FURNACE TAR O. K.

Austin Farrell Says Results are Excellent, with Proper Handling.

Austin Farrell, superintendent of the Pioneer Iron company, takes exception to a statement in an editorial paragraph in Thursday's issue of The Mining Journal, in which it was said: "Manquette has done some experimenting with tar, but not with the most satisfactory results." "They have not been better has perhaps been due to the fact that furnace tar has been used, and its consistency has varied."

"Furnace tar is as good for road making purposes as any tar used to date," Mr. Farrell says. "The secret for the proper use of Tarva examined our tar when he was in Bangor and he has been here that it has not been properly applied by the city authorities. When they started to use our tar they wanted us to ship it to them in barrels and were using a small ton job, holding from twenty to thirty gallons to rub the tar. This was the method of the street commissioner that we used to use. This method was faulty and would not give satisfactory results. At our expense we furnished them a tank body for their wagon, equipped with an outlet valve so that they could handle the tar easily at the point where they wished to apply it. We ran this tar from our hot stills, but naturally when it got up in the street they were improving which, in some cases was over two miles away from the furnace, it had cooled off, and the viscosity of the tar had naturally increased. I suggested to Mr. Rieliher that he place a stream end in the tank body and when he got to the street he read roller by means of a plumb rubber hose and heat up the tar until the proper consistency. This suggestion was absolutely disregarded. Rather than have the tar prove a failure at our own expense, we constructed tanks at the furnace equipped with steam coils, by means of which we kept the tar continuously hot, so that it always goes into the tank wagon at the same consistency. "Now, if any other product is used or purchased outside, the makers insist on the authorities using a tank wagon equipped with a furnace so that the tar is always applied at the same temperature. Any person of ordinary intelligence knows that the consistency of tar will vary with the temperature, and it is the most simple thing in the world, provided it is done about right, to keep this tem-

perature always the same. "Furthermore, the mistake has been in applying the tar on the Manquette city streets by not having the tar dressing absolutely free from dirt and dust. No matter how fine the tar dressing should be, it must be free from dirt and covered with insipid powder, which naturally prevents the tar from adhering to the dressing. Having said that I saw them treat the roads with tar, a sweep has been used over the road and this was followed by laborers with sprayers who thoroughly swept the surface before the tar was applied. After this was done the dirt was sprinkled over the tar and it was gone over with a steam roller heated with a petroleum torch. "Mr. Rieliher has informed our chief chemist, Dr. Hudson that he furnished for Third street a perfectly satisfactory road and that this is as good as could be made with any tar, and certainly after some years on this street I think his statement to be correct."—Mining Journal.
