WIT OF THE INDIAN

The Dignified Red Man Has a Keen Sense of Humor.

STORIES OF STANDING BEAR.

The Race the Old Chief Was Willing to Run Against a Government Attorney—A Gallant Brave and His Mirror—An Inevitable Bridge.

The impression prevails widely that the Indian lacks the saving sense of humor—that most characteristic of all American qualities. To the contrary, the spreading of this impression may be regarded as a tribute to the Indian character. He has indignantly contributed his ancestral pride, his exclusiveness, his gravity of face and dignity of manner in public.

Nevertheless an injustice is done him, for among no primitive people is the sense of humor keener or more spontaneous and kindly.

Years ago I was conversing with a group of children of the Omaha tribe. They were on their way to a reservation school, and directly in their path lay a swampy expanse of a mile wide, and straight through this they were required to wade twice a day. "It is too bad," I remarked. "Can you not go around the swamp? Your feet will be wet, and you will be uncomfortable and possibly ill."

"Oh," cried a girl of about twelve years, her dark eyes dancing with merriment, "we walk over the \$1,200 bridge."

"The girl laughed at this. What could it mean? I saw no bridge; there was no bridge to be seen. It must mean merry to see me puzzled, and I heard them laughing and chaffing as they went through the water and mud. Afterward I discovered the humor in the remark. Some years previous to that time the government had appropriated \$1,200 to build a bridge over this swamp, but somehow the money had vanished into somebody's pocket and the work was not done.

One evening I saw a gallant young brave making his way swiftly over the prairie of the Omaha reserve. He was dressed in all his finery, and at his side dangled a small mirror. Manifestly he was an ardent lover. This I should have surmised from his dress and eager haste, even if I had not known him. As he was a friend of mine, I had had information of his hopes and purposes; also I ventured to stop him for a moment, precisely as I have him this time to be.

"That mirror at your side," I remarked, "is to give opportunity for Francis Flower to discover how lovely she is, is it not?" He considered a moment, and then, with a twinkling eye, he replied: "No. Maybe she will talk too much to me, and then I will look into my mirror to see how tired I am." This certainly was the humor of ab-

The smoker is filled with a horrible fear, something like the horrors brought on by delirium tremens. A kitten, or a puppy or his distorted vision appears as some terrible creature. A common sight in Mexico is to see a swarthy "grasser," armed to the teeth, flee in terror from a small dog, while he would fearlessly attack any man with his knife or his machete.

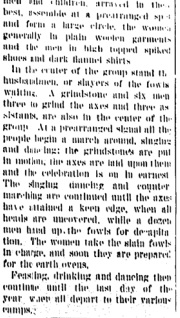

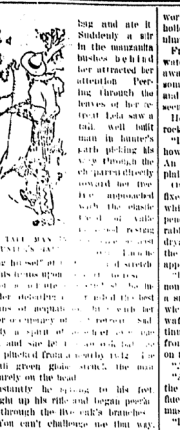


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A CHRISTMAS DRYAD.

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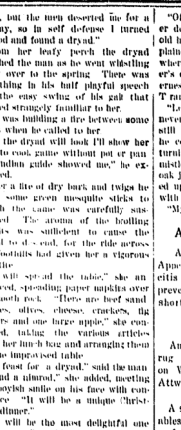


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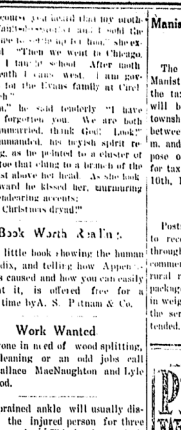


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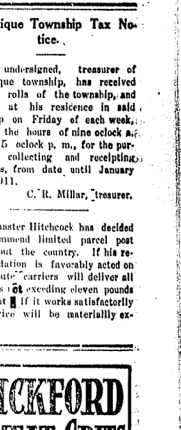

J. J. Hood has arrived in the city from Arapahoe county, in Colorado, where he has been interested in fruit growing and alfalfa raising for several years.
Four years ago Mr. Hood was a fruit grower near Blainville, Wis. He was disappointed in his alfalfa raising in Michigan, but was induced to go to Colorado by the fact that alfalfa grows there in abundance. He bought 100 acres in Arapahoe county at \$250 an acre and bargained for water for irrigation at the rate of \$1.75 an acre. He then spent \$800 in setting out cherry and plum trees, only to have two hard hail storms come and practically destroy the trees.
In speaking of the irrigation proposition, he said that water was available but one day out of the week and it failed to come on these days when the reservoir was empty. He made money growing fruit before going to Colorado, and is going to buy a fruit farm in western Michigan and make money in the coming year.

NORTH MAGNETIC POLE.

