paper clinches it.

The citizens of Manistique are pretty well acquainted with the editors of the city, know their status as to ability and the secrets that promote such unwarranted attacks as the one above referred to. Their recital may be uninteresting to our readers but under the circumstances an explanation is deemed necessary.

Several years ago a number of sore-head and non-scoring politicians decided that the PIONEER-TRIBUNE and its editor were contributory causes for their non success, and the result was another newspaper. A muddlinger was imported and a merry war was the result. Said artist was unsuccessful in accomplishing the object for which he was hired and after a year, was fired. An alliance was then made by the company in question, with the Courier man he losing the identity of his paper, and being willing to accept a minority interest in the concern. He started out bravely to continue the work so well done by his predecessor, Evans, but in time began to lag. Recently his owners decided that he was not earning his salary hence the attack upon the legion and its local officers.

The writer has been secretary of the legion ever since it was started here, and is proud of the fact that but two votes have been cast against him during the ten elections he has passed through. His salary is fixed by the constitution of the order and it may be said in this connection that orders of this nature are not known to pay more than the work is worth. The fact that he is receiving the salary is where the shoe pinches, "It is the only thing that keeps us from running him out of town" is the way one of the outfit expressed himself.

Envy and jealousy is behind the whole matter, and it is a poor specimen of a man that will attempt to disorganize an order locally because he is envious of some of the officers. Had the editor of the Record taken out a policy or two in the legion several years ago as six hundred of his fellow citizens have done he would not now be occupying the unenviable position he does, that of servant for a gang of unscrupulous men that are actuated by jealousy and sordid motives.

Much more could, and perhaps will be written on the subject, but the revealing of the real secret of this attack at the present time will suffice.
