THE UNION SERVICES

At the Freshythen Church were Very Largely Attended Yesterday

A VERY EXCELLENT SERMON

Delivered by Rev. Edmonds, The Magnificent Feature Also.

The Union Thanksgiving service held at the Presbyterian church yesterday morning was largely attended. Rev. Edmonds of the Methodist church delivered a very able sermon which elicited much favorable comment from the view points of delivery and subject matter.

The singing was also excellent. The high school glee club under the direction of Miss Thompson, rendered an excellent selection as did a male quartet consisting of Messrs. Jewell, Kefauver, C. O. Water and Ferris. Miss Elfrith Brown sang a solo in her usual pleasing manner.

A synopsis of Rev. Edmonds' sermon follows:

Psalm 133:1—Blessed be the nation whose God is the Lord and the people whom he hath chosen as his own inheritance.

On this national Thanksgiving occasion when Christian people assemble in their places of public worship to offer their sacrifice of thanksgiving to God we gladly declare ourselves a Christian nation.

Many of our people will fall to regret to-day other than as day for freedom or independence yet the proclamation of our national president and of the chief executives of the various states of the union calling upon the people to observe the day as a day of public thanksgiving shows that as a nation we are patriotic and not heathen.

The God of the Bible and of the Christian church is the God of our nation. Our text proclaims the blessedness of such a condition. David has in his mind the favored condition of Israel as a nation compared with other nations with which they were surrounded. Israel was a nation chosen of God for the purpose of keeping in the minds of the people the thought of the one God. Israel was not more truly chosen of God than is our own nation.

The Israelites were in bondage in Egypt. The Pilgrims were in religious bondage in Europe. Israel was divinely guided to the promised land. We will say that God was not the Guide and inspiration of the founders of this nation who for liberty of conscience and the right to worship God according to its dictate brand the dangers of the ocean

and the hardships of out-fording a Christian community in a foreign land.

The land of promise to the Israelites was a good land flowing with milk and honey. Surely that was choosing the better class for them a land rich in all the good things. Think of our inheritance. What God has given us. The greatest portion of our nation are among the marvels of history. The colonies that lay along the Atlantic shore have expanded into the foremost nation of our day. The less than three millions of people have grown to about eighty millions.

In climate, agricultural productivity and in mineral resources our wealth is almost unlimited.

This is a nation, blessed of God in the character and intelligence of its people.

When God laid the foundations of the Jewish nation, he chose Abraham, a man of faith as the father of that nation. When God laid the foundation of our nation he chose the very best blood and heart of the old world and transplanted them in this new.

They were men of God. Men who had a conscience, and had the courage to obey its dictates. They claimed the right denied them in the old land, but obtained in the new.

The colonies became the asylum of the best people of Europe.

Three great factors have contributed to the building of the character of the American people, a free church, a free school and a free press.

They have seen the evils of a State church in the old world and wisely divorced the church from the State in this nation.

But in a free state with civil and religious liberty as the watchword of the nation an uneducated people is an absolute necessity. Russia can possibly get along with an ignorant people but in a country like this where every citizen is a sovereign the free school becomes one of the bulwarks of the nation, and that is the aim and object of the longest and bravest as a traitor to the man or society of church that would destroy these bulwarks of our national strength, a free church a free school and a free press.

But why make these statements for our self glorification. No, No. As we calmly study the situation and see the evidences of Gods hand in the forming and guiding of our nation, we shall discover that there are evidences of divine chastening sufficient to rub us of all vain glorying. The parable of the wheat and the tares have a very forceful illustration in our national life. We have had the tares as well as the wheat. Does it not seem strange that in a country where liberty and equality are the

state words that a system of human slavery would possibly exist. What is the constitution of our nation declares for all men the inalienable rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Liberty was the good seed, slavery the tares. The devil of a business and greed sowed it upon. American soil and it over this nation the awful churning of the civil war is not out of the tares from the wheat.

Today we have the free church and the free school that stand for the intellectual and moral development of the people the legalized nation. The school is the enemy of the state, selfishness and greed.

When the Lord erects a house of prayer the devil builds a tower there.

If this contingency should occur the upper peninsula would again come into its own in some Fuller should be elected as president of the body.

