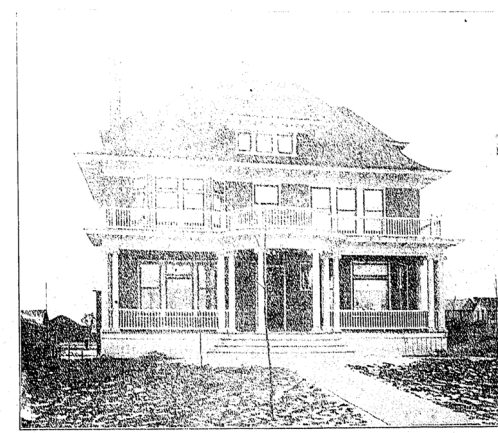

IS ONE OF THE BEST

The New Residence of Harry Ross Is the Equal of Any House in the City

HAS ADMIRABLE LOCATION

And The Interior Finishing Very Expensive and Beautiful.

Very few residences of the better class were built in Manistique during the past year. Among these is the handsome home of Harry Ross, a picture of which appears elsewhere. The building was designed by Architect De Mar of the Soo, and the work was done by Contractor John Larsen, who lives in the Nicholson and Flanagan residences in his credit, which with the Ross and Wood residences constitute the three handsomest and most expensive residences in the city.

Mr. Ross was wise in the selection of a site. The house occupies an elevated vantage on the north side of Arbutus Ave. between Maple and Lake streets and faces Lake Michigan.

The house is built of wood and its dimensions are 28x34 feet. The walls are of oak, builting stone laid in one-third cement mortar and plastered with cement to grade. Above the grade the walls are made of oak, formerly covered stone, hammer dressed and neatly pointed with colored mortar. The basement which occupies the entire dimensions of the house is plastered with cement and has a substantial cement floor. It is divided into convenient rooms viz: hall, vegetable room, laundry, heater room, bath rooms for hand and soft coal three closets and a toilet room. The hot water system of heating is used.

The first floor of the building is entered through a heavy casing door with beveled glass in upper panel, five feet six inches by four feet nine inches in size. This is finished in oak with oak walls and walls are decorated in red with cream tiled ceiling. Another oaken door with art glass panel leads to the hall which is eleven feet six inches by twelve feet six inches in size. This is also finished in oak and decorated similar to the vestibule. The walls which is paneled oak. In the northwest corner, to the left of the stairway is a small alcove arranged with book shelves.

The living room is entered from the hall through sliding doors to the left of the entrance from the hall. This room contains a handsome oaken oak grate and is finished in oak. The walls are tinted brown while the ceiling is cream in color. It is well lighted by large double windows opening on the southeast corner, and is as the most significant living room, and one that the occupants may well feel proud of. In the east end are placed gaudy bay windows and cases finished in oak. The floor is of selected birch.

Back of and connected with the living room is the dining room which is thirteen feet three inches by fifteen feet six inches. It is wainscoted to a height of five feet in oak paneling and is lighted by four windows in the west end. Two columns in the rear wall between the two rooms add much to the appearance of the room. The floor is of selected birch. The walls are paneled in half birch. The walls are finished in half birch with white ceiling built into the wall across the east end are drawers and shelves making convenient receptacles.

des. The room as a whole is an exceptionally pleasant one.

The entrance to the reception room is to the right of the entrance from the vestibule, and connected with the hall by an archway of similar design as that between the dining and living rooms.

The kitchen in the northeast corner of the building is a model one, and is connected with the dining room with a hallway. Adjoining this is the hot poultry, convenient to the range and a very suitable adjunct. The china cabinet is located on the other side of the kitchen and is very commodious and conveniently appointed. The kitchen is finished in solid Norway pine with maple floor. The wainscoting is four and one half feet high and consists of wainscoted plaster tiling. The walls and ceiling are half tiled. Stairways lead to the basement and second floor from the kitchen.

