KELLEY'S FOOLISH MOVE

Has Cut His Bridges in the Upper Peninsula.

The Lansing Republican, which goes to the extreme in its support of Patrick Kelley for the Republican nomination for governor, is much perturbed over the big enrollment in the upper peninsula. It fears for Kelley, if it sees in that enrollment of 58,145 an immense majority in this section of the state for whom. It even in this big vote a serious menace to the chances of Kelley for nomination, and in a panic over its astonishment at the size of the enrollment endeavored to create capital for Kelley by insinuating that the lists were stuffed. This is an insult to the entire upper peninsula, but it is keeping with the efforts of Kelley and his supporters to create a sectional prejudice which will land Kelley in the gubernatorial chair.

Such a ridiculous charge, and the talk of an investigation, however, will be recalled by the people of the lower part of the state who will easily see through the attempt to cast reflections of dishonesty upon the people of the upper peninsula, Mr. Osborn's candidly stands for a united state, harmony and not for any particular section, and the fact that he is such a candidate is appreciated fully as much as the actual running expenses are in the lower part of the state as in the upper portion. Mr. Osborn is not putting one section against the other, as he stands for Michigan as a whole, in direct contrast to the candidacy of Mr. Kelley who stands for a divided state.

The Lansing Republican's talk of an investigation of the enrollment lists of the upper peninsula is ridiculous. No investigation is necessary, although if Mr. Kelley insists on an investigation it will be welcomed. The enrollment lists are large because the upper peninsula wants to give Chas. S. Osborn as large a vote as it has to give him, and to make that possible the voters are enrolled for participation in the primaries.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

The best philosophy for defeated candidates is to grin and bear it.

Will no woman puts in as much time doing church work as some men spend in politics.

A fellow was recently heard to say: "I never knew a man so modest and retiring that he didn't occasionally let off a little hot air."

Some people were better last Monday than at any period of their lives. They imagined that the peculiar color of the sky portended the end of the earth.

Townsend appears to have made deep inroads into the Durwos presence in the upper peninsula as the result of his swing through this section of the state.

Musselman has abandoned his temperance platform and this move has caused suspicion among the radical temperance element, as to his real motives.

A small girl who had to wait for the second table was not crying. On being asked what she was crying about she replied: "There is more people than pie here."

Mr. R. B. Waddell has been appointed member of the board of public works to succeed Mr. George H. Brusie, resigned. Mr. Waddell is a valuable acquisition to the board.

The city council decided to charge the K. of P. lodge a license of \$50 per day or \$300 for the week that Barlock's street carnival will show in the city. To some this appears prohibitive, and just what the result will be is not known. The show people have a contract with the local lodge that is fracture-proof, and the end is not yet.

Voters should please bear in mind that the primary election will be held on Tuesday, September 6th. At that election vote for governor, congressman, U. S. Senator, state senator, member of the legislature, and for the various county offices will be nominated. You will desire to vote for Osborn, Young, Fowler, McChesna, Hixson, Dufrost, Forshar and Smith. Nothing save severe illness should keep you away from the polls that day.

The fact nevertheless remains that the members of the city council were canvassed as to their preference for city attorney, and seven of the eight stated that Hixson was their choice. It was therefore an easy matter for Wood to "decline" the appointment under the circumstances for it always looks better to decline honors that are unobtainable than to be knocked down and dragged out. It is easy to call one a liar but these are the facts in the case.

The campaign roarback has arrived. Musselman's upper peninsula harmonics appeared last week with much space devoted to abuse of Durwos. The few friends that Musselman had in the upper peninsula, prior to the issuance of the sheet in question, think less of him now than they ever did. It is safe to opine, however, that the edition did not pay attention to the fact that Musselman is too much of a gentleman to countenance such reprehensible political methods.

The manner in which some of the Detroit newspapers are casting insinuations upon the honesty of the Republican candidates by questioning the validity of the enrollment and the signatures to Osborn's petitions, makes the average Republican that has worked for party success in and out of session, rather warm under the neck-band.

The validity of the enormous Republican meeting north of the Straits which has more than one hundred delegates to vote, have never been questioned in the past. If Osborn's defeat at the primaries is the result of unfair and deliberate misrepresentation, it can safely be predicted that the man who will be the next governor of Michigan.

The big enrollment in the upper peninsula this year shows that every county has made an exceptional effort to secure the enrollment of every voter, so that Chase S. Caborn's majority will be a large one. Chase is best known in this neck of the woods, and he and his class stands fast proof of the loyalty expressed by those knowing him best. They resent the imputation of the Detroit News and other Kelley organs, that reprehensible methods have been used to secure the big enrollment.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.
 Don't forget the fact that Sept. 6th is primary day. You owe it to yourself and your party to cast your ballot that day.

One is convinced by frequent trips over the roads leading from Manistique that bonds to the amount of at least \$100,000 should be voted, and an aggressive and systematic system of road building be engaged in.

The bottom appears to have dropped out of the Durwos haul in Schooldraft county. It appears to be of the sort that needs the close personal attention of the candidates, and shrinks to the proportions of a collapsed hot air balloon the minute the candidate ceases to nurse it.

