FIRST ACCIDENT

Ernest Swanson Accidentally Shot While Hunting.

LOST ONE OF HIS THUMBRS.

Gun Fell From Buggy while Victim was Climbing Out of Same.

Ernest Swanson of this city was accidentally shot last Sunday while out on a hunting trip, and as the result of the accident it was found necessary to amputate one of his thumbs when he was brought to the Manistique hospital for treatment.

Swanson was accompanied by Hjalmar Linerens and they had been hunting cartridges in the vicinity of Jas. Christensen's camp. When they were ready to return to the city, and seated in the buggy, Swanson thought he had forgotten something and clambered out of the vehicle with sufficient force to explode the cartridge. The charge tore away Swanson's thumb. Some of the shot also entered his chest, shoulder and knee, but did not penetrate sufficiently to do material injury.

After placing a compress about the wrist to stop the flow of blood, Linerens drove to the city as rapidly as possible with his injured companion. The mangled member was amputated at the Manistique hospital by Dr. Nelson, assisted by Dr. Ross. This is the first accident that has occurred in this section during the hunting season, and it is hoped that it will be the last.

WAS FOUND DEAD.

James Gardiner an Old Time Citizen, Died Friday.

James Gardiner, who has resided in Manistique and vicinity for many years, was found dead in his slumbers near McInnis' camp last Friday. Heart failure is believed to have been the cause of his death. The remains were brought to this city and buried Monday. The deceased was 55 years of age.

A Two Days' Session to be Held Her Death Occurred Yesterday After Long Illness.

THE DATES NOVEMBER 15-16 RESIDED HERE MANY YEARS.

An Excellent Program Prepared for the Was Highly Respected by All of Her Friends and Acquaintances.

Mrs. Maggie Sharkey died at her residence in Lakeside addition yesterday morning at 10:30 o'clock after an illness of several years duration, her ailment being cancer. A short time prior to her death she was taken to St. Mary's hospital, Marquette, but the surgeons decided that an operation would not prolong life.

Margaret O'Donnell was born in County Donegal, Ireland, fifty-nine years ago and became the wife of Mr. Oren Sharkey forty-two years ago. Seven children were the result of this union, four of which are living at the present time. They are: Philip, Dennis, Mrs. Maggie Martin, Mrs. Ann Beuchet and Anthony, all of this city.

She became a resident of Manistique nearly thirty years ago and has resided here continuously since that time. She was a devout Christian, being a member of St. Francis de Sales church, and was highly respected by all knowing her.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at nine o'clock from St. Francis de Sales church.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of the community in their loss of sorrow.

MAN MURDERED

Louis Carifed Shot to Death by Stranger This Morning.

WAS A TANNERY EMPLOYEE

The Cause That Led up to the Murder Not Known.

A Macedonian named Louis Carifed an employee at the tannery plant, was murdered at a nearby hour this morning, by a stranger, a fellow countryman, who arrived in the city yesterday. The deed was committed between the hours of six and seven o'clock and it occurred on the road leading to the tannery from the main road, at a point about midway between the road and the plant.

He was so dumbfounded by the shot from one ball entered his head through the eye, and several bullets passed through his neck and body.

The name of the man suspected of committing the crime is unknown at this writing, but the Macedonians appear to know him, and hint that there was trouble existing between the men, on account of some thing that had happened in their native land. The suspect arrived in the city yesterday, and was seen in the company of Carifed practically the whole day. The two men were also seen walking together at the spot where the deed was committed. The employees of the tannery who passed the spot at an early hour did not see the body, hence it is opinionated that the murder was committed after that hour. The body was found by Teamster Branch between the hours of six and seven, and it was lying in full view by the road side.

The murderer evidently left the city on the early train, or is in hiding in the vicinity of the city.

The body was taken to Johnson's morgue, and the officers are doing all in their power to apprehend the murderer.