The main stairway is in the north end of the building and is constructed of oak and finished in white. The landing is lighted by a bay window of leaded glass. Its walls are decorated in red and shaded to light tint of the dome of the arched ceiling, being very artistic in effect. The large hall on second floor is decorated in red with cream tiled ceiling. To the left on reaching the upper hall is the open hot room, which is a well lighted room. The walls are of a dim color with cream tiled ceiling. Connected with this room is a den finished in similar manner. In the south east corner of the house is the family sleeping room and is large and well lighted from the front of the house. The walls and ceiling are finished in blue and cream. This is one of the pleasantest rooms of the house. Across the hall to the children's room with pink tiled walls and cream ceiling. One of the attractive features of these sleeping apartments are the wardrobes built into the partitions and arranged with small closets drawers and occupying one end of each room. In the north of the ordinary closet.

On the north side of the hall and adjoining the children's room is the bath room, handsomely decorated in green with five feet of plaster tile wainscoting and wainscoted close to the wall. The furnishings are hand selected.

Adjoining the bath room is a large linen closet.

The servant's room is handsomely decorated in green with white ceiling.

All of the second story floors are of maple, oiled and the finish is in white enamel.

The attic is large and well lighted with dormer windows on either side and adds greatly to the general appearance of the roof plan.

A striking feature of this model dwelling is the spacious veranda, eight and one half feet wide and extending across the entire front of the building, with a prominent circular projection in the center, and is finished from the corner wall by circular steps, the whole being surmounted by a balcony and handsome railing.

The house is painted yellow with white trimmings, and with the well graded lawn, crushed stone driveways leading to the rear makes an attractive picture that reflects the taste and enterprise of one of Manistique's foremost business men, who by his handsome stone building and residence shows that he has no doubts as to his future for Manistique.

EPOCH MAKING ONE

Was The Past Year in the History of Manistique, Augurs Much For The Future

PUBLIC UTILITIES INBARGAINED

The Ave. Utility Essential to the Progress and Growth of Any City.

The year now drawing to a close has in some respects been an epoch making one for the city of Manistique. During this period water and sewer systems have been installed, and conveniences and adequate protection can now be afforded capital seeking favorable location for investment.

With its admirable water power sufficient electricity can be developed to furnish ample power for numerous manufacturing establishments, also for the operation of a street car system.

The growth of Manistique has been slow but steadily upward since the advent of the first saw mill, and has developed from a little hamlet of five or six houses to a city consisting of commodious brick business blocks, and hundreds of handsome residences, several of which are featured in this issue for the purpose of showing our readers in other cities that Manistique is more than a village and that its citizens are, by the investment of their money in these handsome structures, showing to the world that they believe in the permanency of the town.

The location is ideal both for the importation of raw material and the shipment of the finished product.

It has the only all the year harbor on the north shore of Lake Michigan and the government has made elaborate surveys of same. An appropriation of \$100,000 has also been recommended and will no doubt be included in the river and harbor bill that will be passed by congress during the present session. The consummation of the plans will require a much larger sum than the above amount, and other appropriations will be forthcoming when the work of improvement is commenced.

Manistique's future was never brighter, and if its citizens make a concerted effort they certainly can supplement the excellent business enterprises that are at present upholding the city with many others.

YULETIDE IN SHETLAND.

Curious Customs in the Island Where the Ponies Come From.
The festival of Yule, as is well known, dates back to prehistoric times, when men worshipped nature rather than nature's God.

The inhabitants of the Shetland Isles are descended from Norsemen, who were zealous in religious belief, and "Yule" to them meant a season of great importance. The "Gammal Norsk Hjul" signifies, literally, "wheel," and the festival so called was held in honor of the sun at the winter solstice wheeling round toward the equator. The return of the sun formed an important period of the year as being the beginning of renewed life in nature, which only could be revived by the light and warmth of the ascending orb.

The course of the sun was observed in all things as far as possible. Everything was turned from left to right, the boat was so turned on the water, the corn stacks so built in courses, the mill so turned in grinding as to wheel in unobstructed fact, everything went with the sun, even the round of the drinking horn.

