HOLD NIGHT SCHOOL

Prof. Hanson Perfecting Plans For the Much Needed Feature

BEST OF TEACHERS IN CHARGE

And Numerous Members Will be Taught and the Work Systematically Arranged

In all of the large cities of the United States night schools have been made a permanent institution. What proves to be a benefit to the people of the largest cities is usually quickly imitated in the smaller places.

The object of this school here is to enable men and women, who have no time or opportunity to attend a day school, to better their condition by pursuing such studies as are usually given in the public schools.

All people will be allowed to attend except students of the public schools and persons under sixteen years of age who have not completed the work of the first eight grades.

The following subjects will be taught: spelling, penmanship, bookkeeping, shorthand, typewriting, reading, arithmetic, geography and algebra.

Persons desiring to take other branches should make their wants known and classes will be organized providing eight students select them.

The sessions shall begin promptly at 7:30 p. m. and close at 9 o'clock on Tuesday and Friday evenings of each week, beginning Tuesday, Jan. 8, and closing April 26.

A tuition fee of \$1.00 per month will be charged each member. Two dollars must be paid at the beginning of the term and the remainder before Feb. 1st.

The school will be under the supervision of Sup't. W. E. Hanson and will be held in the Central School Building.

The best of teachers will be selected and the work will be systematically arranged. Mr. Hanson will be in his office at the Central School Building from 7 to 9 o'clock on Friday and Saturday evenings of next week and Monday evening of next week.

# The President's Tennis Cabinet

James R. Garfield, Herbert Knox Smith, Gifford Pinchot, Lawrence O. Murray and Alfred W. Cooley, Who Play on the White House Courts.



THE tennis cabinet is an institution which does not figure in the list of official communications to Congress. There are no bills attached to it and it does not form part of the art gallery of every well-to-do household. It is in the hands of a few men who play in the White House courts. It is not only the "big stick," but the tennis racket, the boxing gloves, the rowing sculls, the saddle horse and various other things that pertain to a strenuous activity. There have been "tennis cabinets" in this country for a long time. There have been men who have played in this and other lands which exercised considerable influence in affairs of state, but a tennis cabinet is something quite new. There is no opportunity in belonging to a tennis cabinet, as there might be in being a member of a British cabinet. There is no such of pots and kettles or of many stances of membership about the active, strong, clear-headed men who form this cabinet.

In President Cleveland's time there was no White House tennis court. Mr. Cleveland has always been a tennis player, but not of that kind of excellence. Mr. McKinley took little exercise but that of walking. Tennis playing was a White House sport since the grounds of the Lincoln Roosevelt. There is now a fine court on the grounds of the executive mansion, presided by a high wire fence from the gaze of the curious. The tennis cabinet consists of those who play naturally as a result of the fact that some of Mr. Roosevelt's younger official associates were fond of the game. He played tennis with them just as he has boxed with some or ridden horseback with others, and gradually came to be recognized as members of the coterie, and in due time some bright newspaper man gave it the name by which it is now known.

One of the best known members of the tennis cabinet is James R. Garfield, son of the martyred president and recently nominated as secretary of the Interior to succeed Ethan Allen Hitchcock. When Mr. Hitchcock retires, Mr. Garfield will vacate his present post of commissioner of corporations and will be succeeded by Herbert Knox Smith, the present deputy commissioner. He is another who belongs to the tennis cabinet. The president likes both these members of his "tennis cabinet" department. The future commissioner of corporations is sometimes known as "Knocks Myth," but that there is nothing mythical about the way he plays the game of hauling trout. Standard Oil officials can bear witness.

Gifford Pinchot, chief of the forest service, is a leading member of this cabinet. He can wield the racket as well as he can chop down a tree, which is saying a good deal. Another member is Lawrence O. Murray, assistant secretary of commerce and labor, and still another is Alfred W. Cooley, who succeeded Garfield as civil service commissioner. While the main object of the cabinet is to discuss and exercise their sports and amusements, it is also a place for the exchange of views and information concerning affairs of state upon which he adds to public much value.

Mrs. Taft was Miss Helen Herron of Cincinnati, is domestic in her tastes and entertains no more than the necessities of her husband's post office call, for in the Philippines she was a notable success as a hostess. ### LAZE IN PARLIAMENTS

#### 40TY FAMILIES HOMELESS AS RESULT OF SERIOUS FIRE IN NEW YORK CITY.

**ORDER AND LAWLESSNESS ATTEND POLICE UNABLE TO HANDLE IMMENSE CROWD ATTRACTED TO THE LOCALITY.**

New York, Jan. 2.—A dozen persons were injured, forty families were made homeless, 2,000 persons were driven temporarily from their homes, by forces were resisted to death and property valued at \$200,000 was destroyed in the worst early morning fire in New York since its morning. One big tenement house at 7 West Fifty-third street and a large building at 425-121 West Fifty-third street were destroyed. Several houses at 425-121 West Fifty-third street and 430 and 438 West Fifty-third street were badly damaged. Lack of adequate water pressure is said to have been largely responsible for the extent of the fire. Not one of the fire hydrants which draw water supply from the Hudson river, came to the rescue. The fire had been made easier.

