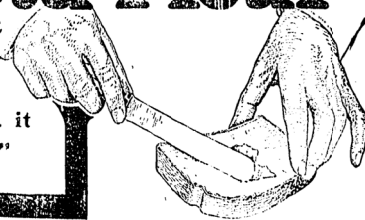

## WHITE WAS PAID FOR HIS STORY

Received \$3,500 for Illinois  
 Graffiti Revelations.

### DESIRED ONLY EXPENSES

Denies at Lorimer Investigation at Chicago That He Offered to Dispose of Manuscript, but He Merely Desired Return for His Trouble—Informed the Junior Senator of the Existence of the Story.

Chicago, Sept. 22.—Representative Charles A. White, revealed to the witness stand on cross-examination before the Lorimer investigating committee, testified that he wrote to Senator Lorimer in December, 1909, telling of his manuscript, to get the senator "to commit himself concerning doing in the legislature," so that he (White) might use it in his publication of the story.

White insisted that he did not purpose selling the story, but wanted to publish it. He then declared that the contract with the Chicago Tribune did not state the truth entirely. "The contract stated that I offered to sell the manuscript," said White. "That is not true. I proposed at the time that I did not offer to sell the story, but only expected my expenses."  
 In response to further questions, White declared that he thought his expenses might be \$2,000. "I did not know what might arise," he said; "I might have needed counsel."

The witness admitted that he had received \$200 for his expenses in addition to the \$1,500 paid for by the newspaper contract. After some sparring White admitted he never had received any offer of pay for the story except from the newspaper which published it.

Sent Story to Publishers.  
 "I sent the manuscript to the Double Day company and told them I would expect my expenses."

White then admitted that his statement in his letter to Senator Lorimer that he had been offered \$2.50 a word for his 30,000 words' manuscript was untrue.

The witness then said that about a fourth of his manuscript was published in the newspaper. He added that he did not know anybody in the legislature who would corroborate, by confession, anything in his story. He also said he knew, from what legislators had said to him, that there was corruption in the legislature. This part of his answer was excluded by Chairman Burrows.

### West Point Adopts Uniform Policy of Testimony.

West Point, Sept. 22.—For the fourth consecutive day since the cadet cadet corps of the United States military academy was put under arrest for giving the "silence" to Captain Longene, instructor in tactics, that body continued to stand pat.  
 The return of General Barry, who is in command of the academy, has failed to alleviate the practical insubordination that now exists. He at once approved of the action of Commandant Sibley in placing the entire student body under arrest and ordered the court of inquiry to continue its investigation.

The court is now concentrating the efforts on getting the names of those who instigated the "silence" in order that a few of the cadets may be punished without involving the entire corps.

To meet this, it is declared, the cadets have adopted a uniform policy of testimony. They tell the court that when the "silence" was administered they merely saw several other cadets doing it and so joined in the treatment themselves.

**ROBBED HOUSE**

**Tracy Deluth Broke into House Wednesday and Took \$25.**

**BOUND OVER TO COURT**

**Prisoner Confessed His Crime. Portion of the Money Recovered.**

Tracy Deluth, a hobo that has been making a short stay in the city broke into a house occupied by several Greeks in the vicinity of the cemetery Wednesday night and secured a pocket book containing about \$25. He also appropriated several bottles of beer. He was seen emerging from the house, and Chief of Police Reilly was notified. During the afternoon he captured Deluth and recovered \$10 of the money. When placed in jail he admitted his guilt and at the hearing held in Justice Kent's court yesterday morning, was bound over for trial at the January term of court.

**ROADS TO MERGE**

The Soo Line and D. S. S. & A. To Combine Under Management of Former.

According to the Duluth Herald a merger of the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic railway and Soo Line will be effected immediately as the new depot now under construction in the Zenith City is completed. Says the Herald: "That the Duluth South Shore & Atlantic railroad will be merged into the Soo Line will be effected as a separate road beginning with the operation of its trains into the new Soo depot in the very near future, is a story that has received confirmation from an official in a position to give the facts in connection with the oft-repeated statement. 'For the past few years the South Shore has been considered a failure as a money-making railroad. Though the gross receipts of the road have been increasing, the deficit has also been increasing. 'The financial in-adequacy of the road is largely due to interest on this road which is carried on the books of the Soo Line. It is generally known that the Soo is the railroad child of the Canadian Pacific. It is also generally known that a very close affiliation exists between the South Shore and the great Canadian trunk line. Therefore the gradual taking over of the South Shore, its operation, its management and all the other details connected with its existence as a railroad, will not be so great a departure as the taking over of an outside road would be. 'The change that has been confirmed by the Herald, has long been looked for by railroad men who have been in touch with the transportation. For the past few years the resignation of President W. P. Fitch has been an annual rumor that has interested railroad men in these parts of the country. Nothing has ever materialized in connection with the oft-mentioned dropping of active railroad work by Mr. Fitch, and in the story of the taking over of the management of the South Shore there is nothing even whispered regarding what will be done in the matter of the present officials of the South Shore. Probably, many of them will be retained. 'Not only will the trains of the South Shore operate into the new Soo depot here, but it is stated that the offices of the South Shore will be transferred to the new depot. 'There is a federal law that prohibits the consolidation of competing lines but it is not believed that this will in any way interfere, as the two roads can hardly be called competing lines.'"

**FOR UPPER PENINSULA FTIR.**

Representative McEwen will, Without Doubt, Support It.

The Mining Journal is boasting the formation of an Upper Peninsula Fair Association. Legislative enactments would be necessary and it advocates the idea concerted and prompt action should be taken as soon as the legislature convenes. One thing is certain: Farmer A. McEwen, of this district, will be found heartily advocating and working for anything that will be of benefit to the farmers of the peninsula. He is one of the most extensive farmers of this section of the state, and his broad acres of cleared and tillable soil in Mackinac county make his farm one of the show places of the peninsula. A district fair would be a step in the right direction, yet the sending of a bill to the state fair should not be overlooked. The peninsula realizes more benefit, perhaps, from such display than could possibly accrue from a district or county fair. It is sending such display to the lower peninsula the attention of the lower peninsula farmers as well as those from other states is called to the productivity of our soil. However, the county and district fairs should not be relegated or, and according to the display at the state fair, for these are of inestimable value and profit to the resident farmers. A sort of rivalry is encountered between them, and the result is better farmers and better produce.

Thinks Osborn Will Have No Trouble in Winning at Election.

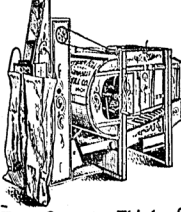

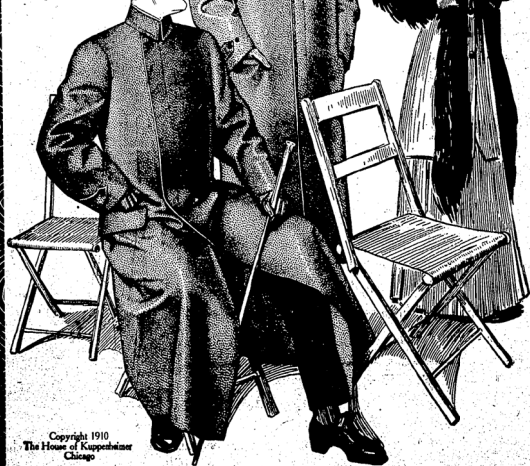
