## OSBORN IN RACE

Mon. Chase S. Osborn to Enter the Gubernatorial Race IS UNIVERSALLY ESTEEMED

As a result of the important factor in the gubernatorial campaign, Chase S. Osborn, who has been elected to the position of lieutenant governor, has announced his intention to enter the gubernatorial race.

Chase S. Osborn, of the Seneca, has finally decided to announce his candidacy. While Mr. Osborn has been a tentative candidate for the honor, yet he was averse to announcing his candidacy at this time but his friends deemed it imperative that he make some authoritative statement as to the nature of his intentions.



His wife appears and extensive travels have made him a familiar name in the position in question. No better choice could be made by the Republicans of Michigan, and from indications he will be the party's choice at the primary next spring.

His announcement made relative to the matter follows:

"After careful consideration of the situation I have come to the conclusion that my expression of my attitude in my candidacy for the gubernatorial office several months ago was not in evidence of this sentiment first given publicly, I declared my determination to await events and under no circumstances to be a candidate unless convinced of the existence of a real popular demand that become a candidate.

"Recent developments have demonstrated to my satisfaction the existence of such a demand, so widespread and insistent as to constitute an appeal to my sense of duty as a citizen far more than any feeling of personal ambition. In obedience to this demand shall be a candidate for governor.

"During the progress of the campaign I shall make clear the principles which will control me, and the policies I shall endeavor to pursue, should the people of Michigan honor me with election to the governorship."

Mr. Osborn will speak at the Republican club banquet to be held at Greenville October 28. His subject will be "Some Things Michigan Needs."

At this time he will doubt outline his platform.

## CAUGHT IN THE ACT

Frank Wengle Captured by Officer Gust Peterson, While in Act of Burglarizing Saloon

ADMITTED HIS GUILT

Was Wanted Examination in Justice Court and Will be Tried at the County Term.

Frank Wengle of Bay City, a so-called prize fighter, who has been spending the summer at Manistique and other points along the St. Ignace, was caught in the act of robbing the cash register at Gardner's saloon of \$27.00 last Friday night, by Officer Gust Peterson, who single-handedly landed him in the "coo." When Peterson was passing the front of Gardner's place shortly after midnight on the light in question, he saw some one in the act of taking the money out of the cash register. He hurried to the back door and when the fellow emerged, placed him under arrest. Peterson took his prisoner up stairs and awakening Gardner, informed him of the robbery. While on the landing the prisoner made a dash for liberty, down the flight of the sidewalk, and after handcuffing him brought him to the lock-up. When searched he was found to have an electric flashlight, a loaded revolver, steel saws, a piece of fuse, a large number of keys, some of which were cash register keys, and other implements used by professional burglars.

He admitted his guilt to the officers, but at the hearing held in Judge Knox's court Monday, he refused to plead guilty to the charges of burglary and grand larceny, as he deemed the former charge too severe for the crime committed. That both could be proven against him in court goes without saying. In order to reach the bar-room he was compelled to force through three doors in the evening about 10:30 p.m. was found in his overcoat pocket. He was bound over to the January term of the circuit court in the sum of \$1,000, but having no funds to answer, he is now a guest of Sheriff Smith.

The prisoner is about twenty-seven years of age, and from his familiarity with jail life, officers think that he has had experience in such matters.

Officer Peterson deserves great credit for making the arrest. A man must possess nerve to arrest an armed

price fighter under such conditions. This incident again proves that Mayor Middlebrook made a wise choice when he selected Peterson as a member of the police force.

## Health Officer's Notice.

The annual chemical and bacteriological examination of the city drinking water as reported by the Laboratory of the State Board of Health at Lansing shows apparently no improvement over last year. It is pretty generally conceded that the location of our intake above the city, together with any hygienic conditions about the place, can not but be detrimental to the purity and wholesomeness of the city drinking water. The state outlet runs up the examination of the water as follows: "The sample shows an excessive quantity of free and albuminous ammonia, as well as excess of iron. Bacteriologically, the total number of organisms present cannot be considered very excessive, but the number capable of growing at high incubator temperature is too high, and colon bacilli are present in every centimeter. This water in its present condition can, under no circumstances be considered safe for drinking purposes."

