Was full of Advice, which if Heeded would Result in More General Observance.

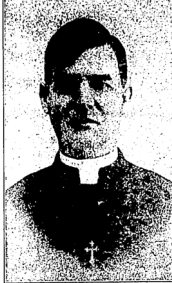
The union Thanksgiving services were held in the Swedish Baptist church yesterday morning, and were largely attended.

John in the "unity of spirit and bond of peace" which brings us together this morning to pour out our hearts in this service of praise and Thanksgiving to Almighty God, yet there is a certain aspect of the case that will, I fear, cause this assembly to be looked upon as a sad commentary on the spiritual life of this community. I ask you my brethren, to think for a moment of what it means, to think of the significance it must have in the eyes of

those who look upon us from outside of the pale of Christ's Church.

The President of the United States has, by special proclamation, called upon the people of the land to observe this day as a day of general thanksgiving: the Governor of this state has repeated the call to the people of this Commonwealth; the Pastors of the various churches have called upon the faithful to assemble and meet together to offer sacrifices of Praise and Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the great benefits they have received at His hands; and behold! so many of the faithful are occupied in catering to their own self-indulgence, so many are occupied in taking advantage of the opportunity to increase their worldly gain, so many are so interested in the social affairs which the season ushers in, that this one House of Worship has been deemed as all sufficient for the accommodation of those, who out of this whole community, may be expected to heed the appeal of Church, State and Nation, and turn their thoughts to the religious observance of the day.

CAUGHT BAD ACTOR

Officers Smith and Lundstrom Capture Armed Man on Lonely Road

SHOOTS MAN AT SHINGLETON

Officers Trained Him and Made Quick Capture Day After Crime was Committed.

Sheriff Smith again distinguished himself Monday by capturing a negro who shot a man at Shingleton, the previous evening. In effecting the capture he was assisted by Deputy Lundstrom, and that the desperado, who carried a loaded magazine rifle, was captured without the firing of a shot, shows that our local officials are as foxxy as any of them.

Smith as notified Monday morning by the Alger county officials that a negro, William Schaeffer, had shot P. Withrow, a barber residing at Shingleton, Sunday evening, and that he was evidently coming in the direction of Manistique, with and deputy Lundstrom left for the north on the M. & L. S. road and Lundstrom rode on the engine, and Engineer Forshar promised to stop the train in case the fellow was overhauled.

When the train reached Shingleton, the sheriff ascertained that his man had passed that station, and was going in the direction of Hovey's camp.

At the camp he ascertained that he was going in the direction of the Big Murphy, and the officers overtook him about two and one-half miles from camp. They had secured a horse and sleigh to make the trip, and they came upon the fellow at a curve in the trail and covered him with their guns before he had an opportunity of getting his rifle in position to shoot.

Lundstrom disarmed him and he was promptly ironed and brought to this city on the evening train. Deputy Sheriff Barstow, who is about twenty-nine years of age and hailing from Pennsylvania, is considered a dependable character by those knowing him. He has been in the employ of Mr. Clement for some time. On the evening in question a row occurred between the barber and another party, and the barber appeared to have the best

of the scrap. The negro quickly loaded his thirty-two Special and shot at the barber for the purpose of "scaring" him. He shot twice, one shot hitting him just below the heart and passing through the body and cutting off a rib as it passed out at the back.

The wounded man was taken to a Manistique hospital for treatment, but little if any hope is entertained for his recovery. But for the effective work of Sheriff Smith and his deputy Lundstrom, the fellow would have escaped for a while and been by the Alger county authorities to apprehend him, except to enlist the services of our sheriff.

IS NOW ORGANIZED

Anti-Tubercular Society Elects Officers and Adopts Constitution.

Committees Will be Appointed at Meeting Next Monday Evening.

The organization of the Schoolcraft County Association for the Prevention and Relief of Tuberculosis was completed at a meeting held at the court house Monday evening.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Andrew Nelson, president of the local medical society. Secretary Livingston, secretary of the association was elected a temporary secretary.

The minutes of the meeting held Wednesday evening of last week, were read, after which it was decided to circulate a membership list among those present. Twenty-nine of our representative citizens signed same, at that time.

The report of the committee on nominations was then called for and same follows:

President—Virgil I. Hixson. First Vice President—M. J. Rice. Second Vice President—August Norman. Secretary Mrs. A. M. LeRoy. Treasurer—Mrs. Nancy Johnson.

A committee on constitution and by-laws was appointed by the chair, consisting of Rev. Ellis, Mrs. Geo. Nicholson and Dr. Mitchell. The constitution and by-laws of the Houghton society, with a few alterations and modifications, were adopted by the society.

A rising vote of thanks was extended Dr. Arthur Fischer, of Hubbard for his self sacrifice in coming to Manistique, and for the excellent address that he delivered at the opera house last Thursday evening.

The association adjourned to Monday evening of next week, at which time President Hixson will announce the selection of the chairman of the various standing committees. The meeting will be held at the court house and the hour is 8:30 o'clock.

The organization is eliciting the interest of our best citizens' to an unusual degree, and it is safe to predict that it will accomplish much good in the future. It is well offered and the members show that message of enthusiasm that presages success.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

Do your shopping early.