It is Not a Stationary Point, but is Constantly Shifting.
Only the experts understand that the north pole and the north magnetic pole are two entirely different things. As a matter of fact, there are four localities on the earth's surface where the compass points the north. The reason is because the earth's magnetic pole is located in the vicinity of King William's Land, just off the arctic coast of North America, in both. When this magnetic pole is between us and the north pole no matter what direction we go in we go either east or west from this line it is easy to see that the compass is off to a certain degree. If we were to travel north on the magnetic pole the needle would point south; west of it the needle would point east. Sir James Ross in 1831 located the north magnetic pole approximately at a point just in both. In 1893 Captain Isidore Malmgren in the ship Ojos set out on a three year expedition, returned the magnetic pole and made the "northwest passage" for which mariners have striven since the days of Henry Hudson. The actual magnetic force is different in every part of the earth's surface and is not always the same at a given point. It is subject to regular daily and yearly changes. Amundsen pointed out himself near the west of the magnetic pole and the aurora borealis, both readings of his instruments, both declination and declination. He also elongation and declination. He also located the magnetic pole and was able by the aid of the declination observations to prove that the magnetic north pole does not have a stationary situation, but is continually moving. But the general location is where the pole is. Ross first had the honor to place it—Chicago Tribune.

BOSTON LIGHT.

It is Said to Be the Oldest Harbor Beacon in America.
The outer light of Boston harbor is Boston light, eight miles below the channel that opens lines follow. It stands on Little Brewster island, a few rods north of the shore. It is in its gentle hollow on the sheltered side. Three families live here—those of the head keeper and his two assistants. In all the inhabitants number a dozen souls.
The light itself is said to be the oldest in America, built in 1716 by the government of England. It is of rough boulder stone, hooped with iron bands, and its lens, whitened with lime, is a handsome and seawark for wide.
A rustic iron railway for carrying coal leads from the water-side to the engine house, where is an engine and boilers in which steam is kept up for continually to operate the steam for hoisting. Their great trumpet-like funnel protrude through the wall of the building on the seaward side. In foggy weather one can hear from the seven windows the faint rattle of the hoars on the Boston lightship, seven miles away, as the keepers on the lightship can hear this one at Boston light.
An old cannon lies on the ground near the lighthouse. It was provided by the Canada Steamship company; but the foghorn was installed to give signals. It is unused now. But in addition to the great revolving light in the tower there is a set of red and white range lights that give the localities of anchorage for vessels in the harbor. If they are out of their proper location, but if white they are safe—New York Mail.

REOPENING SERVICE

Nearly The Entire Indebtedness Provided for During the Day.

He left Menominee about eight years ago, and in recent years he and his wife have been making their home with Mr. and Mrs. Neville.

He was very highly respected by all knowing him.

THE RED SEALS

Sale of Stamps Progressing Nicely. Cause Worthy One.

ALL SHOULD BUY THEM

The Money Will be Used for the Alleviation of Suffering.

The Ladies of the Reading club, a society which by the way has been the pioneer in raising funds for the local tuberculosis sufferers have taken upon themselves the task of selling the Red Cross seals. The money secured by these sales will be put to a good use under the direction of the anti-tuberculosis society. In several cases at least the efforts made in the past have resulted in saving lives by furnishing a nourishing diet and by making it possible for afflicted ones to go to the state sanitarium. So when you purchase the seals you are certainly assisting a worthy cause. In this connection a history of the seals may be read with interest, and it follows:



Red Cross Christmas Seals date back in their origin to "charity stamps," first used for the soldiers' relief funds in Boston in 1862, during the Civil War. After the war, this method of raising money was discontinued in this country for a generation, although it found vogue in Portugal, Switzerland, France, Spain, Denmark, Norway, Russia, Sweden and other European countries. There are now several hundred different types of charity stamps used in all parts of the world.

Stamps or seals were first used to raise money for the anti-tuberculosis crusade in Norway and Sweden in 1904. After being used in these countries for three years, as direct result of the interest of Jacob Ritis in this movement, the Delaware Anti-Tuberculosis Association, headed by Miss Emily P. Dissell, and the Red Cross Society of Delaware combined in issuing a Tuberculosis Stamp. So successful was this cam-

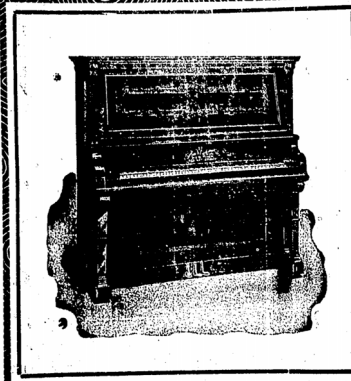


aign that nearly \$30,000 was realized, and the next year, in 1908, the American Red Cross was induced to issue a National Red Cross Tuberculosis Stamp. From this sale \$135,000 was realized, that amount being almost doubled in 1909. This year, of the first time, the sale is organized on a comprehensive basis, taking in all parts of the United States, a million for tuberculosis work is confidently expected.