In view of these findings it is the opinion of the health officer that city water used for drinking and culinary purposes should first be boiled. While we have had no unusual number of intestinal infections this fall, it is the season of the year when typhoid and similar fevers are most prevalent and no wiser precautions can be taken by any one to avoid diseases of the kind than the drinking water, the purity and palatability of which is unquestioned. Boiling the drinking water destroys infection of every kind and renders it absolutely safe as far as the danger of intestinal infection is concerned.

**A Statement.**

The local option petition was turned down by the board of supervisors last week on three counts.

1. It was claimed that many of those signing the petition were not qualified electors in the township or ward in which they resided at the time of signing it.

2. It was declared that many of those who signed the petition withdrew their names before the petition was filed with the county clerk.

3. It was ascertained that some of the petitions posted were not exact copies of the original and that some were not properly dated.

Each and all of these objections we hold to be unwarranted and untenable.

In regard to the first objection the attorney employed by the local option association cited to the board supreme court decisions by which it was held that no elector may be denied the right to sign a petition because he did not vote at the last general election nor because his name does not appear on the registration list in the township or ward in which he resides, but the board arbitrarily chose to ignore those decisions and to declare the petitions insufficient because the requisite number of names of electors signing the petition were not on the poll lists of last fall's election.

As to the right of withdrawal it is too obvious that any right under the law does not exist except when a name is secured on the petition by fraud and even then it is required

that statements as to how or by what means fraud was used in obtaining the signature must accompany the application for the removal of the name, and the facts, are in every case of application for withdrawal of name from the petition no reason was given and the removal of a name therefrom was demanded on the ground of fraud.

Yet the board now try to ignore this fact also and to count every withdrawal a legal one thus reducing the number of names to less than the requisite number. And to the third objection the board was clearly shown in its main the law had been complied with in the obtaining of signatures to the petitions, in posting and in all other preliminary matters and that the objections made on the ground of irregularities in the posting and dating of petitions and not with consideration, but they persisted in clinging to this objection and on those grounds also to declare the petitions invalid.

From the very start the board seemed to have one point actual and that was that they would turn the petition down. The only problem for them was to find some plausible excuse for doing so.

Here are some of the observations taken at the meeting of the board of supervisors last week as they were considering the local option petition, by one who attended the sessions.

The committee appointed by Chairman Middlebrook to examine the petitions consisted of Ebert, McKinney, Kingsland, Cowley and Craver.

The far fetched logic of the county prosecutor seemed to have tremendous weight with the county officials.

With a board as "wet" as the Schoolcraft county board of supervisors the "dry" surely had no reason to expect a fair and impartial consideration of their petition.

No one would have guessed from the prosecuting attorney's advice to the local option matter had by not openly declared himself so to be as he began his argument.

It was plain to be seen by an observer that the board was determined from the first not to give the matter a candid and impartial consideration and it was evident that their only difficulty lay in determining on what excuses they might ground their refusal to grant the petition.

Some of the latest arguments and most absurd interpretations of law ever given were advanced at the court house last week to forward the interests of the saloonists.

Several members of the board are in the saloon business, and one is not a citizen.

The man from Cusino was the only one who refused to vote with the "wets."

The board of supervisors are determined that some citizens should be denied the right to sign the local option petition and seemed to consider that it would be an injustice to permit the qualified citizens of Schoolcraft county to vote on the question in the spring, yet they permit an unnaturalized alien to sit with them on the board and to vote on any question that comes before them.

The legal advisor of the county officials in his efforts to make clear to the board their duty in regard to the petition attempted to define a "qualified elector" and endeavoring to do so stated that "a man may have all the qualifications of an elector and still not be a qualified elector." Fine logic!

In the resolution refusing to grant the local option petition because some had signed it whose names were not on the poll or registration lists, the board of supervisors denied the right of citizenship to some of our most prominent and public spirited citizens as well as to many of our native born young men above the age of twenty-one years. (Advertisement) An Observer.