Robbery was not the motive for the victim's money was untouched. Carifed came direct from his native land to Manistique on October 10th, and the murderer evidently started in pursuit of him at once with the object of killing him. The Macedonians are an uncommunicative class of people, but no doubt there city eaters Saturday.

A few teams do all of the work in that line in cities the size of Manistique, and the cost to the individual and firm is materially reduced when compared to the cost of maintaining a team and driver. Deliveries are made at stated periods of the day.

The question of installing meters in this city is being discussed, and from all appearances steps with that end in view will be taken early next year. It is believed that the cost of pumping will be materially reduced if all users of water were compelled to pay the meter rate instead of the flat rate. There is no doubt that much water is wasted under present conditions.

Why not decide early in the season to not celebrate July 4th next year, and solicit money from the business men for a two or three days fair? From \$400 to \$500 are contributed annually by our business men for a few sports and a little red fire, and this amount would assist materially in making a three days fair a success. More people would be attracted to the city than in any other way, and the money would then be of some benefit.

As a member of the constitutional convention Mr. Hemans opposed the proposition that the legislature of Michigan should have power to enact laws relative to the hours and conditions under which women and children may be employed.

This proposition was especially urged by the labor organizations of Michigan. They petitioned that the constitution should give the power to the legislature. ANENT CREAMERIES

Promoters Gold Bricking Many Communities in Order to Sell Machinery.

FIELD BECOMING CROWDED

Reaction Bound to Come that will Discourage Dairy Farming.

It begins to look as though this portion of the upper peninsula was being systematically worked by creamery promoters who do not care a rap whether the plants they sell will ever be operated at a profit. All they are in the game for is to unload an expensive plant at an enormous profit upon an unsuspecting community. The "gold brick" game, as such, could hardly be worked upon the farmers that purchase stock in creamery projects in an overcrowded territory, but the selling of creamery plants in fields that cannot support such a plant is the "old game in a new guise." That Schoolcraft county has been "worked" by these promoters, is plainly to be seen. Two years ago a creamery company was organized in Manistique. There were a sufficient number of cows in the territory tributary to Manistique to successfully operate a creamery at the county seat, but since its installation the salesman that are interested in selling creamery machinery have succeeded in organizing several other companies in the territory above mentioned, not because there was a demand for the plants, but for the sole reason that they desired to dispose of the machinery at a top notch price. This is the experience of every section of the county when it first engaged in the dairy business. The inevitable result is that many creameries live a short but not-back that will require years to overcome. The time may come when Schoolcraft county can support a creamery in every township, but that time is not the present. Speaking of the operations of the

rons without proper organization nor even sufficient interest to stick by it till they acquire a working knowledge of the business.

Again many buildings are built not adapted for creamery purposes at all, often leaving out of consideration many details, as ice house water supply and drains, which are absolute necessities for successful operation. Too often will be installed much expensive and unnecessary machinery, then the plant turned over to the farmers for from \$1,500 to \$2,000 more than it is actually worth.

Successful creamery operation depends upon a few fundamental principles and unless these are strictly adhered to the business will surely fail. The thing to do is for a community to call a meeting of the farmers to investigate the conditions of the other fellow's game most expect to lose, is a saying that many people in the Northwest might do well to think about during the next few months. Indeed a good many have played at the creamery promoters game and have nothing left but a vacant building and a new experience.

Hot Air From Hemans.

Mr. Hemans, the Democratic candidate for governor, says it cost the state of Michigan \$40,411,000 to meet its expenses for a period of sixty years. He then recites the further fact that an equal amount, \$40,454,000 had been required to meet the state expenses during the last ten years.

Mr. Hemans makes this statement in the leading feature of his campaign speech and he throws about it quite a bit of oratorical paraphernalia.

But there is another fact directly related to these sixty year and ten year periods which Mr. Hemans has failed to take note of.

The total earnings of the state of Michigan applicable to the primary school fund for the sixty years to which Mr. Hemans refers were only \$21,697,000, while the earnings from corporation fees and railroad taxes alone applicable to primary school fund during the past ten years have been \$40,068,000.