Many superstitions included in nature worship had full scope at the "Hjul" time or more modern "Yule" when a vast multitude of "trov" or "fairy folk," who at that season were not only active, but maliciously disposed, had to be propitiated.

To give the fairy folk an opportunity of playing tricks, the fishing net and the spinning wheel taken out of gear and its lozenge parts laid aside, and everything suspended from ceiling or walls lifted down, as if left in their usual places the mischievous elves were supposed to set all going against the sun's motion, which of course would mean serious trouble. The time of Yule was still a readily observed as "hellig" - i. e., a time of rest from all manner of labor - Maltime.

Christmas in Guam.

The Task of Transforming the North Land into an Agricultural District Progressing.

The task of transforming this north land into an agricultural district is progressing, says the Ontonagon Herald. Like all undertakings, it has taken time to get started. Skepticism had to be overcome and practical illustrations had to be made in order to induce people to take up the work. This has been accomplished to some extent which must be gratifying to those who've headed the path. Agricultural pursuits have been followed in a hushed way in the upper peninsula for years, but several decades they were practically at a standstill. Here and there was a farm which was being tilled in the same old year after year and except in fine cases without any great success. People have felt that there was more profit in lumbering and consequently they occupied their attention.

But the time came when much of the land became depleted of its timber. In a meager way it had been demonstrated that the soil and climate are adapted to growing ordinary fruits and crops, but it was realized that in order to secure a reasonable measure of success, it was necessary that there be systematic instruction in the various branches of his industry. The fact that one can show and see and reap, does not mean him for the work. He should make as thorough a study of the conditions which enter into this pursuit as he would to engage in any of the other great undertakings.

The movement was backed by a few men who firmly believed in its ultimate success. A few farms were bought out of the wilderness some by men who were in position to dig down in their pockets for the furtherance of the cause and others by men whose sole equipment was a hardy constitution and a determination to succeed. And to help along the work the state established an experiment station at Gladwin, Alger county. It has not merely provided for but is doing a lot of good under the supervision of Leo M. Gishman.

The movement received generous support from the newspapers and the result is that sentiment has been revolutionized in regard to the agricultural possibilities of the peninsula. People who scoffed at the idea of successfully tilling the soil a few years ago are now its most fervent champions. This is largely the result of the educational campaign which has been conducted, substantiated by practical illustrations.

BRANCHES IN MANY CITIES

"KNOCKING" ALLEGED CAUSE OF FAILURE OF CUMMINGS COMPANY.

St. Paul, Dec. 14.—The Cummings Commission company, one of the largest and best known lumbering houses in the Twin Cities, has suspended business.

The following statement, sent out to all of the Cummings offices throughout this state, the Dakotas and as far north as Winnipeg, sums up briefly the cause of the failure.

"The systematic 'knocking' that has been going on against this company for some time has created such a condition of affairs that our attorneys advise us to close up all accounts so as to protect in a measure all alike. It will be a few days before we can give results."

A. J. Cummings, head of the concern, says the failure has come about simply because business has fallen off and heavy expenses have eaten up the resources of the company.

The Cummings Commission company is what is known as a private buy house, with a multitude of offices in the towns and cities of the Northwest, catering to the country speculative trade.

enjoying the sidewalk.

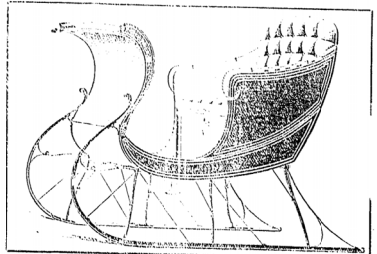
These twins, who are the pride,

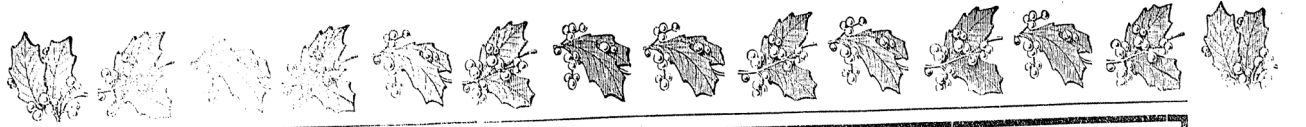

DIED AT SUPERIOR

REMAINS WERE BROUGHT HERE

By Capt. Peter O. McCauley Dies of Typhoid Fever at St. Mary's Hospital

By Capt. Peter O. McCauley and Ed Garrett Who Brought the Hospital After His Death.

