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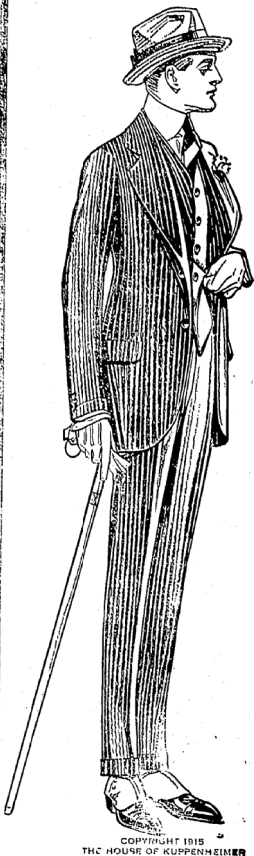

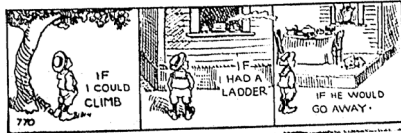

REV. G. HARPER LOST ALL IN ENGLAND

REID ARRESTED
Mantiague Resident Fred Mueller, Brother of Local Baker, Had Exciting Experience in England.

Rev. G. Harper Reid, former rector of the local Episcopal church, has been arrested on the charge of floating bogus checks to the amount of about \$2,000, upon Soo business men. He was caught at New York City, and will be brought to the Soo for trial. Speaking of the affair, the Soo News says:

Rev. Harper Reid, an Episcopal clergyman from Blind River, Ont., who has visited the Soo many times and is well known to numerous local persons, is being held by the police department of New York City for the local authorities, charged with passing between \$1,000 and \$2,000 worth of worthless checks on Soo merchants.

Rev. Reid will be brought to this city as soon as possible, where he will be tried on a charge of forgery. Sheriff Bone will not leave for New York until he receives word from the officials there as to whether Rev. Reid will come back to the Soo without taking out extradition papers.

It appears that the clergyman had shirked the Soo many times and had gone heavily in debt. His trip last week resulted in the payment of his debts, but with larceny checks. He owed one firm about \$600, another firm \$400, and many other smaller amounts.

Left No Trail Behind.
The local authorities had no way of finding out where the minister had gone when he left the city, as he left no evidence of this fact behind. They did not know of the tumble until he had left and were then in a quandary as to where to locate him.

Attorney Merlin Wiley, who was acting as prosecutor during the absence of Prosecuting Attorney Thomas J. Green, thought perhaps Reid might attempt to go to his old home in England and therefore wired the officials in New York City. His efforts were rewarded today when the news reached here that he had been caught there.

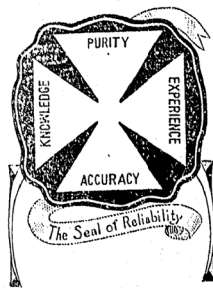