In other words the earnings of the state of Michigan during the past ten years included in Mr. Hemans comparison have been the only two years of the state for the entire period of sixty years included in Mr. Hemans statement.

And there is yet another fact which Mr. Hemans should include in his comparisons.

Two years of the Democratic state administration, the only two years of that sort of administration in Michigan without the memory of the present generation, cost the people of the state of Michigan \$400,000 more than 24 years of a previous period had cost.

At that rate ten full years of Democratic administration would have cost the people of Michigan as much as 120 years under other management.

These comparisons are interesting and valuable perhaps, but they are not valuable to Mr. Hemans for Democratic purposes if they are given as the records of the state present them.

REPUBLICAN RALLY

Was Held in the Opera House Tuesday Evening.

MEETING NOT ADVERTISED.

Good Addresses Made by Messrs Oates and Smith.

The first Republican rally of the present campaign was held at the opera house Tuesday evening. Owing to the fact that the meeting had not been advertised very far in advance.

The speakers of the evening were Hon. Wm. R. Oates of the copper country, and Wm. M. Smith of St. Johns. Mr. Smith was the first speaker, and devoted much of his time in discussing the tariff question, which is the real issue this year. He dwelt upon the importance of achieving a Republican victory at this time, and called attention to the unexampled prosperity

of the country under Republican rule and a protective tariff, and the periods of depression when Democrats were in power, and when a tariff for revenue only, was in vogue. The Democrats, during Buchanan's administration, tried the tariff for revenue idea, and the commercial depression was so acute that the defeated president called attention to the condition of the country, and gave the low tariff as the real reason for that depression. Following Buchanan's administration the Republican party came into power, and for thirty-two years this country prospered as no other country has prospered. A reaction followed when the Wilson bill passed by the Democratic administration in 1893 and the dark days of that period are still remembered by the average voter. The country was compelled to meet its expenses during the Cleveland administration. He called attention to the property that followed the passage of the Dingley bill, and the president that had nominated as the best bill of the kind ever passed by any country. Stated that the Republican party had advanced its platform plagues by a revision of the tariff downward, by the inauguration of the postal savings bank, the passage of the Interstate Commerce act, and the regulation of corporations. He urged the election of Congressman Young, for with a republican in the white house it is highly necessary that the copper and steel should be Republican if needed legislation is to be passed during the coming two years.

He devoted some time to state issues, and called attention to the fact that the Twelfth district has three places on the state ticket this year. For that consideration there should be a full vote the coming election for the entire ticket in the upper peninsula. He stated that the campaign was being fiercely waged below the straits, and that in this section where there appears to be little incentive to get out to full vote, owing to lack of opposition, there was grave danger. He said that Hemans was devoting much time to the lounge time, and Mr. Smith said that he was not familiar with taxation conditions in the mining country, but called attention to gross undervaluations in Ingham county, Honans own county.

Mr. Smith was an unsuccessful candidate before the recent state convention for attorney general, but made a favorable impression while here. Hon. Wm. R. Oates of the copper country opened his address by saying that the apparent indifference of the upper peninsula during the present campaign would not exist on election day. People have already made up their minds how they are going to vote, and that apparent indifference was not a discouraging feature.

Mr. Oates devoted his entire time in discussing state issues and extolling Chase S. Osborn. He pointed out the fact that the Democratic platform practically endorsed every contention made by Mr. Osborn prior to the primary election. He also unearthed Hemans' record in the legislature and proved his present position of criticism as untenable. He recounted the work done by Mr. Osborn while serving state as railroad commissioner, and proved that while the money expended by that department during his incumbency was large, yet the results warranted it, for Mr. Osborn has saved the citizens of Michigan hundreds of dollars by enforcing the law relative to two cent fares on leading roads of the state. In concluding, he urged every Republican voter to go to the polls on November 8th.