Capt. Peter O. McCauley died at St. Mary's Hospital, Superior, Sunday last from a short illness with typhoid fever. Previous to his illness he had been stationed at Marquette, as captain of the 10th, 11th, 12th, and 13th regiments of the 1st Infantry.

His relatives here received a telegram late last week stating his illness and death, and his brother Capt. Dan McCauley and his brother-in-law Capt. Ed Garrett left for Superior Saturday night. The train was so late that they did not reach the hospital until six or eight hours after his death had occurred. The remains were prepared for shipment and arrived here Tuesday morning. Two or three members of the local Camp Woodman of the Wood of this city, the depot and escorted the body to the home of Mr. Garrett.

The deceased was born at St. James, Beaver Island, in 1862 and was a fisherman by occupation. He lived in Marquette for many years and was in the employ of the Booth Co. as storeman and sailor. He studied navigation and served as a captain's papers and for several years had been stationed at Marquette.

He was a young man of good habits and was highly respected by all knowing him.

He was a member of the Tuxedo Association at Houghton, the A. O. U. E. at Marquette, and of White Pine Camp No. 28 Woodman of the Wood of this city.

He is survived by two brothers and six sisters. They are Mestanes (Gallagher and Rody) of St. James, Capt. Dan McCauley and Mrs. Ed Garrett of this city, Mr. Hugh Malloy of Ontonagon, Mrs. Bernard Schmidt, and Thomas McCauley of St. James.

The body was taken to St. James for burial Thursday morning on the tug *Berger* of the Coffey fleet. The members of White Pine Camp No. 28 escorted the remains from the Garrett home to the boat. The services last hour were E. P. Pollock, Wm. Hazen, Geo. Bohus, Robert Rubin, James Casey and Julius Chapman. Among those that went to St. James were Dan Garrett, Lyle Norton, A. Mestanes and Capt. D. A. McCauley. Also the following persons who came from St. James early this week, Captains and Mrs. J. C. Gallagher, Capt. and Mrs. Tim Rody, Thomas McCauley, Hugh and Donna Boykie, Capt. 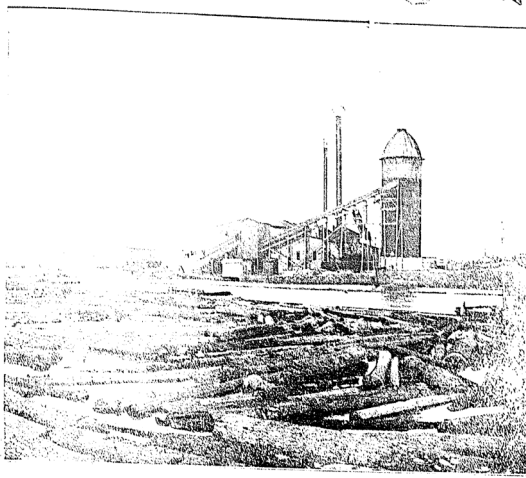

