## PASSED AWAY

### Mrs. Tolls Farley Died After Long Illness Last Saturday Morning.

Mrs. Tolls Farley, who has been ill for a long time with a cancerous affection, died in her home on Atlantic Ave. last Saturday morning. For months her condition has been critical, and she was considered hopeless. She bore her suffering patiently and was resigned to her fate.

The deceased was the oldest daughter of Simon Bausch, Sr. and was born at Salsburg fifty-eight years ago last January. At an early age her parents moved to Barque Point, and she has been a resident of Schoolcraft county practically all her lifetime. She bore the wife of Tolls Farley at Garden and was the mother of two children, Mrs. Bertha Deemer and Wilfred Farley. Mr. Farley preceded her to the spirit land last November.

The funeral services were held from the home Monday afternoon and were in charge of Dr. J. R. Mitchell of the Presbyterian church, of which denomination the deceased was a member. They were largely attended by the friends and relatives of the deceased, and the floral offerings were numerous and handsome, bearing tribute to the memory in which she was held by all.

### You Must Secure a Gun License before Going to the Woods for Game.

The county clerk and deputy Game Warden Guinan have secured a supply of hunting licenses, and the person planning to go to the woods in quest of small game on and after Sept. 1st, must secure one before starting. The fees are \$1.00 for residents and \$10.00 for aliens non-residents. Do not confound this license with the license furnished during the deer season. The prices for the latter are \$1.50 and \$25.00 as heretofore, and they can be secured at the open season for deer.

## Old Timer Here.

Captain Boush of Choboygan was in the city this week, having been called here to attend the funeral of his niece, Mrs. Tolls Farley. The captain's many old time friends were pleased to meet him, and recount their early experiences. He was the captain of the Van Ralle. The first boat to make this port regularly, many years before the advent of the railroad. The Captain sailed for fifty-one years and for thirty-seven years of that time, was the captain of a vessel. He saw service in the navy during the war of the rebellion, and was with Farragut at Mobile Bay. While he was born in 1820, yet he is as youthful as the average man of fifty. In these latter years he has been serving Choboygan as police justice, and is that city's best known citizen.

## IS PROSPERING

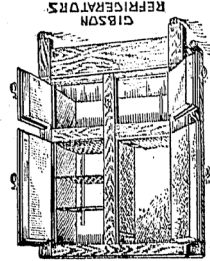
### Manistiquie Handle Co. Works Overtime on Account of Increasing Business.

**Pope Pius Succumbs as Result of Grief Over European War.**

Pope Pius X died shortly after two o'clock yesterday morning. It is believed that, grieving over the European war was the direct cause of his demise.

The deceased had been the head of the Catholic church since 1904.

He took to heart the unsettled conditions in Europe and hoped that war would be averted. In his embittered condition the vicissitudes occasioned by the clash of arms was too much for him, and complications reduced his vitality to such an extent that his end was not unexpected.

The Callaghan Publishing Company, an Illinois concern, made a new compilation of the Michigan Statutes, and had the Michigan legislature to legalize their compilation. This would have deprived Michigan printers of the opportunity to do the work. The State Typographical Union opposed it. The Callaghan concern had two or three representatives in Lansing lobbying for their bill. The newspapers denounced it.

Senator Scott voted for it, and Rep. Jos. E. Bayliss voted against it and helped to defeat it. He now has an endorsement of the State Typographical Union of Michigan, for his candidacy for congress.

**CANDIDATE BAYLISS FAVORS GOOD ROADS.**  
Congressional Candidate Bayliss is right on the road question. He says: "I firmly believe in good road bills. But I do not believe that the burden of building these roads should be too heavily upon the local districts, but should be borne in a large measure by the national government. I am greatly in favor of the 'Good Roads Bill' which was introduced in the Post Office and Post Roads Committee, authorizing an appropriation of one billion dollars for construction of good roads throughout the country. The

bill provides for the division of this money among the states according to population, assessed value road mileage and area.

"This bill is logical and timely, and with proper support should become a law. Just think what a vast benefit to the rural communities such a law would be with its billion dollar appropriation and detailed plans for road construction."

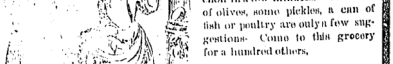

## THE CANDIDATES

### A Number of Good Men Aspiring for County Positions.

The ticket that will be handed the voter next Tuesday contains the names of those candidates that filed their nomination petitions in time for a place on the ticket, and in every case where there are contestants for the same office it can be truthfully said that these candidates have much to commend them, are popular and hold a good vote.

The Pioneer-Tribune favors the nomination of O'Brien for governor and Baylis for congress. The merits of these gentlemen have been so fully discussed in the recent past that no reiteration is necessary.
