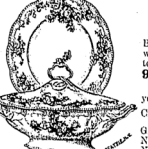

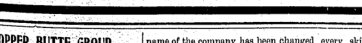

COPPER BUTTE GROUP. To Be Operated on Large Scale with New Owners in Progress. Life has been injected into the Copper Butte Mining Co., whose properties are located near Florence, Ariz., and Lake Superior enterprise, and ability have been the place of apparent incompetence and inexperience. These properties were originally promoted under the name of Arizona Copper Mountain, and being vested in Minnesota parties. Under the management of the late Walter H. F. Elliott, Capt. J. J. Hawden and Dr. VanStratman of Chicago, their report, which was published at the time, speaking in very complimentary terms of the property. The management seemed to be able to handle the undertaking, however, a few months ago the control passed to Lake Superior Copper Co. Harry Roberts of Detroit, assumed the management. There is a great deal of stock in the company held by the "Copper" range, and it now looks as though the holders were at last to have a chance for their money. It will be pleased to own to local shareholders to hear that Capt. Roberts is now on the ground, and that practical work is under way under his direction. Funds for the most operations are being received from the sale of pooled stock at 10 cents on the dollar, the price on which will be advanced, we are informed, to 15 cents as the stock remaining intact. The following article concerning the Copper Butte mine, as it appeared in the Arizona Blade of Florence, Nov. 10, 1909, is of interest to the Arizona Copper Mountain Mining Co. has been reorganized and the name of the company has been changed to Copper Butte Mine. Captain Harry Roberts, one of the leading iron miners of Minnesota, and William Lucas of Hurley, Wis., together with other associates, are in control of the new company, and are now on the ground, arranging plans for extensive development work and for shipping ore. This work will be preliminary to the installation of a large reduction plant, the character of which will be determined by extensive experiments in the treatment of the ore, to ascertain the most effective and economical process of extracting the metal therefrom. There are several million tons of ore now in sight on the Copper Butte claims, and the surface configuration of the property is such as to enable the company to quarry this ore to a depth of 100 feet, at a cost of about five cents per ton. Captain Harry Roberts, the president and general manager of the new company, knows what he and his friends were buying, for he had had for the old company, to a depth of 400 feet, one of the finest bodies of copper ore in the territory, and he had secured in payment for the work. This shaft is at 60 degrees incline, with 10x10 wall plates, five feet apart, 8x10 centers, and solid two by two lagging from top to bottom on all sides of the shaft. The compartments are 5x5 in the clear, with an skip track in each, upon which is operated a two ton skip. This skip is handled by a large hoisting plant. The ore bed was encountered in the shaft at a depth of 100 feet and was found to be dipping south at an angle of about 45 degrees, hence the shaft was driven east. It proved to be 300 feet thick, and a grab sample taken from every ship load hoisted, showed the general average of the copper content for the 200 feet of ore passed through to be about 8 percent, the samples running from 5 to 1 percent. In places the ore also yielded high gold and silver values—many specimens showing clear native gold were taken out. This property lies about 20 miles east of Florence, and three-fourths of a mile from the Gila river, and the P. & E. Ry., which will, inside of two years, be a main transcontinental line of the Santa Fe system. The survey for the new cut off on the main line of the Southern Pacific, also passes within 300 yards of this property. That this property will become one of the great copper producers of Arizona is beyond question, for it now has sufficient ore in sight to justify the erection of a 1000 ton reduction plant. SCHOONER WRECKED AT NAUBWINWAY

Loss of Capt. Dow, Her Owner, Placed at \$2,500.

The schooner La Rabala of Manitowish, Capt. Arthur Dow, was one of victims of the storm of Sunday night, November 23th, and is a total loss.

The La Rabala struck Potter reef, near Naubwinway, Mich., during a heavy snow storm, while bound south with a cargo of Christmas trees. As she was leading belly Capt. Dow was compelled to beach the vessel at Point Patterson, where she was panned to pieces. As the schooner struck bottom 200 feet from shore Capt. Dow and his crew of three men had a most thrilling experience in making a landing, being literally thrown upon the beach by the waves. Their boat was capsized, but they clung to the craft until it reached ashore. They were exposed to the freezing wind all night and only by heroic efforts kept from dying of the exposure. In the morning the men found a shack in the woods and after drying their clothes reached a rail yard and returned to their homes.

The Rabala, was one of the most widely known schooners on the lakes, as was also her master and owner, Capt. Dow. The loss on the vessel and cargo is placed at \$2,500, and there was no insurance on either the boat or trees.

COLOR COMBINATIONS.

How They Were Cleverly Used in Expanding a Friend.

Then the card was handed to him, and he was ordered to read the writing on it through the glasses.

This he did without hesitation, and the cheat was at once exposed. Owing to the effect which the colored glass must have had upon the green writing the sound right eye fitted with the red glass could not possibly distinguish the writing on the black surface of the card, while the left eye, which he pretended was sightless, was the one with which the reading had to be done.—London Standard.

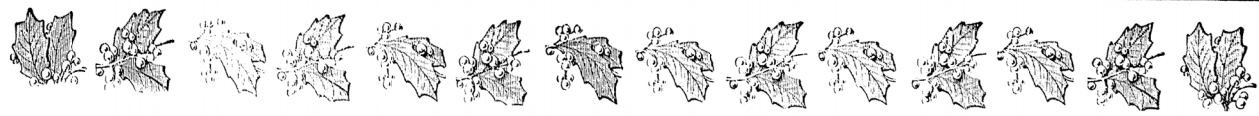

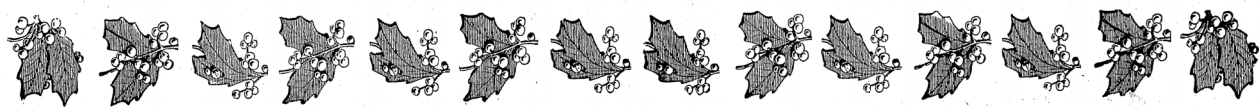

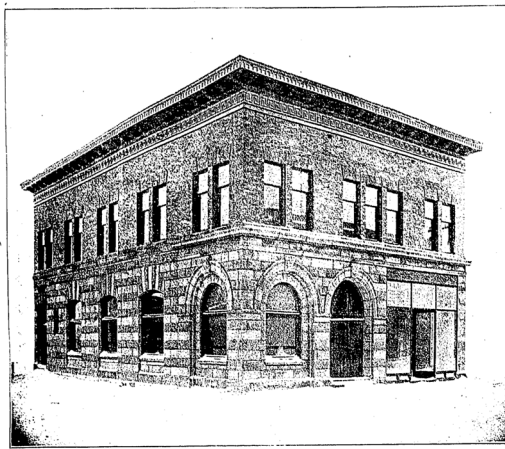