The voters in the various townships, and in the several wards of the city of Manistique will elect delegates on primary day for the county convention. This convention will nominate all the state officers save governor and lieutenant governor.

The town that has a class of inhabitants deservant of owning their own homes to be congratulated. Where the majority of people acquire residence property, the city grows amazingly in wealth. Then, too, it gives the city an air of stability that can never come from rows of houses owned by corporations.

Although township clerks are ordered by law to file their primary enrollment lists with the county clerk within ten days after the enrollment is made, the list from Mueller township has not been filed, notwithstanding the fact that the county clerk has written the officials of that township to do so. There is a penalty provided by the statutes for non-compliance of the law. The enrollment was made at the April election.

The time is past in this county as well as in practically every county of the state when a candidate can bolster up his campaign with the familiar and of repeated remark, "What'll you have?" An aspirant for any office of trust loses the respect of the liquor dealer when he becomes intoxicated, and said personage is more likely to get for a sober man than for one that proves himself incompetent and untrustworthy by drinking to excess.

There is something encouraging in the failure to take a vacation after all. The fellow who does tennis shots and deck chairs, light blue swimwear, and steps in places that would hesitate to banish his dog, has all sorts of trouble in getting down to his daily grind, while the fellow that keeps overlastingly at it is spared these heart-breaking experiences. Nevertheless, the fellow on the job cannot altogether banish the idea from his mind that the routine of a week or two would be a nice thing after all.

Musselman says that when the campaign is over, "he wants to be in position to be able to take each of my appointments by the hand as friends, and by conscious that I have done nothing unfair nor made any character-blackening charges." He is insincere or is not countenancing the last edition of the Esplanade Journal, for that edition certainly was a character-blackening sheet, as the editor announces that 12,000 persons were printed at expense of the newspaper, and one can easily be led to believe that the expenditure of the grocery store is insincere.

Dispatches with Grand Rapids date lines are showing increasing solicitude for Fuller's chances, and they contain so many "ifs" that one is reminded of the story of the man who kept asking the question, "Is Osborn killing Fuller?" Osborn was responsible to a great extent for Fuller's nomination two years ago, and Fuller has so conducted the office of attorney general that he has earned a re-nomination. Osborn would be the last man in the state to oppose Fuller, and thousands of loyal Osborn men in the upper peninsula are also loyal to Fuller. Both will be nominated and elected.

The men that most need vaccinations are the fellows that never have the opportunity afforded them. The man of wealth usually works less hours in a day than the poor man. Life to him is not a perpetual grind and a struggle for existence, yet the average well-to-do citizen feels that he must have at least seven months of respite from his labors. The poor man is lucky to get a half holiday on Saturday during the heated term, and were he told that a two week's respite from work was his he would turn pale for his financial condition would be such that a two weeks' respite would mean dire poverty for him and his family, notwithstanding the fact that he needed the rest for his physical well-being. The time may come when four or five hours will be considered a day's work for any man, and when that time comes the average American will be healthier and happier.

Indeed, he should be grateful that the ignoble tactics of his friends two years ago are not now turned against him; that an opponent is a man who will stoop to so treacherous himself and would scorn to profit by that of others, even friends, holding it also none the less despicable because it might be "nicely turned."—St. Ignace Enterprise.

A PRETTY SPOT

Dodge Lake Would Become Popular Resort if Roads Were Improved.

SOUTH SIDE A BUSY PLACE

Crops Look Good in Upper Hiawatha and Trees are Laden with Apples.

One of the most beautiful spots in the county is the lake in the vicinity of the Dodge farm in upper Hiawatha township. A portion of this road between Manistique and that portion of the township, is well impassable for autos, and were several hundreds of dollars expended on the road in question it would at once leap into prominence as a breathing spot for many of our citizens. The lake is far too pretty to remain unnoticed. Some of the most desirable farming land in the county is also located in that section of Hiawatha, and with a good road leading to Manistique the farmers would be given an opportunity of marketing their crop here, and both the farmer and the city would receive mutual benefit thereby.

When money for the prosecution of the county road system is available one of the very first roads to be taken in hand should be the one leading to Hiawatha. If the stretch through the

swamp and the hill by which one gains the level plateau upon which the farming settlement is located, were bettered, autos could make the trip without inconvenience, and the husbandman could find his best lands to the city. The writer made his initial trip into this section of the county Monday, and was more than pleased with what he saw. The farms are well tilled there is much cleared land, and orchards were noticed laden with fruit. Messrs. Joseph and Frank Hitts have residences that would grace any city of 5,000 inhabitants. The Grange hall is a commodious two story building, and the homes of the various farmers are homelike and bear the impress of prosperity.

The South Side Co. has a much larger plant than the unimproved would imagine. It employs about 70 men and 4,000,000 feet of lumber of various kinds and grades are piled in the yards. With the advent of the mill line of the M. & L. S. Ry., a successful effort is being made to reduce the amount of lumber on hand. Here, therefore, it was necessary to haul the lumber four miles for shipment.


Carl G. Ekstrom is in charge of the plant, and from all indications is making good. The mill is in constant operation but it is thought that the supply of stock in the yards will be worked no lumber about Sept. 15th, when the mill will be shut down for a short time for repairs, before it again is put into operation.
