

\$138,000 FOR HARBOR

Manistique to Receive Liberal Sum for Continuance of Work.

AVAILABLE NEXT YEAR

Recommendation will be Endorsed by Congress Without Doubt.

That Manistique will be well taken care of by the coming congress is evidenced by the fact that the sum of \$138,462 is recommended by Secretary of War Dickinson for the continuance of the work on the local harbor during the coming year.

The appropriations of river and harbor improvement aggregate \$30,495,688. The sum for Manistique is the estimate of Brig. Gen. W. H. Bixby chief of engineers of the U. S. army. These figures, which will be sent to congress by Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh, and legislation in accordance therewith will be recommended by President Taft in his annual message.

The "up-river" aspects have been carefully pruned by the engineering department under the direction of the presidents, and for this reason it is safe to say that Manistique will receive the liberal appropriation above mentioned.

The sums set aside for various points in Michigan are: Alpena, \$10,000; Frankfort, \$10,000; Grand Haven, \$84,000; Grand Marais, \$10,000; Holland, \$16,000; Ludington, \$10,000; Manistique, \$10,000; Marquette, \$138,462; Marquette Bay, \$2,000; Marquette, \$88,000; Muskegon, \$10,000; improving Kalamazoo river \$30,000; Black River, \$5,000; Clinton river, \$2,000; Detroit river \$375,000; Rouge river, \$5,000; St. Marys river, \$500,000.

SHOULD GET BUSY

Manistique Must Secure New Industries to Supplement Lumber Manufacture.

TIMBER BECOMING SCARCE

City's Natural Resources and Location are Valuable Assets and Should be Exploited.

For nearly two decades the average citizen of Manistique has been predicting that the lumber industry as far as Manistique was concerned, was short-lived. The mills continued to saw their sawlogs as of yore and the log which the last log shall pass through the local mills seemed in the remote distance by those not conversant with conditions. The closing and dismantling of the "upper mill" several years ago impressed those predicting local conditions as the beginning of the end. The early closure of the Weston Co's mill and the persistent rumor that it might not resume next season is another reminder that Manistique must secure other manufacturing interests. It is true that the steam mill will no doubt be operated for a number of years, but the timber needed to keep it in operation is brought from long distances and at increased cost, and the time is not far distant when the industry that placed Manistique on the map will be a reminiscence.

This fact Manistique has been fortunate in securing industries to supplement the waning lumber industry. About the time that the "upper mill" was dismantled, the furniture plant took on a new lease of life, the tannery was erected, and later the Goodwill Co. entered in the box making industry. The plants above mentioned have been largely improved and the output greatly increased, so that up to the present time the city has not materially suffered and a maximum number of persons have been given employment.

However, several establishments giving steady employment to two or three hundred men are needed. If the local organizations of business men would besmirch itself something might be accomplished in this direction.

Manistique Nov. 25, 1910

At a regular meeting of the City Council held in the city hall on the 25th day of November, 1910, the following members were present: Ald. Benson, Stream, Lundstrom, Mosher, Pattison and Drevdahl.

Presented and approved by the Council the following ordinance was offered:

Section One. That the City of Manistique shall be and is hereby authorized to issue bonds in the amount of \$100,000 for the purpose of financing the same, as provided by law.

Yves, Ald. Benson, Stream, Lundstrom, Mosher, Pattison and Drevdahl, Nays: None.

Ordinance Number 56.

An ordinance licensing, regulating and prohibiting sports, exhibitions, circuses, menageries, theatrical exhibitions, shows, moving picture exhibitions and all exhibitions.

The City of Manistique ordains:

Section One. All exhibitions of natural or artificial curiosities, circuses, circuses, menageries, theatrical exhibitions, shows and all exhibitions of whatever name and nature, for which money or other reward is in any manner demanded or received, are hereby prohibited within the City of Manistique, unless the exhibitor or exhibitors, firm or corporation, shall pay into the contingent fund of the city thereof, the following sums:

For the exhibition or performance of a circus, menagerie or caravan of animals the sum of one hundred dollars per day.

For the exhibition of natural or artificial curiosities and other exhibitions the sum of ten dollars per day.

For theatrical exhibitions the sum of ten dollars per day.

For a merry-go-round or other similar device the sum of five dollars per day.

For street shows, and open air concerts and shows, the sum of ten dollars per day, each place of entertainment, being considered a separate show, requiring a separate license.

For moving picture theatres and exhibitions, the sum of Twenty Five Dollars a year, provided that no license shall be issued therefor for a period less than six months.

Section Three. The provisions of this ordinance requiring a license for such shows and costs, the court may make further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the common jail of Schoolcraft county, or in said city jail, until said fine and costs shall be paid, provided such imprisonment shall not exceed four months.

Section Ten. Any person violating any of the above provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than five dollars and the costs of prosecution, and in default of the payment of said fine and costs shall be imprisoned in the common jail of Schoolcraft county, or in said city jail, until such fine and costs shall be paid, to a maximum of thirty days.

Section Eleven. Every license granted hereunder shall be revocable by the council at any time for the failure of the licensee to conform to the provisions of this ordinance, and no license granted hereunder shall extend beyond the first Monday in June next thereafter.

Section Twelve. Ordinances Number Sixteen, Twenty-four, Forty-one and Forty-two and all other ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section Thirteen. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the first day of January, A. D. 1911.
