Martha Washington Daughters' Entertainment Most Enjoyable.

The minutes were then approved after above correction had been made.

Motion of Ald. Benson seconded by Ald. Drevdahl that the bill for extinguishing fire at the Manistique Brewery be presented to the said company for reimbursement. Carried.

Petition was presented by Wm. Gage asking for permission to construct cement sidewalk in front of his residence property, lot 18, block 5, Riverside addition, was on motion of Ald. Drevdahl, seconded by Ald. Putnam, granted.

A communication from E. Braint and E. E. Nequette, was read, asking for protection against traveling photographers.

Motion of Ald. Putnam seconded by Ald. Drevdahl that the city attorney be instructed to draw up an ordinance covering same. Carried.

Moved, seconded and carried that the keeper of the post office be retained for another year under the old contract.

The report of the special assessors was read and upon motion the 20th day of October, A. D. 1909, at 2 o'clock p. m., was fixed for the council and the board of special assessors to meet and review the special assessment roll. Carried.

The following resolutions were presented and read:

Section Three: That in addition to said sum of (\$19,338.00) there be hereon ordered to be raised by tax upon all the taxable real and personal property of the city of Manistique the sum of Five Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty (\$5,750.00) dollars for the purpose of applying funds for the payment of the interest on the water and sewer bonds of said city which sum so raised is to be placed to the credit of the interest and sinking fund and applied in payment of the interest on the water and sewer bonds.

Section Four: That in addition to the above mentioned sums there is hereby ordered to be raised by tax upon all the taxable real and personal property in the city of Manistique the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars for the purpose of applying funds for the third payment on the water and sewer bonds of said city, which sum so raised is to be placed to the credit of the interest and sinking fund and to be applied in payment of said bonds.

Unionists Place Themselves on Record Against Prohibition.

The following resolution was adopted by the Detroit Federation of Labor on September 15th and referred to the convention of the Michigan Federation of Labor for its endorsement:

Whereas, Moved by an earnest desire to vote the greatest possible good to the greatest number, we, the delegates to the Michigan Federation of Labor, in convention assembled, do hereby set forth our opposition to local option in Michigan counties; and

Whereas, While we do not defend in any way any institution which is improperly conducted, or any excesses, we insist that prohibition, in theory and practice is in direct violation of the freedom of the citizens of the nation; and

Whereas, Other features of the injurious prohibition are the failure of employment of an immense

array of persons who gain their livelihood in the allied industries which the brewery, malting, tobacco, theatrical, amusement and other enterprises; and

Whereas, The gravest injustice, however, lies in the fact that local option prohibition does not prevent the employer and other wealthy persons from obtaining what ever advantages are desired, they being able to maintain their clubs in local option counties as it is the case in Michigan, now, where they may avail themselves of privileges which they deny their employes therefore,

Resolved, That the Michigan Federation of Labor does hereby place itself on record as being in opposition to the constitutional rights of our citizens; and be it further,

Resolved, That the Michigan Federation of Labor pledges itself to assist in the proper regulation of the saloon, but against any attempt to

OAKLAND TIRED OF OPTION

Petitions for Re-Submission of Question Signed by More Than Half of Voters.

Petitions asking a re-submission of the local option question will be posted this week in all the townships of the county and wards of the city of Pontiac, and will contain a total of about 5,000 names and the number required to guarantee another vote on the question is about 3,700. In addition to the names which will be presented to the supervisors more than 600 more were secured but are not legally correct through some error or other. One error, which resulted in three out of at least two whole townships, was the fact that the men who circulated the petitions in these townships were not residents of the townships at the time the petitions were circulated.

The supervisors will meet October 11 and will appoint a committee to canvass the names. If they are found correct the board is obliged to order another election in April, 1910.

Two years ago the county went dry by 78 majority. Now more than half the voters of the county have signed the petitions asking another vote on local option. Adv.

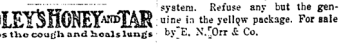