When a young man is filling his pipe and hunting for a match, opportunity is slipping by.

High class programs continue to crowd Manistique's popular place of amusement, the Princeton theatre.

Although the packers have announced a material drop in the price of meat, the purchasing public of Manistique are not yet aware of it.

More than 3000 lower peninsula hunters invaded the upper peninsula during the hunting season this year. The number is greater than last season.

When a man is shot out of a tree, because an idiot armed with a sun cap and tin and imagines that a deer has taken to tree climbing it is high time for persons to return from the chase.

Rev. Hiram Ellis' thanksgiving sermon which he delivered at the union meeting yesterday morning, appears in this issue. It should be read by all, for it is worthy of careful perusal.

Sheriff Smith's fame as a man catcher has extended to neighboring counties. When our neighbors desire the capture of gun artists, they telephone Schoolcraft county's sheriff and he gets them while you wait.

If you did the latter you certainly did not enter into the spirit of yesterday.

It is no crime to start a street argument but it shows that your business isn't very rushing.

The Women's Reading club has for several years been taking much interest in persons afflicted with tuberculosis and have provided ways and means in more than one case whereby the afflicted person was given an opportunity for regaining his health. This organization is deeply interested in the organization of the local branch of the state association and it is fitting that one of its members, Mrs. A. M. LeRoy, has been elected as secretary of the new organization.

Reports of near freezing and activity in the making of the old fashioned night caps are reaching this office since the address of Dr. Fischer at the opera house last week. His denunciation of the closed window has set people thinking. The person that habitually sleeps in a room with closed windows, is practically committing suicide. One should feel the fresh air playing over his face no matter how low the thermometer touches.

In the death of Tolstol the world lost one of its most unique characters. His personality was such that he defied the government of Russia, and much as they might have desired to send him in exile or kill him, the officials of that country did not dare to harm him, for he had the respect of the world. He was a graphic writer, and in thought was far in advance of his country as is the best type of the Caucasian as compared to the ant-eaters of Africa.

The interest manifested in the organization of the anti-tuberculosis society shows that our citizens are progressive. No one knows whom the dread disease may attack next, and that Schoolcraft county has decided to join force with those that are combatting the evil, is very encouraging.

There is something pathetic in the manner in which the news of the death of Tolstol was received by the masses in Russia. He gave them a glimpse of hope and vitalized the aspiration of his admirers, which had been lying dormant and well nigh crushed by the iron heel of a despotism that is a blot upon the civilization of this age.

The saloon is being reformed in New Jersey. The Lower Denslow association of that state is ardently opposed to aesthetics and the words saloon and bartender go into their finer sensibilities. The association has decided that hereafter the booze parlors shall be known as "cafes" and that the barkeeps shall be called servers.

The number of persons that were vaccinated during the prevalence of the smallpox scourge at Saginaw totaled 47,000. If Manistique promptly insures that every person in the city shall be vaccinated, we may escape a visitation of the scourge this year. It appears to be extremely fatal this year. The person who refuses to be vaccinated is a dangerous factor in any community.

Without doubt the boundaries of the congressional districts of the state will be materially altered before the next election. The Twelfth district, owing to its population, will be dissected and a portion of same will be added to a lower peninsula district. If this occurs Schoolcraft county with Mackinac and Chippewa, will become the tail of a district that will extend below the straits, and this might make the selection of a candidate from these three counties a very remote possibility for years to come.



VACCINATION IS SURE PREVENTIVE

Best Way to Forestall Possibility of Smallpox Becoming Prevalent in U. P.

Though there is not known to be any case of smallpox in the state, the prevalence of the disease in many sections of lower Michigan should serve as a warning to all persons who have not already taken this preparation to be vaccinated at once, in the opinion of a Mantique physician. "In spite of occasional claims to the contrary," said this physician "experience has proven that vaccination is most effective and practically the only preventative of smallpox, and general vaccination is also the best known means of curbing a smallpox epidemic, once it has started in a community. I have followed the lower Michigan situation closely and I do not believe there has been a single death from smallpox, except in cases of those who have not been vaccinated. In my opinion, there would have been no such epidemic of smallpox at the home for the feeble minded, if proper attention had been paid to the vaccination of the inmates. A person who has been recently vaccinated rarely takes smallpox at all, and in case it is contracted, the patient almost always has it in only a very mild form."

A bulletin recently issued by the state board of health contains the following:

"It is well known that smallpox can be prevented or modified by vaccination, and a widespread epidemic of the disease can be attributed only to an equally widespread ignorance of willfulness concerning its prevention by vaccination and re-vaccination."

"The time to prepare for smallpox is when there is none around," said the same physician who is quoted above.

"Every person should be sure that he has been vaccinated lately enough to insure that the effects of the vaccine still remain in his system. The scar, whether plainly visible or not, is a fairly accurate test of the need of re-vaccination. Too many people get off being vaccinated until there is an outbreak of the disease and then they may have already been exposed and the vaccine will not have the effect it might have had otherwise. With the hundreds of lower peninsula hunters now in the upper peninsula, there is at least a possibility of the disease breaking out in this section of the state. Get vaccinated and be on the safe side my way."
