FATALLY INJURED

Mr. Aaron Quick Dies as Result of Fall at His Home Tuesday

Mr. Aaron Quick died shortly after 10 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, as the result of a fall two hours before. It appears that shortly after dinner he put on his hat and started for the door leading from the kitchen into the wood shed. The door in question was open and he apparently opened the door leading to the cellar, which was located under the wood shed door. He fell full length to the cement floor below, and struck with sufficient force to fracture his skull at his base. An alarm was quickly sounded and Messrs. Orr and O'Brien were quickly summoned. He was taken to the hospital and remained in that institution until his death which occurred about 3:15 o'clock. Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Rice of Manistique township, who were with him and his family on the day in question, and he appeared to be in the best of spirits.

The deceased was born at Cameron, N. Y., July 2nd, 1832, and was married to Miss Olive Woodworth, Dec. 15, 1863, at Cooper's, N. Y. They came to Manistique in 1887 where they have since resided. Mrs. Quick preceded him in death having died Nov. 4, of last year. The deceased was forty-seven years old at the time of his death.

He leaves a son, Mason H., a daughter, Lillian M., a grand-daughter, Leona H., four brothers, Martin H., Elwyn, Ed and Willis, all residents of this city, and three sisters, viz. Medaiana, W. Owen and H. O. Barley of this city, and Mrs. Dr. Burdick of Cambridge, Mass.

He was a devout and consistent member of the Baptist denomination since his youth, and the funeral services, which were held from the home yesterday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock, were in charge of Rev. F. R. Leach, pastor of the First Baptist church.

Mr. Quick was a quiet, unostentatious citizen, always temperate, industrious and frugal, and doing well every day assigned him. He was respected

FIGHT STARTED

Local Option Fight Inaugurated in Schoolcraft County.

Superintendent Grant M. Hanson of the State Anti-Saloon league, was in the city Tuesday evening for the purpose of doing the preliminary work incident to the forthcoming local option fight that shall be waged in this county shortly. A meeting was held at the First Baptist church that evening, at which time a temporary organization was effected and committee appointed. An immediate effort will be made to secure the needed number of signatures to the petitions, and the campaign will be aggressively prosecuted.

A similar fight will be waged in every upper peninsula county, and it will be well nigh impossible for the liquor interests to rebuke voters as was the case at the time the previous fight was conducted in this county.

The persons interested in the project are enthusiastic and that the county of Schoolcraft stands a very reasonable show of going into the "dry" column in the coming year. The "wet" carried the county in the initial count by less than 300 majority, and without the important vote, the county would have gone dry.

BADLY INJURED

Mr. Henri Brassel Thrown Off Tramway by Lumber Car Monday Morning.

While enroute across the river via the tramway Monday morning, Mr. Henri Brassel, one of the oldest and best known citizens of the city, was struck by a moving car of lumber, thrown to the ground, a distance of seventeen feet, and sustained the fracture of his right leg near the thigh, and severe injuries to his side and head.

The witnesses to the accident, immediately called for medical aid, and he was conveyed to the home of his son-in-law, Dr. Arthur Barton, after temporary aid had been given him by Dr. Rutledge. It was ascertained that his injuries are severe, and owing to his age, the result may be shrouded in doubt.

It appears that Mr. Brassel's presence on the track was not noticed by the engineer, who was shoving several loaded cars across the river. Brassel noticed the train, and stepped to the edge of the track, but there was not sufficient room for him and he was shoved to the ground by the car. Had he stepped to the other side he would have had plenty of room, as the train was wider at that point owing to a switch.

His many friends hope that he will speedily recover from the effects of his fall.

POSTOFFICE CHANGE

The Local Office to be Moved into the Sandberg Building to be Erected Shortly.

The government has entered into a contract with Adolf Sandberg for the housing of the local office in the building he contemplates erecting at the corner of Cedar & Main streets.

The building Mr. Sandberg contemplates building, will be made sufficient in size for the use of the government and for the rental of a room to a local firm of grocers that has leased the room and will occupy same as soon as it is ready for occupancy.

The building in question is nearly a block north of the business center of the city, and indicates that the future expansion of the business center will be in that direction. The government has effected a lease for a period of ten years.

The location of the postoffice is no longer deemed a business advantage, since free delivery has been installed, and fewer people make pilgrimages to the office.

FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Hon. Wm. Leighton of Alger County Has Entered Race for Representative Nomination.

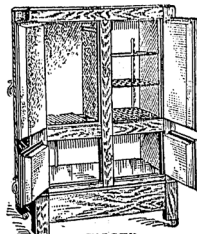
It is with a deal of satisfaction that the average voter of the Scotch and wide acquaintance district will hail the announcement that Hon. William Leighton of Alger county has decided to make the race for nomination as representative of the district of which Schoolcraft county is a portion.

Mr. Leighton has the experience and wide acquaintance that will make him a formidable candidate. He can accomplish things at Lansing, for few residents of the upper peninsula have a wider acquaintance among the men that do things in the state than he. It will be remembered that he secured an appropriation for the Grand Marais Seney road from the legislature, practically without assistance from the upper peninsula.

Leighton is loyal to the upper peninsula under circumstances and conditions that are disheartening. He was at one time well-to-do, and had his money invested in Grand Marais. When the lumber barons abandoned means of getting in and out of his city, the temporary death knell of the town in question was sounded. Bill is hanging on, with a well grounded hope that his little city will again come into its own. He has never lost faith under these disheartening conditions, and the idea of securing a wagon load for his city through state aid, which a decided innovation in these latter days, was financed by the state wholly through the personal acquaintance among the members of the law making bodies.

Leighton will receive a comfortable majority in Schoolcraft county for he is acceptable to all classes and factions. That he will carry Alger and Luce counties is a foregone conclusion.