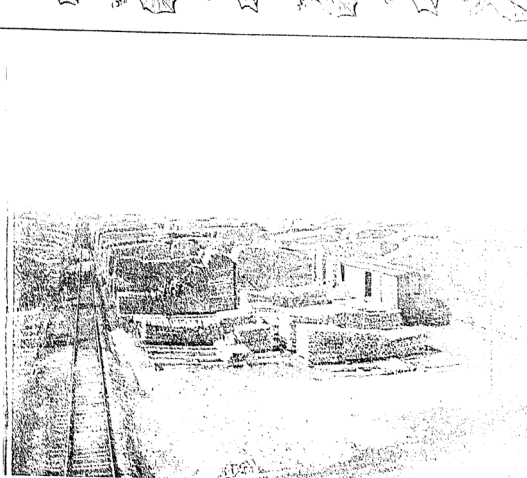

As Its Products Are Supplied to All Parts of the East and Middle West. The White Marble Lime Co., as its name implies, was incorporated in 1888 for the purpose of manufacturing lime. It required a large tract of land lying west of Maple Avenue, erected kilns and a high grade of lime. Later, kilns were erected at the 300-foot level and a spur built from the 300-foot level to the plant. A quarry has also been secured in the vicinity of Blaney. Immense quantities of lime and crushed stone are shipped yearly to all sections of the country. While this feature of the company's business is operated on an extensive scale, yet the cedar business, in which the company has been engaged since 1896 is reaching such proportions that it is of much greater importance than the manufacture of lime for which the company was primarily organized, and the company ranks with the largest producers and shippers of cedar products in the United States.

See line, and also on the South Shore line. From a few hundred cars annually the business has grown to such an extent that now about 5000 car loads are handled annually in disposing of all products, and White Marble lime and cedar products are distributed in sixteen states and territories.

The phenomenal success of the company can certainly be attributed to the foresight and business acumen of Mr. Geo. Nicholson, who has been the president and manager of the company since its inception, and to Mr. Wm. B. Thomas, who accepted a clerical position in the company at the time it was organized and has for several years been its secretary.

The burden of detail and responsibility that Mr. Nicholson carries on his shoulders for so many years, has been gratefully placed in Mr. Thomas' hands, and results are proving the fact that Mr. Nicholson built wisely and well and that Mr. Thomas is proving more than equal to the herculean task that is his. He is the busiest man in the city.

To Geo J. Nicholson, the eldest son of Mr. Nicholson, has been placed to a great extent the supervision of the lime and quarry interests of the company. After his graduation from Shattuck in 1901 he entered its employ and is proving himself to be a chip of the old block and is making good. He takes an absorbing interest in his work, and without this interest success cannot be obtained in any avocation or walk of life.

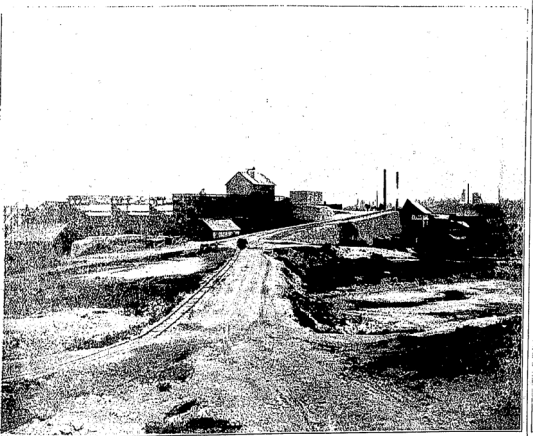

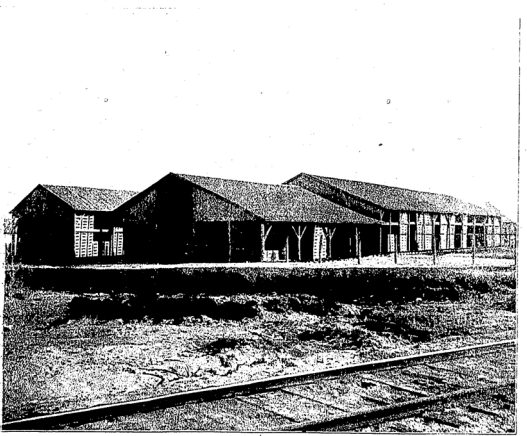

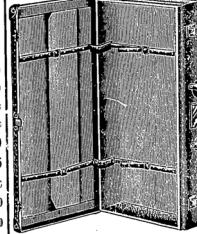