Disorder and Lawlessness.

One of the worst features of the fire was the reckless crowd which gathered in the streets around the burning district and the attendant disorder and lawlessness. So great was the crowd that all the police who were called to the scene had little chance of preserving anything like order in the streets and for a time the fire was almost a free land to look the lawless buildings. Two policemen had detected six young men sneakingly in a house classed as men over roofs down to Ninth street, bring several shots at them, all the men succeeded in getting away. Another exciting incident came when a woman among the spectators seemed that three negroes had tried to rob her. One negro was seen running away from her and a group of men began chase, firing shot after shot at their run. After a chase several blocks two detectives followed pursuers and they, too, began to shoot at the fleeing negro. Not one shot reached the mark, but the negro finally gave up.

### WOMAN FIRES AT JUDGE

#### ATTEMPTED ASSASSINATION IN ST. LOUIS COURTROOM UNSUCCESSFUL.

#### BULLET FAILS TO FIND ITS MARK

#### ASSAILANT IS PROMPTLY DISARMED AND PLACED UNDER ARREST.

St. Louis, Jan. 3.—Just after Judge J. A. McDonald of the circuit court had taken his seat on the bench Miss Rosa Well suddenly arose from among the spectators and fired point blank at the judge. The bullet missed him. She was disarmed and arrested. She was a litigant in a case concerning a disputed inheritance that was tried before Judge McDonald two months ago.

Rosa Well, accompanied by her older sister, Clara Well, seated the courtroom a few moments before court convened and quietly took the second spectators' bench back of the railing. Their appearance attracted no attention and they sat quietly watching the proceedings as Judge McDonald entered from his private chamber and took his seat on the bench. Miss Well was offered in a pending case and an attorney had started to address the court, when Rosa Well, without warning, stood up with a leveled revolver and fired at Judge McDonald. The bullet missed her sitting nearest her, seized her before she could fire a second time and several other persons, not one of whom reached the mark, but she was finally given up.

HEARING OPENS FRIDAY.

W. S. Thomas, director of maintenance and operations; and Julius Kreitschmitt, director of maintenance and operations.

**"SOO LINE" MAY BUY SOUTH SHORE**

The South Shore of Lake Superior, which is being developed in railroad circles and there are many enterprises which tend to make the entire section the affluence of the State of Michigan. According to a man who in the last week with the Lake Superior South Shore, which is a part of the Canadian Pacific system, has not been into Duluth from the west. Therefore it is claimed, the plan to extend the South Shore.

All summer there has been a crowd of strikers remaining a line from Duluth, through Carlton, Arden, Cow Wing, and Becker counties, to a junction with the Soo. It has been stated, on what appears to be good authority, that this survey is a part of the plan to extend the South Shore line in a connection with the Soo.

For through traffic from the Canadian northwest to New York and the Atlantic seaboard this would give the Canadian Pacific a shorter route than any it has at the present time and place it in better position to meet the competition which will follow the building of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the transcontinental line which James J. Hill is building from Winnipeg westward.

**TREASURES LOST IN GREAT LAKES**

These who live along their shores, but scarce on their waters only in the way of summer holiday excursions, are second to none in the world for the abundance of treasure ships whose wrecks are sought for years and are well worth the search.

Huron is sometimes called "The Lake of Mystery," as there are believed to be more wrecks with valuable cargoes in the neighborhood of Saginaw than anywhere else. In the days when the Huron was a great lake, it was thought that many were often wrecked in small vessels, and many of these were lost. And in those waters lie the great prize of the lake treasure-hunters.

In 1892 the steamer Powable, with a rich cargo of copper from the Lake Superior mines, simply vanished in Lake Huron. For over 20 years explorations after the wreck of the Powable, but without success. In 1907, a party from Milwaukee succeeded in locating the hull of the Powable about six miles southwest of Thunder Bay. Owing to the depth of water only \$7,000 worth of copper has as yet been recovered.

Not in lake treasure-seeking without its perils. In raising, in 1901, the Willoughby, sunk in 1895 with \$20,000 worth of pig iron from the local furnaces, off Sault Ste. Marie, east of city one diver was killed and another paralyzed. And many men have been over-while treasure-hunting in the lakes.

In the 20 years between 1878 and 1898 there were 5,999 wrecks on the lakes, of which 1,090 were total losses. The total cargo loss on the lakes is estimated at no less than \$12,000,000, much of it in irretrievable form of property. These tales of ancient treasure go clear back to 1850, when the Griffin, La Salle, only disappeared in Lake Huron with \$13,000 in gold coin.

Altogether there is in the history of the American lakes no more lack of the materials of romance than there is lack of human daring and suffering in the daily lives of those who contend with their stormy waters.
