WILL SOW ALFALFA

Next spring farmers in this locality will sow a large acreage of alfalfa on the light lands to sow if the disastrous results of dry weather cannot be avoided. The hay crop this year will be practically worthless, because the ground is so dry.

In the vicinity of Ruby some of the farmers will not cut their hay and cattle have been turned into the fields. Oats will be a short crop in some localities they will stand less than a foot high. E. W. Houghton, who owns a farm near the Soo, is one of the first to announce that he will experiment with alfalfa. He expects to sow his first field next spring.

"I noticed a field of alfalfa near Heronville this week," he said, "and the grass stands more than waist high. Part of the field has been cut and it is growing so rapidly that another crop will soon be ready. If we grow alfalfa here this dry weather would not affect us."

About the only crops that have not begun to show the effects of the drought are peas and late potatoes. —Soo News.

SENDS OUT WARNING

State Game Warden Giving Publicity to Forest Fire Laws.

State Game Warden Pierce is sending out placards all over the northern part of Michigan, giving a summary of the state laws relative to starting fires in the forests. The placard reads as follows:

The careless setting of fires, causing fires to spread in woods, brush or grass lands, so as to endanger or damage the property of another, is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine exceeding one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for not more than three months.

The malicious setting of fires, or causing fires to be set, is punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or imprisonment for not exceeding ten years.

It is a misdemeanor to kindle a fire and leave it unattended, or be a party thereto, to use other than incombustible walls for fireproof, or to carry a torch or other exposed light, in or near the forest, brush or grass lands—punishable by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or imprisonment for not more than three months.

All railroad companies are required to use efficient spark arrestors on all engines and to keep their right of way clear of all combustible material. Unlawful to leave, a deposit of fire, coal or hot ashes near any combustible material.

It is misdemeanor to deface, destroy or remove this or any other warning placard.

Board of Health Meeting.

The board of health will hold a special meeting at the city hall at 8:30 o'clock this (Friday) evening. Those having bills to present should do so not later than 6 p. m.

In seasons of drought railroad companies are required to use extra precautions against the starting or spreading of fires.

Thrashing and other portable steam engines must have sufficient spark arrestors.

In addition to the penalties provided, every person is liable for all damages caused by a fire set, or allowed to run by him.

Violation should be reported to the state deputy of the district or to C. S. PIERCE, State Game, Fish and Forestry Warden, Lansing, Mich.