EARNING HIS SALARY.

Sup't Gleason Retires, Statement that He is "Scattering" in His Experiments

INCREASED INTEREST MANIFESTED

By the Farmers in Matters Agricultural Institutes Largely Attended

The Crystal Falls Diamond Drill outfit Sup't Gleason of the experiment station a recent issue concerning the "manure" staple, crops that he had been exploiting. The drill outfit that certainly did an injustice to the best friend the upper peninsula farmers have, was copied by one of our local correspondents who has been a hay farmer advocate for several years.

Gleason has answered the Diamond Drill in the following terse and succinct language.

I note your editorial in which you claim that the number of staple crops which I have been exploiting has become so large that the attempt to swell all of them is causing a severe mental strain. The total number of these crops is four, viz: sugar beets, alfalfa, corn, and more recently hemp. How some of these have already helped to promoting upper peninsula development has been stated very recently in several upper peninsula newspapers, thus showing the incorrectness of your statement when you claim that "hay is all that" when the only practical farm product grown to date.

To exhibit these, and I hope other, staple crops which I had fully adapted to this peninsula is part of a program which I consider essential for the purpose of informing the outside world that the upper peninsula will eventually become something better than a mere hay field, for being capable of producing just as profitable crops, there is no reason why the farming lands should not be worth every bit as much as the land of two hundred dollars an acre farming lands in the other agricultural states. I stated two or three years ago before the Lake Superior Fress Association, and I am fully justified in repeating that the present value of the upper peninsula is agricultural development rather than agricultural education. The attempt to reform or educate the hay farmer is an undertaking which I have given up several years ago and further back and you do the practical farmer a great injustice.

CLERGY GET SPECIAL RATE

Will Not be as Low, However, as it Was Formerly.

Notwithstanding the reports that have been in circulation concerning the clergy rates not being given special rates, since the new interstate commerce law was passed, they will be able to travel for two cents per mile in all sections of the United States. The Central Passenger association, at a recent meeting, took the action.

At the passing of the new rate law it was announced that no special rates would be given, under any circumstances, and their recent decision of the association will be welcomed by the clergy.

Hitherto they have been given a rate of one fare a round trip, or half fare for a single trip. Now they will pay two cents a mile for travel in any state governed by the Central Passenger association. The clergy bureau of the association, it is further announced will still be maintained.

Died Last Friday Evening.

Fireman Langley who was so terribly injured by contact with the coal crane at Isabella on Tuesday of last week, died last Friday evening at six o'clock at the Manistique hospital. He had no organ consciousness at any time since the accident. Dr. Minchen of Green Bay, and Purvill of Escanaba, removed the crushed leg a few hours before death, relieving the pressure from the brain.

Just recollect how many times Escanaba people have been swindled out of their money during mining crazes. We could mention a lot of names of mining schemes that are associated with rills and sorrow. Talk with some of the victims of those days and be wise in your day. We know that most men have got the "get rich quick" taint in their blood, but you can fight it off if you will give it due reflection to the misery which blighted mining speculation will bring upon your helpless wife and children as well as yourself. Think it over!

Post Card Rules.

At the present time a great many post cards are sent thru the mails. Most of them are view or scenic cards but a few are indecent and vulgar. The following order of the postmaster general may be

of interest: "In view of the large number of objectionable post cards recently deposited in the mails, the attention is especially directed to that provision of the Postal Laws and Regulations reading as follows: "All matter which is manifestly obscene, lewd or lascivious will, when deposited in a postoffice, be withdrawn from the mails and sent to the Dead Letter Office." Under this rule every post card bearing a picture or language that is obscene, indecent or improperly suggestive should be immediately withdrawn from the mails and forwarded without delay to the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Dead Letters. If there is doubt as to whether a card is sufficiently objectionable to warrant its exclusion it should be forwarded to the First Assistant Postmaster General for decision. Postmasters are directed to exercise all possible vigilance in the enforcement of this regulation." In connection with this ruling it may be stated that a person convicted of sending obscene or indecent matter through the mails is liable to a fine of not more than \$5,000 or imprisonment at hard labor not more than five years, or both, at the discretion of the court.
